

Lessons from Geese: Standing by Each Other in Difficult Times

Editor's Note: The following is reprinted from the Children's Defense Fund's *Child Watch Column* by Marion Wright Edelman who credited Angeles Arrien in a 1991 speech.

Fact 1: As each goose flaps its wings it creates an "uplift" for the birds that follow. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew alone.

Lesson: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

Fact 2: When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose we stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help and give our help to others.

Fact 3: When the lead goose tires, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies to the point position.

Lesson: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership. As with geese, people are interdependent on each other's skills, capabilities and unique arrangements of gifts, talents or resources.

<u>Fact 4</u>: The geese flying in formation honk to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

Lesson: We need to make sure our honking is encouraging. In groups where there is encouragement, the production is much greater. The power of encouragement (to stand by one's heart or core values and encourage the heart and core of others) is the quality of honking we seek.

Fact 5: When a goose gets sick, wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with it until it dies or is able to fly again. Then, they launch out with another formation or catch up with the flock.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as geese, we will stand by each other in difficult times as well as when we are strong.

The Redeemer Community Stepping Out into the Community

Redeemer's two-year-old race conversations group, after discussing *White Privilege* earlier this spring, has decided it is time for us to imagine stepping outside the walls of the church to engage larger communities around these issues.

As a result, two Zoom conversations have been scheduled with people who have worked on a couple areas we want to learn more about so we might decide if we'd like to invite you all to engage in these specific areas of anti-racist work.

On <u>Wednesday evening, August 19</u>, we will have a Zoom conversation with Suellen Bennett, the recently-appointed health equity supervisor in the Columbus Health Department. She will speak with us about the ways this pandemic has only made more obvious what people in the health field have known for decades: that people of color are far more at risk to be sick and die of preventable illnesses and conditions than white people. She will talk with us about how church communities and organizations might partner to address this injustice toward our neighbors in meaningful ways. The Tuesday Bible Study on the Letter to James resumes on <u>Tuesday, August 18</u>. This is the book which Martin Luther believed totally contradicted the teachings of Paul which had been so essential for Luther's own transformation and which he felt formed the essence of grace. It was one of the last books accepted into the collection that became the New Testament partly because it seemed to differ from Paul's writings. The main reason was because it wasn't clear that it was written by someone who had known or met Jesus, so its "apostolic origins" were in doubt. At the same time, James has some of the clearest statements about what love and justice look like in action that exist in any of scripture.
