

Unforgotten

Yesterday I was talking to someone at church who said they'd spent the last week bingewatching all four seasons of the PBS series Unforgotten. Since I watch so little TV, I'm always excited when I've even heard of a show that someone says they watched. So you can imagine how thrilled I was because I've actually seen the first three seasons of it! As we discussed the first three seasons (and as I kept warning her not say *anything* about the fourth season I haven't watched yet!), both of us kept using all these superlatives to describe the acting, the complexity of the storylines, and the writer's ability to fill the plot with twists and turns that make it impossible to guess who the killer is. And we talked about the deep humanity of the police officer who tries to make sure no one remains unforgotten.

Detective Chief Inspector Cassie Stuart runs a branch of the London police department that investigates cold cases. For example, the city is building a new highway. As the bulldozers are digging up earth that hasn't been disturbed for 30 years, they uncover a suitcase that happens to have a body in it. So Cassie and her officers swing into action. What drives Cassie and her team is a sense of justice rooted in empathy. They know that for the past 30 years, some people, some where have been hoping against hope that their missing loved one would turn up. Or they've spent the past 30 years certain the person they loved walked out on them, or committed suicide, or died accidentally. They try to imagine the hell these people have been through, not knowing what happened to this person they loved so much. They know someone is sure they've gotten away with murder – literally. And they know that mocks the dignity of the one who has been killed. So DCI Stuart and her team do everything they can to uncover the truth of what happened.

The loved ones almost always feel *some* sense of relief from finally knowing this truth. But you can imagine all the disruption that comes by police suddenly asking questions about a case that several decades' old. Friends of the dead who had been friends with each other but who may not have seen each other for years are brought together again. Their lives had moved on, and yet now they are yanked back into a past they had hoped never to have to revisit – all for the sake of discovering truths that will change the name of the dead from *Forgotten* to *Unforgotten*.

If you like British mysteries, and enjoy spending time with deeply human, flawed, complex people, you could do a lot worse than check out the PBS website and watch the first of the four seasons of this show.

I was first drawn to the show because I love the lead actress, Nikola Walker. And because of the title. Honoring those who have been forgotten with the name Unforgotten is what **God** is all about. Speaking to those who felt like God had abandoned them in exile in Babylon, God says through the prophet Isaiah,

> Zion says, "The Lord has forsaken me, my Lord has forgotten me." *Can a woman forget her baby, or disown the child of her womb?* Though she might forget, I never could forget you. See, I have engraved you on the palms of My hands..." (49:14-16).

It turns out *Unforgotten* is a name God gives all of us. Try it on. See how it feels.

Pastor Dave notes that issues of medicine and mortality have been front-and-center for the past 15 months. Since it's been on our minds, maybe now is a good time to dive into the broader questions about the role of medicine in our lives, particularly when it comes to the time when our lives are drawing to a close.

I'm also suggesting this because we're getting older. The people we love are getting older. So maybe it would be good to have a chance to dive into a really wise book that will make us wiser about matters that often leave us feeling overwhelmed and guilty, or matters we'd prefer to avoid entirely. And to do that deep dive with people we care about and people we can be honest around. One review of this book speaks to that: "[This book] is about our misguided approach to end-of-life care that causes



unnecessary misery. It is about changes we must make in the way we treat and the way we think. Above all, it is about the need for relentless honesty, especially when we are afraid."

When we can come to accept our mortality, we increase the likelihood that the process of our dying will be more peaceful. Unfortunately, the medical profession tries to hold out promises around this that are little more than fantasies that keep us from facing what is real and making decisions that make a peaceful ending more possible. This book invites us to learn how to make choices that are all about nurturing and maintaining our well-being. To have a chance for honest conversations about a topic our culture loves to avoid is a great gift we can gift each other.

Columbus Fire Stations Distributing Free Gun Locks

Fire stations across the city are now distributing gun locks, free-of-charge, to Columbus residents. "We are all aware that the number of gun-related incidents among young people has increased," said **Councilmember Mitchell J. Brown**. "In the last year, there were several incidences of children being injured by another child due to the improper handling of a firearm

The first six months of 2021 have seen over 100 Columbus residents losing their lives, with approximately 92 percent of those deaths being a result of gun violence, the city's news release said. "Alarmingly 31.7 percent of the victims and 37.5 percent of the suspects have been under the age of 22. While we believe a number of the guns involved in these shootings have been ill-gotten, we would like to think that if the weapons were stored properly or disabled by using a gun lock, there would be fewer weapons available to commit gun-related offenses.

"Gun locks provide another level of safety by securing guns when not in use. The gun locks being purchased are made from a braided steel cable with a keyed padlock."

"This is a proactive step to changing the narrative of young people continuing to injure and killing other young people with firearms," said Brown. "We are in a race to stop this tragedy from recurring again. Love our children; lock your gun."

These gun locks are available to any Columbus resident, no questions asked, at all Columbus fire stations between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Registration is now open for a free COVID-19 Vaccine Community Clinic that will be held on **Tuesday**, **July 27** at Community Development for All People (946 Parsons Ave., Columbus 43206) from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. This is for anyone 12 years of age or older. Folks are asked to bring their IDs and insurance cards if they have them. "No one will be turned away." This clinic is sponsored by the city of Columbus and Columbus Public Health.

While walk ins are welcome, appointments can also be scheduled by going online and copying/ pasting this link <u>bit.ly/CDVax727</u> for July 27 into the browser; calling 614-645-1519; or emailing <u>health@columbus.gov</u>. First doses of Pfizer and the Johnson and Johnson vaccines will be offered. Appointments for the second Pfizer dose will be scheduled when the first dose is received.

For now, through **Friday, August 20**, free lunches are available for students at 15 library locations throughout the city. The lunches will be distributed as "grab and go" meals for kids to take home weekdays. The hours vary by location (and are all during lunch time except for the Barnett Branch which is 3-4 p.m.) so go to <u>https://tinyurl.com/xn9tj3cw</u> to check out the time for the branch library closest to you.

In Redeemer's area, meals will be available at the Driving Park Branch, Barnett Branch, Main Library, Whitehall Branch and Reynoldsburg Branch.

The meals are made possible in conjunction with the Columbus Recreation and Parks Department and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.
