The Continuing Quest for Economic Justice

We know how devastating COVID-19 has been to the lives of working people around the world. In this country, the June unemployment report showed that nearly 18 million Americans were out of work. We learned this past Thursday that just shy of 1.2 million people filed first-time claims for jobless benefits last week.

On this Labor Day, I think of those who want to work and cannot. Some in our Redeemer family have lost jobs because of the pandemic. They are facing all the realities that not having work when we want to work confront us with. Those trained to work in tourism, travel, and areas that revenue from large groups of people patronizing them have found finding new work almost impossible.

Aside from allowing us to pay our bills and maybe have a bit left over for something special, work offers dignity, meaning, and a sense of being a blessing to the world. The history of labor unions is one of giving workers the power they need to be treated with respect, and to have rights like reasonable work hours, a livable wage, health care, some kind of economic security during periods of unemployment and after retirement, compensation for on-the-job injuries, and grievances when employers try to force them to do things they shouldn't have to.

This morning, I re-read a speech by **Samuel Gompers**, an immigrant from the United Kingdom who helped found the American Federation of Labor in 1886. In a speech on May 1, 1890, in Louisville, KY, to rally support for the eight-hour work day, Gompers offers words that 130 years later still remind us of how far our country has to go to provide basic rights to those whose labor we so often take for granted.

Here is some of what he said that strikes me as a challenge that still faces us as a nation:

[T]he toilers of England, Ireland, Germany, France, Italy, Spain, and Austria [are] defy[ing] the manifestos of the autocrats of the world and say that on May the first, 1890, the wage-workers of the world will lay down their tools in sympathy with the wage-workers of America, to establish a principle of limitations of hours of labor to eight hours for sleep, eight hours for work, and eight hours for what we will. ...

The man who works the long hours has no necessities except the barest to keep body and soul together, so he can work. He goes to sleep and dreams of work; he rises in the morning to go to work; he takes his frugal lunch to work, he comes home again to throw himself down on a miserable apology for abed so that he can get that little rest that he may be able to go to work again. He is nothing but a veritable machine. He lives to work instead of working to live.

My friends, the only thing the working people need besides the necessities of life, is time. Time. Time with which our lives begin; time with which our lives close; time to cultivate the better nature within us; time to brighten our homes. Time, which brings us from the lowest condition up to the highest civilization; time, so that we can raise [all] to a higher plane. ...

Council Reports on Finance Changes

Larry Trover has dedicated many, many hours these past years to the church's finances, and has been serving as Redeemer's treasurer in recent years. He had let leadership know late last year that he wanted a break. Brad Phillips had also asked that this be his last year as financial secretary. As you may remember we were never able to recruit someone to act as finance officer this year. Early in the year (prepandemic!) council had approved a motion to contract with Donald Wells, CPA, to analyze our systems for payroll, cash disbursements and cash receipts and make recommendations for financial policies. This sort of analysis was also recommended in last year's audit.

Then Larry got COVID-19, and suddenly the only person who knew the system for writing checks was (and is) unable to do that job. Council has been kept up to date on Donald Wells' work (which was completed), and the possibility that we would recommend in next year's budget that we transition to his firm doing part or most of our bookkeeping with appropriate sign off by officers on payments through online banking. Given Larry's health and a long road to recovery, and his wish to stop at the end of the year, council voted to begin the transition now.

The cost for Donald Wells services is very reasonable and it is more and more difficult to recruit three people for these financial positions. We recognize that it will take time to work with this transition, and we regret that we were not able to meet together to discuss this topic with the congregation. But the pandemic forced our hand and we were lucky that the analysis was complete and a transition was on council's radar.

Our heartfelt thanks to Larry, who spent considerable time with Donald Wells during the analysis, and to Brad Phillips for his input as well. During the transition which will likely become active after October 1, **Julie Johnson**, vice president, will fill Larry's responsibilities and therefore will not sign contracts or checks during the transition.

Thank you for your continued support in helping feed those in need. A Sloppy Joe recipe from **Kathy Mimlitch** is as follows:

2 lbs lean ground beef (or ground turkey)

1/2 cup chopped onion

1/2 cup chopped green pepper

1 tsp garlic powder

2 tsp prepared yellow mustard

1 1/2 cups ketchup

6 tsp brown sugar

Salt and pepper to taste

In a medium skillet over medium heat, brown the ground beef, onion and green pepper. Drain off liquids. Stir in garlic powder, mustard, ketchup and brown sugar. Mix thoroughly. Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. This makes 12 servings.

The green pepper can be omitted while the ketchup can also be mixed with barbecue sauce. The brown sugar can be almost doubled for a sweeter batch.

The Continuing Quest for Economic Justice cont'd from p. 1

You know that it is the theory of our government that we can work or cease to work at will ... It is true that we can cease to work when we want to, but I deny that we can work when we will, so long as there are a million idle men and women tramping the streets of our cities, searching for work. ...

What we want to consider is, first, to make our employment more secure, and, secondly to make wages more permanent, and, thirdly to give these poor people a chance to work. The laborer has been regarded as a mere producing machine ... but back of labor is the [human] soul ... and honesty of purpose and aspiration

In the age of electricity and steam that has produced wealth a hundredfold, we insist that it has been brought about by the intelligence and energy of the work[ers], and while we find that it is now easier to produce, it is harder to live. ... [W]e shall never cease to demand more until we have received the results of our labor. ...

The Tuesday Bible study just finished reading the Letter of James. In it, James says, "For listen! Hear the cries of the field workers whom you have cheated of their pay. The cries of those who harvest your fields have reached the ears of the LORD of Heaven's Armies" (James 5.4). It is one of many passages in the First and New Testaments that speak of God's anger when employers do not pay workers fairly.

This Labor Day week, when we interact with someone delivering a package, bagging our groceries, teaching our child or grandchild at preschool, working with us on a helpline, or doing home health care for a loved one, let us be aware of the important work they're doing, and ask ourselves how much they're getting paid compared to those who run the company they're working for and those whom they're serving. Let us thank them for the work they are doing. And let us be aware of legislation that seeks to provide a livable wage for those who work more than fulltime and still can't afford to rent a substandard apartment in Columbus. Economic justice was central to Jesus' message. As his followers, so must it be to us.
