



MAUNDY THURSDAY LITURGY

The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin for "commandment". This night, Jesus says, "Let me give you a new command: Love one another (John 13:34).

The Story of Jesus' Last Night with his Friends Selections from Mark 14.17-72

The Story, Part I

As it grew dark, Jesus arrived for the Passover supper with the Twelve. They reclined at table, and in the course of the meal Jesus said, "The truth is, one of you is about to betray me – one who is eating with me."

They were very upset at these words; one by one, they said to him, "Surely it's not me!"

During the meal, Jesus took and blessed the bread, broke it, and gave it to his disciples: "Take, this is my body."

Taking the cup, he gave it to them, thanking God. They all drank from it. He said, "This is my blood, God's new covenant, poured out for many people."

After supper, they sang a hymn and went directly to Mount Olives. Jesus told the disciples, "You're all going to feel that your world is falling apart and that it's my fault."



Peter blustered in protest, "Even if I have to die with you, I will never deny you." All the others said the same thing.

They came to an area called Gethsemane. Jesus told his disciples, "Sit here while I pray." He took Peter, James, and John with him. He plunged into a sinkhole of dreadful agony, and said, "This sorrow is crushing my life out. Stay here. Keep vigil with me.

Going a little ahead, he fell on his face, praying, "My Father, if there is any way, get me out of this. But please, not what I want. You, what do you want?"

He came back and found them sound asleep. He said to Peter, "Can't you stick it out with me a single hour?"
