An Update from RLC's Council President

It's an exciting time to be at Redeemer these days. Groups are starting to meet in person, food is being distributed through our monthly partnership with Lutheran Social Services and the Mid-Ohio Food Collective and weekly from our own community garden; we have new sound speakers and new cameras in the sanctuary, (with work on an Audio Visual Booth mostly done), basketball camp is underway, and plans are starting for the fall. Nothing is completely normal yet, but we are getting there. And we hear the occasional violin from our friends at Suzuki as well!

I sent out a letter about a month ago to let the congregation know about the technology project that is a 10-year investment in Redeemer's ministry, as well as work that needed to be done on the soffits, fascia, gutters and more on the educational wing. Part of the technology is installed but shipment of some equipment is still awaited. When that arrives in mid-July that work can finish and work can begin to design the software for Redeemer's use. I hear positive feedback from the faithful group of volunteers who have made sure our services were online throughout the pandemic. I am thrilled to report that the Special Funds Team has approved paying for the balance of this project from the Mary Kohler Funds. I think that it quite a legacy! There will still be a hefty balance in this fund for future use.

Council has approved the repair of the soffits, fascia and gutters and wood rot. The cost for this repair is over \$26,000, and the church had received a gift of \$10,000 just before we found out about that need. I'm pleased to report that we have received additional gifts – both large and small – that will more than cover this expense as well. We are getting the work scheduled now.

Each time I have served as your council president I have been amazed at the generosity of the Redeemer community – not just financial, but even more so in time and overall support. Last year and this year when council has had to make many decisions on the congregation's part without as much opportunity for feedback, I have trusted that you have kept us in your prayers and placed your trust in the people you elected, and you will support us if we faithfully work on your behalf. I feel your support.

There is much work still to do, but very much to be thankful for as well. I wanted to express my thanks to you all. I urge you to join us in the opportunities that abound here at Redeemer and to keep Redeemer in your prayers.

News from Redeemer's Livestream Team

Tom Mimplitch, Redeemer's "resident retired nerd," reports, "I believe I speak for my whole team of livestream producers, we are very excited about the upgrades to both hardware and software that council approved and all of you have supported prayerfully and financially. Thank you!

"We still have a lot of work to finish, but we are starting to see some results (literally). We have five new cameras mounted in the sanctuary, and three were used in livestreaming these last two Sunday services. The remaining cameras are just waiting to be connected to our network, hopefully very soon.

"These state-of-the-art cameras allow us to remotely control where they point and how close they zoom into the subject (up to 30X for you nerds out there). We set up camera 'presets,' so, for example, we can press #2 and the camera points to the lectern and zooms in for a closeup. Or we can press #6 and the camera points and zooms to the font at the back of the sanctuary.

"It is exciting to see what the various camera angles can do – but while livestreaming you always have to be planning the next shot. We try to position a camera ahead of time (while the camera is not 'live'), then we just switch over to it at the right time.

"Our team takes turns producing our livestream services, with a pilot and co-pilot assigned for each week. **Sue Yehling** and **Michele Disbro** will be producing next Sunday, as **Scott Steiner** and I did two Sundays ago. **We can always use more help and will train anyone interested.**

"I want to give a shout out to **Becky Trover** for all her work on the bulletins that tell us what is happening when. And also a shout out to **Kristi Hildebrand** who creates the great slide shows we use for five minutes before and after the services.

"In the next week or two, I will update you on the sound system upgrades."

Worship Team Seeks Input Regarding Fall Schedule

Redeemer has been having one 10 a.m. service since the Sunday after Easter. Right now attendance is averaging 38 people in worship. ***Being Mortal* Book Study Set for Wednesdays in July**

Beginning next week on **Wednesday, July 7**, **Pastor Dave** will lead a churchwide book study on **Atul Gawande's *Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End?*** He notes that issues of medicine and mortality have been front-and-center for the past 15 months. Since it's been on our minds, maybe now is a good time to dive into the broader questions about the role of medicine in our lives, particularly when it comes to the time when our lives are drawing to a close.

I'm also suggesting this because we're getting older. The people we love are getting older. So maybe it would be good to have a chance to dive into a really wise book that will make us wiser about matters that often leave us feeling overwhelmed and guilty, or matters we'd prefer to avoid entirely. And to do that deep dive with people we care about and people we can be honest around. One review of this book speaks to that: “[This book] is about our misguided approach to end-of-life care that causes unnecessary misery. It is about changes we must make in the way we treat and the way we think. Above all, it is about the need for relentless honesty, especially when we are afraid.”

When we can come to accept our mortality, we increase the likelihood that the process of our dying will be more peaceful. Unfortunately, the medical profession tries to hold out promises around this

that are little more than fantasies that keep us from facing what is real and making decisions that make a peaceful ending more possible.

This book invites us to learn how to make choices that are all about nurturing and maintaining our well-being.

