Espinal Leaves Sanctuary, Returns Home; Vargas Seeks to Follow

This past week, **Edith Espinal**, who had lived in sanctuary at the Columbus Mennonite Church for 40 months as she sought to avoid deportation and separation from her family, was able to return home. According to **Mennonite Pastor Joel Miller**, "This is an answer to months and years of prayer. It's a result of Edith's patience and persistence, and the support of this congregation and wider community."

As a result, **First English Pastor Sally Padgett** reports that this coming Tuesday, **Miriam Vargas**, who has been in sanctuary at First English for over two years, will also meet with officials from the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to work out a similar arrangement.

This step for both women is possible, according to Miller, under new federal administration directives which has found that Espinal ... and presumably Vargas ... are not a priority for removal from the country. Espinal is now under an order of supervision, which Miller says is a fairly standard arrangement.

Espinal, shortly after the Biden administration took office, had applied to ICE, along with a number of others in sanctuary, for a stay of removal, an official pause to her order of deportation. Miller reports that was denied but ICE followed up, suggesting an alternative path forward, but that required her reporting in person, which she did on February 18.

Espinal will now check in monthly with her ICE case manager which involves sending a picture of herself tagged with GPS through an app. Every four months she will do an in-person check-in.

"In the meantime, she is able to live at home, shop, dine and move about without being monitored, travel outside the state and get a work permit. This also gives her time to continue pursuing a more permanent status," Miller said.

"Although there are no guarantees, we are quite optimistic that she is not under threat of detention or deportation under this administration.

"Edith was in sanctuary 40 months. With Lent just beginning, I'm mindful that this is a season of 40 days, mirroring Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness and the Israelites' 40 years in the desert. After 40 years comes the promised land. After 40 days of Lent comes Easter. After 40 months of sanctuary comes a new found freedom and family reunion. ... We're all celebrating resurrection a little early this year."

February Council Update

Church Council President Julianne Johnson reports that Council met last <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>February 16</u> via Zoom. They discussed how Redeemer could begin to regather for worship.

A smaller group will meet to ensure that systems and processes are in place, and agreed that initially only 10 people will be able to come each Sunday on a RSVP basis. More details including which Sunday this will start will be coming soon.

Council also reports it has received some very positive results from livestreaming the worship services. A small group is working on what will need to be done to make this a regular feature of Redeemer's ministry going forward.

Almost all of Redeemer's sound system is a patchwork of older technology so they are looking at technology updates as well as a small area in the sanctuary where a person could be while livestreaming the service. More to come on that topic.

Giving was down in January - at the lowest level since pre-COVID lockdown, though sometimes consistent with January giving. **Margie Frazier** presented the financial report, which still needs a couple areas clarified for future meetings. The report was a year-to-date, rather than only for January. Working with **Donald Wells** continues to be very helpful.

ELCA Touching Lives: Immigration, Refugee Services

One of the programs of the ELCA is **Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services**, or LIRS. It oversees refugee resettlement, foster care services, family reunification, and more.

Thinking back over the past few years and a campaign promise from 2016 about building a wall, it's not hard to imagine how important LIRS is. We've heard stories on the news about families being separated at the border after they had finally managed to cross into the United States following long and dangerous journeys. Often these families left violent homelands to journey to the U.S., only to be violently torn apart. The parents might be sent back home, if they make it at all; the children often are sent over the border alone, then placed in "protective custody," which might mean jail-like facilities where they sleep on the floor among strangers. It's great to know that our national church, working with the U.S. government, is trying to reunite families. That process takes time; children can be placed in foster care while the parents are being sought.

Several years ago I worked with a class of immigrants with CRIS -- Community Refugee and Immigration Services -- that met at Redeemer. We tried to empower the new (and sometimes not so new) immigrants by welcoming them and teaching them English. The students came basically from one of two regions: Cambodia and Thailand or Ethiopia and Eritrea. The daughter of one of the mothers from the first group is now a member at Redeemer (**Diane Louangrath**).

Teaching English to people who have never learned to read their own language is a challenge. I particularly remember a brother and sister from the second group of students. The brother had been a priest in his country, so he was literate in his language. When handed something in English to read, he was aware that the letters had particular sounds and meant something; he generally could read the paragraph. But when I would ask what it meant, all I would get was a broad smile. In contrast, his sister had to first learn the concept of letters and sounds before beginning to read. What a joy to see her quite by accident a few years later. She had learned enough English to get a job and communicate with her employers.

Imagine finding yourself in a country where you could not read the signs or understand the spoken language. How would you live? Consider how wonderful it would be to find a program like LIRS that would help you adjust to your new location by welcoming you and helping you learn the language, perhaps even helping you find a new place to live. We should be grateful that the ELCA provides such programs for immigrants.

