How Virtual Worship Becomes Intimate This Advent/Christmas

I don't know about any of you, but our two in-person worship services on Sept. 27 and Oct. 11 spoiled me. Even though there were some meaningful things we *couldn't* do, being together in the same place at the same time brought me so much joy. Then Franklin County went to COVID red ... and now we are COVID purple. And we love you too much not to do our part to keep you safe.

The Worship Team met on Zoom last Monday evening to talk about worship for Advent and Christmas. Full disclosure: We didn't start with a tremendous amount of energy. I think most of us were struggling to imagine a live-streamed Christmas Eve service with six people in the sanctuary feeling like anything but a let-down.

But the Holy Spirit succeeded in lighting a fire from our sodden kindling. By the end of the meeting, we were excited by the possibilities.

First, on <u>Wednesdays</u>, <u>December 2</u>, <u>9</u>, and <u>16</u>, at 7:30 p.m., we will live-stream our Holden Evening Prayer service. We've done this service for years at Redeemer. It continues to offer an experience of joy, calm, and beauty. This year our pianists will bless us with even more music to bring alive the promise of this season. If you have a story, poem, or essay that has been a gift to you during this deeply challenging year, please let me know. You can share it at one of the services, or I can read it.

Second, on Christmas Eve: we're going to bring you the best of two virtual worlds. From 7-7:30 p.m., you are all invited to join a Zoom gathering. At that time, we will all be able to see and offer greetings to each other. Through a simple setting, the person/family who speaks is enlarged, so we can get a good view of everyone. At 7:30 p.m., the Christmas Eve service will be available to watch on YouTube. This isn't a live-streamed service. It will be a video with lots of participants who have recorded their parts in advance. So you will see members of the Redeemer community you haven't seen in quite a while. Included in this will be the world premiere of a new Christmas pageant starring Redeemer families. And you will hear Christmas carols that you can joyfully sing along with at home.

At the end of the taped service, we will return to Zoom. We ask all of you to light a candle on Zoom and darken the room you're in, so we can feel like we're back in the sanctuary together, challenging the dark with our light. A solo voice will then lead us in "Silent Night."

If you would like to do a reading that you would pre-record for the Christmas Eve service, please let me know.

Finally, on <u>Christmas morning</u> at 10 a.m., we will gather on Zoom for a service of carols, sharing stories of Christmas, and simply enjoying the chance to share this morning with people we love. Because you're at home, you can still be in your pajamas with your favorite beverage and some wonderful Christmas morning edible.

I cannot thank the creative souls at last week's Worship Team Zoom meeting for giving their imaginations and spirits so much room to soar. We hope you will join us for these services of worship. And celebrate the ways you are part of this remarkable body of Christ.

Ways to Make Christmas Real for Some Neighbors in Columbus

Pastor Dave reports that he recently heard from **Grant Eckhart**, who leads Jacob's Porch, the ELCA campus ministry at Ohio State University. Grant is inviting congregations to provide Christmas gifts to several refugees in Columbus who are facing unimaginably lonely and terrifying circumstances. The Outreach Team at Redeemer has talked about Grant's request and wishes to share it with you for your consideration and your prayers. The descriptions below are written by Grant.

#1: Two kids fled Honduras earlier this year with their mother after their father was murdered and their lives were in danger. They made it to the U.S. border, seeking asylum, but were immediately turned away and sent to the camps in Mexico near the border. Tragically, they were abused there, and the mother made what must have been a gut-wrenching choice to send the two kids across the border as unaccompanied minors because they had a better chance of getting into the detention facilities on the U.S. side. They were received into the U.S. system, were assigned a caseworker, and spent many months in the U.S. facilities. Sadly, those facilities were not much better, and again they were subjected to some terrible experiences.

Ultimately their caseworker let them leave in the custody of a woman who runs a nonprofit here in Columbus. Since September the children have been living with a caring family and making regular phone calls to their mother in Mexico, who is now seeking asylum there (which is apt to take six-12 months). However, one member of that family got COVID, was hospitalized, and was recently sent home for hospice care. So the family can no longer house and care for these children.

