

Happy Summer

My older brother Phil from Washington, D.C., was in town this weekend on his way up to Wooster to enjoy a couple of "outside visits" with my parents at their assisted living place this week. Being with him brought back Wooster summers growing up. As did living into the reality of my mom's declining health. And Father's Day. How fitting Phil was here over Summer Solstice weekend, when the heat and humidity made it feel like summer. Maybe I decided not to turn the air conditioning on in honor of the fact that my parents only put central air conditioning in the house *after* the last of us had left for college. (Can I ask what *that's* all about??

We spent hours playing "War," that mind-numbing, no-strategy, endless card game where the high card wins. If it weren't boring enough, we'd make it *more* tedious by not dealing out one deck among all the players but having *each person* start with their own deck. But it was fun for us, which was all that mattered.

"Bike hikes" were essential summer fun. Once or twice a week, my friend, Mark, and I would head off after breakfast and spend all day biking to little towns outside Wooster. The absence of anything like really busy roads meant there were no limits where we could go. We learned where the best soft-serve twist cones were in any direction. No consulting of Yelp ratings needed! ... The most ambitious was an overnight at a campground at Mohican State Park when we were in junior high. We felt *so* adult and *so* responsible.

Summer was hamburgers, corn on the cob, gallons of iced tea, real tomatoes (as opposed to the ones we get most of the year that Garrison Keillor says were "strip-mined down in Texas) – all enjoyed on our back screened-in porch. I swear one of the things that sold me on the house I live in now is because it has one of those. But it's in the front, which, as an adult, I love even more than a backyard one.

When I was in junior high I started mowing lawns to earn money. I remember biking home from a lawn-moving job on Saturdays. I tried to time my return for the start of the Cleveland Indians afternoon game. As I cooked boxed macaroni and cheese and a couple hotdogs and threw some Fritos corn chips on my plate, I'd listen to the game on the radio ... hoping my team wouldn't be behind by more than two runs before I sat down to eat.

Evenings were pickle or kick-the-can. Sitting in the basement (with its dehumidifier, the only cool room in the house) watching "Hawaii Five-0" (totally my favorite show growing up), "Maude," "The Waltons," "All in the Family," "M*A*S*H," "Sonny & Cher," and "Cannon." I'd always run upstairs and grab a bowl of ice cream or cereal during the last commercial break before seeing how Steve McGarrett was going to apprehend the criminals and restore safety to the 50th state for at least another week.

Both sets of grandparents lived in Southern California, so some summers we'd get into our old VW bus and make the trip ... a week-long operation in a vehicle with only 53 horsepower! Kids stayed free at Holiday Inn, and those had a pool, so the day was always better when we knew that was our destination come evening.

The first weekend in August was always the Shull Family reunion: two nights in bunkbeds at a Church of the Brethren Camp in northern Indiana. My great aunt Lois would always write a play for us kids to act out. As I remember, the last one she did one of our characters fell in love with a camel ... maybe it made sense to *her*!

It's these kinds of rhythms that gave summer some shape while leaving things open for surprises and new adventures. *cont'd on p. 3*

Tuesday Bible Study to Begin Look at Book of James on Zoom

The Tuesday afternoon Bible study is beginning to explore the Letter to James. It's a book which Martin Luther described as "a right strawy epistle." He believed it totally contradicted the teachings of Paul which had been so essential for Luther's own transformation and which he felt formed the essence of grace. It was one of the last books accepted into the collection that became the New Testament partly because it seemed to differ from Paul's writings. The main reason was because it wasn't clear that it was written by someone who had known or met **Jesus**, so its "apostolic origins" were in doubt. At the same time, James has some of the clearest statements about what love and justice look like in action that exist in any of scripture.

This will be the group's "summer dive" for 2020. If you have Tuesday afternoons free, join us. We are a group of people who are both serious about listening for the Spirit's voice in the text and in each other and serious about supporting each other through whatever we're going through -- and who laugh deeply and often. And it's so hard to have to stay away when more than anything I want to see them."

from your growing up. And may you create some new ways to enjoy this season, and share joy and love like you've never imagined before.

Columbus Public Health Offers Free COVID-19 Drive-Thru Testing, Insurance Not Required

Columbus Public Health (CPH) announced last week that free, drive-thru COVID-19 testing is now available at its 240 Parson Ave. location. Anyone with symptoms can now receive a test from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Health insurance is not required.

"Testing is critical to preventing the spread of COVID-19 and helps save lives. If you're sick, it's important to get a test as soon as possible to protect yourself, your loved ones and the community," CPH said in a release. The service is offered through a partnership with Mount Carmel, OhioHealth and the Ohio State University (OSU) Wexner Medical Center.

A doctor's referral is not required, however registration and appointments are recommended. Community members can call CPH at 614-645-1519 to register or for any questions. Those who test positive will be contacted by a public health employee who will ask questions about where they have been and who they were in close contact with as part of the contact tracing process.

In addition to the CPH location, eight other community sites are offering varying levels of free testing in Columbus as well as one in Whitehall.

- **Capital Park Family Health Center**, 2365 Innis Rd. Hours: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Monday-Wednesday, 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday. The location offers screening as well as testing. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is not available.

- **King-Lincoln Medical Center**, 750 E. Long St. Hours: 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Monday-Friday. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is available.

- **KIPP Columbus**, 2900 Inspire Dr. Hours: 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday-Thursday. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is available.

- Lower Lights at Mt. Carmel West, 777 W. State St. Hours: 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday only. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is available.

- **PrimaryOne** at St. Stephens Community House, 1500 E. 17th Ave. Hours: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is available.

- **PrimaryOne Health** at the Health and Wellness Center, 2300 W. Broad St. Hours: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is available.

- **PrimaryOne Health** at the John R. Maloney Family Health & Wellness Center, 1905 Parsons Ave. Hours: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is available.

- **PrimaryOne** on Agler Road, 3433 Agler Rd. Hours: 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is available.

- Whitehall Family Health Center, 882 S. Hamilton Rd. Hours: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Monday; 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday; and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Wednesday-Friday. A physician referral is not required; however testing is by appointment only. Drive-through testing is not available.
