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Spiritual *And* Religious

Sometimes we use a word without thinking a lot about what we actually mean by it. I think *spiritual* is one of them. When I meet someone and they find out I'm a pastor, it's not uncommon for them to say, "I'm spiritual but not religious." I usually respond by saying something like, "Tell me about that." I recently looked over some notes I took for a book I read almost a decade ago that gives me a better response. And that helps me understand more what I mean when I use that word. The book is *Naked Spirituality: A Life with God in 12 Simple Words* by **Brian McLaren**.

I find his insights about this frequently-spoken-but-just-as-frequently-misunderstood word to be so helpful that I want to share them with you. Let me know whether or not they resonate with you.

A lot of folks I meet feel a tension between spirituality and religion. "I'm not religious myself," they say, "but ...". Why does the word "religious" almost demand to be followed up by a "but" for so many people?

To find out, when I hear "but I'm spiritual," I often follow up with a question: "I'm curious. What do you mean by 'spiritual'?"

Four answers come up again and again, and each rings true in my own experience.

First, they mean that secular science, politics, and economics don't have all the answers for them. They believe life has a sacred dimension that can't be reduced to formulas, rules, and numbers. They believe we have hungers that can't be fed by facts alone, votes alone, or even the quasi-religious "invisible hand of the market" alone.

Second, they mean that organized religion doesn't have all the answers for them either. They're concerned that religious institutions are complicit in too many of the world's problems, and that they lead their adherents on too many adventures in missing the point.

Third, the word "spiritual" signals for them an inner sensitivity to aliveness, meaning, and sacredness *in* the universe. They can't in good conscience assign God, heaven, meaning, values, souls, worship, the afterlife, and eternity to the sacred category and consign everything else – including bodies, sexuality, work animals, plants, the earth, daily life, and history – to the profane. Instead of separating the two, instead of denying one in favor of the other, and instead of reducing one to the other, they want the former to infuse the latter, and the latter to be enlivened by the former. They want to marry God and creation, heaven and earth, soul and body eternity and history, afterlife and life, not divorce them.

Fourth, spiritual people seek practical ways to nourish that sense of integration and communion. It might be meditating, hiking, volunteering, doing yoga, going to art galleries, participating in festivals, or going on pilgrimages. It might be fasting, feasting, or having deep talks with a few friends. Whatever the specifics, spiritual

Pastor Dave notes that issues of medicine and mortality have been front-and-center for the past 15 months. Since it's been on our minds, maybe now is a good time to dive into the broader questions about the role of medicine in our lives, particularly when it comes to the time when our lives are drawing to a close.

I'm also suggesting this because we're getting older. The people we love are getting older. So maybe it would be good to have a chance to dive into a really wise book that will make us wiser about matters that often leave us feeling overwhelmed and guilty, or matters we'd prefer to avoid entirely. And to do that deep dive with people we care about and people we can be honest around. One review of this

book speaks to that: “[This book] is about our misguided approach to end-of-life care that causes unnecessary misery. It is about changes we must make in the way we treat and the way we think. Above all, it is about the need for relentless honesty, especially when we are afraid.”

When we can come to accept our mortality, we increase the likelihood that the process of our dying will be more peaceful. Unfortunately, the medical profession tries to hold out promises around this that are little more than fantasies that keep us from facing what is real and making decisions that make a peaceful ending more possible. This book invites us to learn how to make choices that are all about nurturing and maintaining our well-being. To have a chance for honest conversations about a topic our culture loves to avoid is a great gift we can gift each other.

News from Redeemer’s Livestream Team

Tom Mimplitch, Redeemer’s “resident retired nerd,” reports, “I believe I speak for my whole team of livestream producers, we are very excited about the upgrades to both hardware and software that council approved and all of you have supported prayerfully and financially. Thank you!

“We still have a lot of work to finish, but we are starting to see some results (literally). We have five new cameras mounted in the sanctuary, and three were used in livestreaming these last two Sunday services. The remaining cameras are just waiting to be connected to our network, hopefully very soon.

“These state-of-the-art cameras allow us to remotely control where they point and how close they zoom into the subject (up to 30X for you nerds out there). We set up camera ‘presets,’ so, for example, we can press #2 and the camera points to the lectern and zooms in for a closeup. Or we can press #6 and the camera points and zooms to the font at the back of the sanctuary.

“It is exciting to see what the various camera angles can do – but while livestreaming you always have to be planning the next shot. We try to position a camera ahead of time (while the camera is not ‘live’), then we just switch over to it at the right time.

“Our team takes turns producing our livestream services, with a pilot and co-pilot assigned for each week. **Sue Yehling** and **Michele Disbro** will be producing next Sunday, as **Scott Steiner** and I did two Sundays ago. **We can always use more help and will train anyone interested.**

“I want to give a shout out to **Becky Trover** for all her work on the bulletins that tell us what is happening when. And also a shout out to **Kristi Hildebrand** who creates the great slide shows we use for five minutes before and after the services.

people have – or at least wish they had – some set of moves, rhythms, habits, or practices that, to some degree at least, keep them from sleepwalking or going on autopilot, so they live with a greater sensitivity to the sacred aliveness and meaning that surround them.

The truth is that these four characteristics of spirituality are also at the heart of true religion, as the etymology, or origin, of the word “religion” makes clear. The root of the word is “lig-”, which is seen in the word “ligament”. It means to connect, to join together, to unite, to bring everything together in one body or one wholeness. And of course “re” means “again”. So you might say that good religion is about connecting us together again. Most deeply, it is about binding us together into one body with God, acknowledging that different religious denominations and families have different ways of describing and relating to God. It is also about bonding and uniting us again with one another and with all creation (pages 13-14).

How much do any of these observations sound familiar as you live your own life of faith? I'd love to hear what this brings up for you! If you'd like to go for a walk or have a coffee or cold drink, please be in touch.

Columbus Fire Stations Distributing Free Gun Locks

Fire stations across the city are now distributing gun locks, free-of-charge, to Columbus residents. "We are all aware that the number of gun-related incidents among young people has increased," said **Councilmember Mitchell J. Brown**. "In the last year, there were several incidences of children being injured by another child due to the improper handling of a firearm

Just recently, an 11-year-old boy was seriously injured by a 14-year-old family member who was looking at a parent's gun.

The first six months of 2021 have seen over 100 Columbus residents losing their lives, with approximately 92 percent of those deaths being a result of gun violence, the city's news release said. "Alarmingly 31.7 percent of the victims and 37.5 percent of the suspects have been under the age of 22. While we believe a number of the guns involved in these shootings have been ill-gotten, we would like to think that if the weapons were stored properly or disabled by using a gun lock, there would be fewer weapons available to commit gun-related offenses.

"Gun locks provide another level of safety by securing guns when not in use. The gun locks being purchased are made from a braided steel cable with a keyed padlock."

"This is a proactive step to changing the narrative of young people continuing to injure and killing other young people with firearms," said Brown. "We are in a race to stop this tragedy from recurring again. Love our children; lock your gun."

These gun locks are available to any Columbus resident, no questions asked, at all Columbus fire stations between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

First doses of Pfizer and the Johnson and Johnson vaccines will be offered. Appointments for the second Pfizer dose will be scheduled when the first dose is received.
