Reflections on *White Fragility* by Michele Disbro

Recently, a group stemming from the summer book study and the Justice Team met over Zoom to discuss **Robin DiAngelo's** book, *White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism.* This book dug into the concept of racism and why people struggle to discuss it. First of all, one must understand three important terms: **Prejudice** is a pre-judgment about another person based on the social groups to which that person belongs (p.19). **Discrimination** is action based on prejudice (p.20). **Racism** is a system of advantage based on race (p.24). This system is controlled by those in power through legal authority and institutional control. Throughout the book, DiAngelo reminds us that we are all prejudiced and discriminate. As a white person, we benefit from so many societal constructs that we can't help but be racist. Unfortunately, people think of racism as a good/bad issue so how can we call someone a racist who is a good person?

DiAngelo encourages us to let good of this good/bad dichotomy and instead transform our fundamental understanding of racism. She challenges us to change our assumptions and shares a long list of new attitudes for us to embrace. Here are a few of her attitudes/assumptions she encourages us to adopt:

- Being good or bad is not relevant.

- Racism is a multi-layered system embedded in our culture.

- All of us are socialized into the system of racism.

- Racism is complex, and I don't have to understand every nuance of the feedback to validate that feedback.

- Giving us white people feedback on our racism is risky for people of color, so we can consider the feedback a sign of trust.

- The antidote to guilt is action.

- Racism hurts (even kills) people of color 24-7. Interrupting it is more important than my feelings, ego, or self-image. (p.142-143)

With these assumptions in mind, when someone challenges our racism, we need to breathe, listen, and reflect. We need to build up our stamina and replace our white fragility.

Food Giveaway Set for Thursday

Redeemer's next scheduled monthly food giveaway in cooperation with Lutheran Social Services (LSS) and the Mid-Ohio Food Cooperative is this **Thursday, May 28** beginning at 2 p.m.

It will be a drive-through giveaway that was implemented in April. Some volunteers will meet at 1 p.m. to set-up while others are asked to arrive by 2 p.m. to bag the food.

Volunteers are asked to bring masks and water.

Update on LSS Food Pantry

Kathy Zwanziger provides this update on what is happening with the food pantry and with those needing food in light of the pandemic: First, an additional thank you to **Kathy Mimlitch** and **Michele Disbro** who worked at the food pantry in April on separate days.

In a recent virtual meeting, Ben Powers from LSS made the following points:

- 1) If volunteers are not feeling well: stay home!
- 2) Temperatures are taken at the door.
- 3) Hand washing/sanitizing is required.
- 4) Masks must be worn.

Not too surprisingly, the food pantry is experiencing a significant increase in demand: about 25 percent of their clients are new. The pantry is two-three weeks behind where the grocery stores are; since they had purchased a great deal of frozen meat earlier, they are still able to give out meat (but expect that will decrease). Unfortunately, with fewer volunteers (to facilitate physical distancing), food is prepacked and all boxes are the same 25-30 items; there is no choice. Larger families do get an extra bag of food. (In the future when choice is re-initiated, the pantry will again need more volunteers.)

As reported in *Reflections*, Faith in Whitehall (and other churches) are sponsoring food drives to help the pantry. The most needed items are grape jelly -15-17 oz. squeeze bottles [NOT glass jars], black beans (15.5 oz.), diced tomatoes (15.5 oz.), and mandarin oranges (11 oz.).

Of course, the other way to continue to support the pantry is financially. A check can be written to LSS with "pantry" in the memo line (and sent to LSS, 500 W. Wilson Bridge Road, Ste. 245, Worthington, OH 43085) or an online donation to LSSNetworkofhope.org. A \$1 donation purchases \$5.25 of food.

Thank you all for the help you have given in the past. Remember this is just one way to be a neighbor, especially at this time.

In case of rain, it will be moved inside to a space large enough for safe distancing.

Bishop Eaton Issues Pastoral Message on COVID-19 Racism, White Supremacy

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ — 1 Corinthians 12:12

Dear church,

Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

During the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic, I am encouraged by your resilience and creativity in our witness to the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. I am also inspired by your generosity. Through the ELCA COVID-19 Response Fund and our Daily Bread grants, we are providing critical support to struggling yet vital ministries across this church. Through Lutheran Disaster Response International we have intensified our accompaniment of global partners. *We are church together*.