Lent 2021: Who Are You Really?

As she reflects on the meaning of Lent, Benedictine nun **Joan Chittister** says, "Lent is about reaching back to remember who we are even while we keep on becoming more than we were."

Who are you? I mean, who are you really? What makes you you – something you deeply value, some experience that has shaped you, a person who has been a true mentor and guide for you, a story whose message continues to live in you and shape how you live in the world?

When was a time you lost touch with this essential part of yourself? What happened when you lost touch with this? How did you find your way back "home" to yourself?

When is a time you discovered that the *you* you thought you were became someone you had to let go of? Maybe you were trying to become someone that a person you admired wanted you to be, or someone you thought would be successful or popular. And at some point you realized you were chasing a fantasy. You realized that wasn't the unique *you* God created. So you had to let go of that false you ... and start to get to know the real you. What was it like to admit you'd lost touch with the real you ... and then try to discover yourself? What have you discovered?

What is one way you are changing these days? What is an area of growth, development, discovery, or curiosity that you find alive in you right now? How do you understand why, of all the ways you could be changing, you find yourself changing in *this* way?

If Sister Joan is right, and Lent invites us to reach back and remember who we are, even as we keep on becoming more than we were, these seem to be some of the questions Lent asks us to live into. Lent invites us to keep coming back to the way of Jesus. And Jesus wants us to come as we really are, not as we think he wants us to be or as we think we're supposed to be. We take the risk to look at ourselves as we really are. And we hear God's words saying to us what God says to Jesus at his baptism: *You are chosen and marked by my love, pride of my life.* That love comes first. That love frees us to look at who we truly are. And to practice loving that person. We admit the ways we fall short, the ways we harm others and ourselves, the ways we water down the call of the Gospel. *And* none of this changes what God says about us. Trusting we always are *chosen and marked by my love, pride of my life*, we can continue to become who we truly are, and continue to go deeper in the ways we walk beside this Jesus.

On Wednesday evenings at 7 pm, from February 24-March 24, Redeemer will livestream a service of sung evening prayer. There's a space for a five-minute reflection. Pastor Dave asks, "If any of the questions above grab you in any way, and you find yourself thinking or writing about them, I invite you to share your reflections at one of these services. These reflections have helped us get to know each other in meaningful ways. And they have led the speakers to discover truths about themselves they'd never known before. Please don't be bashful. Look at the questions above and see if there are a couple that take you somewhere. And please let me know which of these five Wednesdays you'd like to come into the sanctuary and share your reflection. There will only be a few people there, all masked and distanced. Let me know if you have any questions."

Sunday Adult Ed Class to Discuss Duncan Book on Feb. 28

The Adult Sunday Education Class will be discussing chapters one through eight of the book *Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the U.S.* on <u>Sunday, February 28</u> at 11:15 a.m. In the book, ELCA **Pastor Lenny Duncan** writes about some realities confronting our denomination that we won't want to face, but which we ignore at our own peril. He writes in a very accessible style. He clearly wants to wake us up. And he knows waking people up from sleep doesn't often feel very kind to those of us who wish to ignore painful truths. But throughout the book Pastor Duncan's motivations are clear: "Dear Church, this book is a love letter to you. I know at times it hasn't felt that way."

CHOICES Faces Funding Cuts

Lutheran Social Services' domestic violence shelter CHOICES reports that in in October, it experienced a \$170,000 cut in federal funding from the Victims of Crime Act grant (VOCA). In addition, the Ohio Attorney General's Office, which distributes the VOCA funding, has warned of another cut this year of up to 30 percent. This will result in a decrease in CHOICES services, the agency reports.

In 2019 Ohio became one of 33 states to provide support for domestic violence programs. The \$1 million budget annual allocation provided grants of \$17,800 to 47 residential programs that year and 69 grants of \$12,000 in 2020. This is simply not enough support for the program that last year received 4,057 hotline calls and helped nearly 1,800 victims rebuild their lives.

Domestic violence (DV) shelters around the state are advocating for a \$5 million appropriation in the state of Ohio budget in Fiscal Year 2022. This would bring Ohio's support for DV programs closer in line with other states. Among the 33 states that provide support to DV programs, Ohio's is the lowest on a per capita basis. Compared to surrounding states, Ohio spends 9 cents per capita, while Michigan spends \$1, West Virginia \$1.40, Pennsylvania \$1.49 and Kentucky \$1.50.

CHOICES provides temporary emergency shelter, a 24-hour crisis hotline, domestic violence counseling, legal advocates, peer support groups and community awareness building. To learn more about the programs or to donate directly, go to its website at https://lssnetworkofhope.org/choices/.
