The Joy of Return

If you were in the sanctuary for in-person worship Easter morning, maybe you are having the experience I am right now. I want to put into words what it felt like to be back in that space with a decent-sized group of people for the first time in over a year. And I can't seem to find a way to express what it was like that doesn't sound trite or over-the-top.

The first and last verses of our closing hymn come close:

Christ is alive! Let Christians sing. The cross stands empty to the sky. Let streets and homes with praises ring. Love, drowned in death, shall never die.

Christ is alive, and comes to bring good news to this and ev'ry age, till earth and sky and ocean ring with joy, with justice, love, and praise. (Brian Wren, "Christ is Alive! Let Christians Sing")

Feelings that these words and images stir in you might give you a sense of what it was like to be together.

And it was more.

Seeing how glad people were to be together again. Seeing people so wanting to hug. And seeing a few folks who checked to see if both had had their second vaccines and then gave each other brief but joyful hugs anyway.

Seeing Skye's gleeful sprint to the front of the church with the cross, and knowing it wouldn't require any effort to maintain social distance from her as she left me and assisting minster Karen Collins far behind her.

Hearing smaller versions of the chimes and senior choirs, ringing and singing us to this joyful return we found ourselves enfolded in.

Maybe that's it. In my message I quoted a German who created something called the theology of hope. Writing about the feelings I felt yesterday, and the feelings I think I saw on the faces and in the spirits of all of us there, Jurgen Moltmann writes: "The ultimate reason for our hope is not to be found at all in what we want, wish for and wait for; the ultimate reason is that we are wanted and wished for and waited for. ... Whenever we base our hope on trust in the divine mystery, we feel deep down in our hearts: there is someone who is waiting for you, who is hoping for you, who believes in you. We are waited for as the prodigal son in the parable is waited for by his father. We are accepted and received, as a mother takes her children into her arms and comforts them. God is our last hope because we are God's first love."

The joy we shared in our return to each other and to the Redeemer sanctuary felt like the Risen Christ was enfolding us, assuring us we are wanted and wished for and waited for. It was the joy of coming back home.

As you feel safe enough to return for in-person worship, please let Becky know so she can save a spot for you on our RSVP list. We will continue to livestream the services so you can continue to worship when and how is best for you.

And it was a joy to be back home together Easter. You are the best!

Please Write a Review

When the Redeemer website was updated recently, more attention was paid to how easily strangers can find our site. The website work group developed a description that incorporates a variety of common search terms and also discovered the importance of individual reviews. That's where you come in.

If you haven't already, please post a review of Redeemer to help others know why you've chosen to connect to this congregation. We included in the basic description terms like friendly, welcoming, and diverse. If you think those are accurate, we'd encourage you to use some of them in your own review.

To post a review, simply search for "Lutheran churches Columbus Ohio." A map will appear, along with a short list of possible Lutheran churches. If you click on "View all," a longer list will appear, but you will probably need to go to the second page of lists in order to find Redeemer. When you find it, just click on the church name or the review just below the name. Then scroll through the next screen to find the list of reviews. Click on the "Write a review" button, and follow the directions from there on.

This is a good opportunity for us to reach out to folks we don't yet know and share what it means to have a supportive church home. And happily, it's something we can all do -- both introverts and extroverts, and even in a pandemic.

2021 LSS/Food Collective Food Giveaways Begin April 15

Redeemer resumes its ministry to assist those in the community in need of food on **Thursday**, **April** 15. These food giveaways here at Redeemer are sponsored in conjunction with Lutheran Social Services (LSS) and the Mid-Ohio Food Collective (MOFC) and are set for the third Thursday of every month from April to October. That means Redeemer's first giveaway is scheduled for Thursday, April 15.

Demand for food assistance is still high, so this ministry effort shared with LSS and the Mid-Ohio Food Collective is even more important!

LSS/MOFC has said that it will continue to be a drive-thru process where customers stay in their cars and all of the physical distancing, hand washing, glove and face mask guidelines are followed.

In an effort to gauge Redeemer's volunteer staffing for these events, and especially the one on April 15, persons willing to help are asked to email or call the church office.

Redeemet's Impact Editor's Note: The following is one in a series of articles, prompted by Redeemer's Stawardship Communications Redeemer's Stewardship Committee, exploring what it means to be "church" here at James and Scottwood – and the "ripple effect" that has well beyond these boundaries.

"Oh, church? I've never been to one. What do you do there?" the restaurant cashier, a nice young lady, responded. I had just mentioned that we were on our way to church one Sunday morning in 2018.

Well, I mean, standing at the cashier's station, ready to leave the restaurant, you can't spend a whole lot of time discussing religion, can you? I think I said a few words about "community," "learning to love your neighbor as yourself," and "trying to understand and serve God." That's about it, in the time available then. But I often thought afterward, "What might I have said that would have quickly given her an understandable idea of why I go to church?"

Pastor Shull said afterward at the time what a surprising question to be asked, spur of the moment like that, and entirely an honest one, too. Like many in her generation might have asked. He said it's an encouragement for having a brief "elevator speech" thought out. Would be a great thing for us Christians to have in mind for such who ask, wouldn't it?

Of course, I wouldn't have even dared to get into the fact that not all churches are alike (by a long sight)! And that brings me to why I joined Redeemer and why I support it regularly even when I can't be there right now, support the wider church we're part of, and support the social service agencies of the church in these times that are so very hard for so many.

What I told the cashier wasn't too bad, I guess. It's certainly true for me. Redeemer shows the church is a community, and a wider community than many people in our country would accept. And in community we find friends, fellow humans of all kinds, we learn to love our neighbors as ourselves, and to be of service to one another and the world around us. The reasons we do this run back through the centuries, to Jesus and beyond, for encouragement. And we do not neglect to honor those of other religious or nonreligious persuasions who seek to guide their lives by humane consideration and nobler ideals that encompass all creation. After all, we are all making our way through this adventure we call life.

Council Adopts Worship Policies for Easter, Following Sundays

Council met recently and approved expanded capacity for worship services. It also approved beginning to open the building for small groups, with the caveat that safety measures such as requiring masks, social distancing, use of hand sanitizer, and other measures will continue to be followed.

For worship, Redeemer will allow 45 people at one 10 a.m. service. (Folks should call the church office to say they plan to attend worship.) If there is enough interest Redeemer will return to two services. The service will continue to be livestreamed.

For small groups meeting in April there will be limited areas that will be available. Each group will have to reserve a space, and the space will depend on the possible number attending. Contact the church office to reserve space. There are guidelines for using the space that groups will have to agree to abide by for the foreseeable future.

The Fellowship Hall and downstairs kitchen are not available due to air quality issues.