We have now found another family that is willing to take the two kids. They are a family with a big heart but not much money and have already adopted four other children with various disabilities related to fetal alcohol syndrome. So we are inviting you to purchase a gift for any of these four children as well.

#2: A man from Ghana fled his homeland seven months ago because he was being persecuted for his sexual identity. He entered the U.S. and was immediately detained by ICE in California. Because of a COVID outbreak at his detention facility, he was allowed to leave with an ankle monitor. He came to Columbus, where his cousin and sister live in an apartment. However, the sister has lost her job, and the cousin makes minimum wage, so the man has asked for money to buy winter clothes, with anything extra going for food or rent. I spoke to the referral hotline in California to vet this situation. The agent there said that the man had been helpful in translating English for other immigrants in ICE detention, and she believes he is sincere. After speaking with him, I believe the same. These situations move fast, and

typically all the details are not known immediately. I am hoping to find at least several hundred dollars for him to buy some clothing. If that goes well and we get to know him further, we may seek further assistance.

The man's asylum case will be called here in Columbus on <u>December 23</u>. If you would like to contribute to his needs, please send Visa cards, gift cards, or checks made out to Jacob's Porch with "Mission outreach/Ghana" in the memo line.

Individual names have been withheld in both of these situations because of the sensitivity of the cases. If you have questions, please contact **Pastor Dave**.

LSS Reports on 'ThankFULL Holiday 2020'

Lutheran Social Services (LSS) reports that across its entire Food Pantry network it held 14 events in 10 days in 10 different counties. Holiday meals were provided to 2,678 households – an increase of 6 percent over last year. In addition, a total of 84 tons of food was distributed.

Specifically in Delaware and Franklin counties, there were five events; 1,260 households served; 43,695 pounds of produce, 23,232 pounds of holiday bags and 16,000 pounds of turkey distributed.

Applications for the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) program are now being accepted, for the 2021-2022 program year.

This program is for young adults ages 21 to 29 and begins in August 2021. Participants will be placed in one of the country programs, with the list of participating countries possibly changing due to the COVID-19 situation.

Through YAGM, young adults will learn what it means to serve in a spirit of accompaniment as they walk alongside global church companions. They'll become immersed in a new community and form deep relationships. And they'll confront issues of wealth and poverty, racial privilege, gender privilege, economic disparity and globalization, all through the lens of faith.

Christ United Methodist Church Learning Extension Center Program Seeks Volunteers

Christ United Methodist Church is seeking volunteers to help with its Learning Extension Center as well as students who might be interested in participating. No teaching background is necessary.

The center, established in partnership with Columbus City Schools, is intended to support students in the community by providing a safe and quiet learning space with Internet access and guidance from caring adult volunteers.

It runs from 1 to 3:30 p.m. every Tuesday and Thursday. Lunch is provided from 12:30 to 1 p.m. with an optional Bible lesson following. The center is working closely with the principal and some teachers from the neighborhood Scottwood Elementary School, assuring that the students are following the standards in the curriculum. Already several students are coming to the center.

The center is being operated according COVID-19 guidelines: all volunteers and students have their temperature checked when entering the building. Everyone is required to wear a mask except when eating or drinking. "The kids are not always completely compliant with this but this is a work in progress!" All students are at least six feet apart. Volunteers attempt to maintain that distance from the students "but that has been challenging when they need more help. As we are learning more about how the online learning works we are not needing to be so close to them. But when we are trying to look at what they are doing on the computer we are definitely not able to stay six feet away. So there is obviously some risk but we are trying to minimize it. We will know everyone who is there every day so if someone does become ill we can easily do contact tracing. And we are not around any other people in the building."

The three students currently participating are all family members and are around each other every day, making social distancing less important. That will not be the case as more students come.
