

Remembering Those for Whom Six Feet Feels Like a Mile

A half-hour after finishing the adult education class on Zoom Sunday, May 24, I was in my car with the windows down, singing along to my favorite CD of the band "Mumford & Sons" that I was playing vacation-loud. I was on my first vacation for over six months, and I felt glorious. I was off to spend the next week with my brother, sister-in-law, and niece in Arlington, Virginia, and with my good friend, Mark, who is the ex-husband of the sister of my former partner. (The Germans would have one word for such a person, I'm sure!)

I was going to be the first non-relative either of these families had had in their homes since COVID-19 began. We had talked about that. All of us felt like we'd been responsible keeping ourselves healthy. None of us lives or works closely with those who are listed as at-risk populations. We decided we could visit with each other because we trusted each other and had a long history of doing that.

It was a glorious week.

And one of the things I realized made it most glorious was eating at the same table with someone or someones. Right next to someone. Over the past 2+ months, I've eaten six feet from someone a couple of times. Otherwise I have eaten every meal since mid-March by myself. ... this the person whose all-time favorite passtime, as you probably know, is sharing three-hour meals and conversations with someone. So when Mark and I had dinner Sunday evening the 24th, sitting at the same table, as friends do, I felt human again. That's the best adjective I can come up with. Yes, I was *happy* and *grateful*. But the deepest truth about how I felt was that I felt *human*. As God says after making all kinds of non-human companions for Adam and realizing none of them offers Adam what he needs, *It is not good for the human one to be alone* (Genesis 2.18). I believe God made us for connection (at least some of the time!). And when we go too long without connection that we long for, part of our humanity dies.

So sitting at the table with Mark, with one of his sons and his daughter – a nephew and niece I used to see at least twice a year when Peter and I were together ... sitting at the table with my brother Phil, my sister-in-law Jill, and my niece Kristen ... never before have I realized what an incredible blessing it is just to be around a table *together*. Not so far apart we feel like we're in different counties. It's what humans do.

I absolutely understand the need for social distancing when we don't know where people have been and with whom. I absolutely understand wearing masks when you're out. I did that the entire time I was on vacation. And if you are around people who are vulnerable, if you yourself are vulnerable, of course you wouldn't do what I did on vacation.

And ... do friends who don't live together, or family members who don't live together, stay six feet apart from each other and never touch until there's a vaccine? Do we treat all those whom we don't live with as strangers, no matter how much we trust each other when we say we've been living COVID-safe lives? Or can we be responsible and still do what I did that week I was away? Can we trust those we are close to, come together with them, and, especially for those who live alone and feel like six feet is as good as a mile, help each other feel human again.

Since coming back from that trip on May 30, I have included in my morning prayers all those who feel lonely during this long season of minimal contact and no touch.

But for those who do not sit at table with others and would like to, for those who miss having anyone else in the car, for those who miss simple human touch ... I say a prayer for safe closeness, for safe ways to feel whatever helps you feel human. Because when it is not good for the human one to be alone, the minimal six feet of social distancing can feel like a mile.