This is a trying time for us all. At the same time, we know that a disproportionate burden of illness, death, discrimination and harassment falls on communities of color. This pandemic has exacerbated racism and racial inequities deeply entrenched in society and across the church. We see this in the growing anti-Asian racism and the disproportionate number of deaths in black, American Indian and Latinx communities. I have been learning from the leaders of the ELCA's ethnic associations how the data we see on the news is experienced in real life. I have listened to leaders of color share the impact of this pandemic on their communities -- on their lives and on their ministries. These stories are difficult but important, so we are launching a special series on <u>www.LivingLutheran.org</u> to lift up these voices for us all to hear. We also seek to ensure that our COVID-19 response more effectively tends to the realities of racism and racial inequality. *We are church together*.

Recently, in cities across this country, we have seen horrifying anti-Semitic and white supremacist messages displayed during public protests against government orders that are intended to protect lives. No matter our politics or opinions about our elected leaders and their policies, all of us must come together on the basis of our church's commitments to condemn racism against indigenous people and people of color, white supremacy, sexism, and anti-Semitism whenever they occur. Whether our churches and communities are racially diverse or predominantly white, our work for racial and economic justice for all people is work for all of us. *We are church together*.

Just as God has joined us to the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ in baptism, we are joined to each other. Paul helps us to understand this by speaking of the one body of Christ, with many members. While this is always true, perhaps we feel it more acutely in this time of physical distancing. In our longing to be church together, let us be even more intentional in sharing with each other, easing each



other's burdens, consoling each other in our fear and grief, condemning what is contrary to the gospel and living out our baptismal covenant "to strive for justice and peace in all the earth."

ODA Starts New Program to Keep in Touch with Seniors

To help ensure that older Ohioans stay connected while staying at home, Ohio Department of Aging (ODA) Director Ursel McElroy recently announced a new service to provide a daily check-in by phone for Ohioans age 60 or older.

The "Staying Connected" program will call older adults who sign up for the service during a predetermined window of time. When participants answer the phone, they will be asked to respond via touch-tone to confirm that they are OK or to access live support.

If no one answers after three attempts, a call is then made to an alternate contact (if provided) or to non-emergency services.

"Staying Connected" can be cancelled at any time.

"Especially during this very challenging time, we encourage older Ohioans to sign up for the Ohio Department of Aging's Staying Connected phone program. This program will help reduce isolation and support the health and well-being of older adults in our state," said Robert Cornwell, executive director of the Buckeye State Sheriff's Association.

"Staying Connected" is not an emergency response service and participants should always use 9-1-1 or their emergency response system if they are injured or in need of emergency assistance.

ODJFS Announces Unemployment Expansion through CARES Act

The Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) announced Wednesday the rollout of Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA), a federally funded program stemming from the CARES Act that will expand unemployment benefits to individuals affected by COVID-19, including those who have been diagnosed with the disease and family caregivers.

Others who can receive PUA but cannot receive traditional unemployment benefits include selfemployed individuals, 1099 tax filers and part-time workers. In addition, parents of children who cannot go to school because of COVID-19 can receive PUA. There is no minimum income requirement.

"The benefit amount will be similar to traditional unemployment benefits plus an additional \$600 per week," according to ODJFS. The additional \$600 per week will be available from March 29, 2020, through July 25, 2020.

The benefits will last for up to 39 weeks, but not past Dec. 26, 2020, and are retroactive until the earliest date someone is eligible, as early as Feb. 2, 2020.

Funding for PUA was provided through the federal coronavirus response package, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act.

ODJFS Director Kimberly Hall said in a news release, "We appreciate everyone's patience as we diligently worked to build this new system in record time for the agency. We encourage anyone who believes they may be eligible to apply. Even after you return to work, you still may be eligible to receive retroactive benefits, dating from as early as Feb. 2."

According to the department, more than 1 million unemployment claims have been filed in the past seven weeks, more than the previous three years combined.

Someone can receive PUA if they are in one of the following situations:

- The individual has been diagnosed with COVID-19, or is experiencing symptoms and is seeking medical diagnosis.

- A member of the individual's household has been diagnosed with COVID-19.

- The individual is providing care for a family member or member of the household who has been diagnosed with COVID19.



- A child or other person in the household for which the individual has primary caregiving responsibility is unable to attend school or another facility is closed as a direct result of the COVID-19 emergency, and the school or care is required for the individual to work.

- The individual is unable to reach the place of employment because of a quarantine imposed as a direct result of the COVID-19 public health emergency.

- The individual is unable to reach the place of employment because a health care professional has advised him or her to self-quarantine due to COVID-19 concerns.

- The individual was scheduled to commence employment and does not have a job or is unable to reach the job as a direct result of COVID-19.

- The individual has become the breadwinner or major support for a household because the head of the household has died as a direct result of COVID-19.

- The individual has quit his/her job as a direct result of COVID-19.

- The individual's place of employment is closed as a direct result of COVID-19.