So pick up a copy of this 2014 book that spent a year on the *New York Times* bestseller list and was chosen as a “best book of the year” by 29 publications and organizations. So, beginning **Wednesday, July 7**, let’s spend Wednesday evenings in July together, from 7-8:30 p.m. – hopefully in-person, if public health trends continue in positive directions. Please let me know you’re planning to join our conversations so I can have an idea of how many people to plan for.

To have a chance for honest conversations about a topic our culture loves to avoid is a great gift we can gift each other.

Noisy Offering to Go to ELCA Disaster Relief Program

Redeemer’s Noisy Offering – that offering of loose “or noisy” change made during communion – continues to be designated for the ELCA Disaster Relief Fund. Update from LSS

Lutheran Social Services (LSS) reports that while the community kitchen is not yet open, a new program has started: the Medical Respite at Faith Mission, supported by OhioHealth. This program provides a healing space for people who would typically be discharged home from the hospital but who don't have a home to go to. Instead, these patients will be discharged by OhioHealth hospitals to the medical respite where they can rest and recuperate.

Vaccination Clinic Set for July 6

Registration are now open for a free COVID-19 Vaccine Community Clinic that will be held on **Tuesdays, July 6** and **July 27** at Community Development for All People (946 Parsons Ave., Columbus 43206) from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. This is for anyone 12 years of age or older. Folks are asked to bring their IDs and insurance cards if they have them. “No one will be turned away.” This clinic is sponsored by the city of Columbus and Columbus Public Health.

While walk ins are welcome, appointments can also be scheduled by going online and copying/pasting this link bit.ly/CDVax76 for July 6 or bit.ly/CDVax727 for July 27 into the browser; calling 614-645-1519; or emailing health@columbus.gov. First doses of Pfizer and the Johnson and Johnson vaccines will be offered. Appointments for the second Pfizer dose will be scheduled when the first dose is received.

In other news, the drive-thru vaccine clinic at the Celeste Center will close on **Saturday, June 26**. In addition, the Columbus City Council voted to repeal the local mask order to align with new CDC and Ohio Department of Health guidelines. Those who have not been vaccinated should continue to wear a mask until fully vaccinated, especially when indoors “to protect yourself and others,” Columbus Public Health advises.

Free Lunches for Students Available at Columbus Libraries

For now, through **Friday, August 20**, free lunches are available for students at 15 library locations throughout the city. The lunches will be distributed as “grab and go” meals for kids to take home weekdays. The hours vary by location (and are all during lunch time except for the Barnett Branch which is 3-4 p.m.) so go to <https://tinyurl.com/xn9tj3cw> to check out the time for the branch library closest to you.

In Redeemer’s area, meals will be available at the Driving Park Branch, Barnett Branch, Main Library, Whitehall Branch and Reynoldsburg Branch.

The meals are made possible in conjunction with the Columbus Recreation and Parks Department and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

City Council Announces Financial Aid for Those Still Needing COVID-19 Vaccine

City Council President Pro Tem Elizabeth Brown and the Columbus Urban League have a new program to help residents access the COVID-19 vaccine.

“Finding time to get vaccinated can be tough for working families, and we want to help,” said Brown. “If we are going to end this pandemic, we need to address the real barriers that stand in the way of people getting the shot.”

Residents taking the one-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine are eligible to receive \$100. Those receiving the two-shot vaccines are eligible for \$50 for the first shot and \$50 for the second. To qualify, applicants must be Columbus residents, 12 or older, and get their vaccine after June 15, 2021.

According to Columbus Public Health, 49.77 percent of Columbus residents have received at least one dose of the vaccine, and 44.98 percent are fully vaccinated. Importantly, only one CelebrateOne zip code is over 50 percent vaccinated, and the lowest CelebrateOne zip code is only at 23 percent vaccinated.

The Columbus Urban League will act as the administrator and distributor of the program. Residents who are eligible may apply for their payments here: cul.org/vaccinegreen.

“We’re delighted to again partner with the city of Columbus and continue alleviating the financial losses suffered by people who contracted COVID-19,” said **Stephanie Hightower**, president and CEO of the Columbus Urban League. “We also applaud the idea of offering residents financial resources to break down barriers they face in protecting their long-term health. Not only shouldn’t you go broke because you got sick, you shouldn’t pay a penalty for trying to stay healthy. Many folks, particularly Black workers in jobs without paid time off, hesitate to schedule vaccinations because of lost wages or additional child care expenses. The City’s \$100 vaccination initiative makes compassionate sense and practical cents.”

Previously, Brown worked with the Columbus Urban League to launch the Right to Recover program, which has been extended throughout the remainder of 2021. The program provides one-time financial relief to low-income workers infected with COVID-19 to help them be able to afford to take the time off work to recover from the illness and avoid spreading it to others in their workplace and community. “Improving vaccination rates is the fastest way to stop COVID-19 -- but no access to paid time off or childcare can create barriers that prevent people from getting vaccinated,” Brown continued. “This financial support aims to bridge accessibility gaps to promote an equitable recovery for every person in every neighborhood, especially in neighborhoods that were disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 and continue to have vaccination rates under 50 percent.”
