## When Getting There Is NOT Half the Fun!

It's because I leave for a three-week getaway the day after I'm writing this that I'm thinking about the last vacation of this length that I took. It was almost exactly three years ago. And while the Cunard travel agency became famous (and wealthy) trying to convince us *Getting there is half the fun*, even the most adventurous traveler could never describe my experiences of getting there *or* coming back as *fun*.

I was flying to France to spend a week biking with a long-time friend around Bordeaux, and then about two weeks visiting a college friend who lives in Lyon. It was my first flight out of CMH since I moved here in August 2017. My itinerary was Columbus to Chicago, Chicago to Dublin, Dublin to Bordeaux. I'd given myself three hours for making my connections, which certainly would be more than sufficient.

We took off from Columbus on the one-hour flight to O'Hare over two hours late. This is why I only travel with carry-on luggage. At O'Hare, I needed to go from Terminal 1 to Terminal 5 for my Aer Lingus flight. By the time I got through security at Terminal 5, I had five minutes to make my flight to Dublin. I was in line for yet *another* security screening when someone with an Irish accent shouted, "Is there a Dublin passenger in line?" I screamed, "Here!" probably deafening the person in front of me for life. I was going to make my flight! The Aer Lingus person ordered, "Move to the front of the line." I got through security, grabbed my backpack, and ... then my shamrock-clad savior tells me the plane has left the gate. So off to United customer service in, you guessed it, Terminal 1 to see how else I might get to Bordeaux.

The United clerk took pity on me. She found a Lufthansa flight going through Frankfurt that would get me to Bordeaux only an hour after my original flight. I did a little Irish jig. Her fingers danced over the computer keyboard that was my pathway to really starting my vacation. Then her face took on that expression you *never* want to see from someone who holds your life in her hands. She said, "The computer thinks you're on the flight to Dublin. So I can't book you on another flight." I must have looked like I was about to cry. She picked up the phone and pushed some buttons. She waited a while and hung up in disgust. "No one's answering at Aer Lingus. Yours was their last flight for the night so they've all gone home."

An hour and two supervisors later, the computer let go of its certainty that I could be in two places at the same time. With a fresh boarding pass in hand, I head for the Lufthansa gate. And even have time to stop at McDonald's for a soft-serve cone. Try telling anyone I don't know how to celebrate!

The flight is uneventful. Then an hour outside of Frankfurt, one of the pilots makes an announcement: "Though it's against regulations, a passenger on this flight opened the container her cat was traveling in. The cat has gotten away. Please

## **Looking Ahead to Fall**

A couple things about scheduling the rest of the summer and fall.

Redeemer's attendance for in-person worship leads the Worship Team and council to decide **to stay with one 10 a.m. worship service through December**. "All of us felt strongly that we enjoy the vibrant feel of more people in worship. And we know any visitors will sense that we are a more vital, healthy congregation when they see more people in a service. We'll look at in-person attendance numbers later in the fall and see what they indicate."

Also: Redeemer's traditional five-evening **Vacation Bible School**. Because younger kids can't be vaccinated, and the church is not yet ready to open Fellowship Hall to groups, it was decided this summer to offer **a full-on KidFest out on the lawn on Sunday, August 29 from 2-4 p.m. Please invite younger folks you know to come.** (See separate story, this issue.)

The Education Team is also responding to feedback from parents and so are planning for **one Sunday School gathering each month for children and youth** that will engage them in a wide variety of ways and not ask for weekly commitments from adults who are still feeling stretched in so many ways.

According to **Pastor Dave**, "We continue to need to be nimble, creative, and willing to do things in ways we haven't imagined before. As the people are about to leave their long exile in Babylon, God proclaims, 'I'm doing a new thing! Don't you see?' We ask you to try on the new things we are offering this fall, as we seek to be the most faithful body of Christ we can be."

## **Good Neighbors Picnic Coming Sept. 25 to Wolf Park**

The Good Neighbors Picnic will be held this year on **Saturday, September 25** at Wolfe Park on the east side of Columbus. Redeemer members and friends are invited to begin donating new or gently used blankets and cold weather clothing and accessories to help provide for our homeless brothers and sisters in the Columbus area.

This all-day event was started in 1999 by Redeemer member **William McCully** along with a few volunteers as part of the National Make a Difference Day. On the day of the Good Neighbors Picnic, volunteers work to provide a day of celebration including food, music, games, books, family photos, crafts, and shopping at a Free Store for blankets and winter clothing. In 2019, close to a thousand guests, men, women, and children of all ages from local shelters, were transported to the park for this day of celebration and fun.

Redeemer, along with other faith organizations, community leaders, local businesses and organizations will work to gather in items for those who are homeless or in shelters.

Donations may be placed in the bin located in the Narthex. Cash donations or gift cards are welcome and may be dropped off at the church office.

## Reconnecting by Connie Criswell



What a joy it was to see that the Redeemer community is still alive and vibrant after I'd been absent for over a year! It felt like coming home the first time I attended a worship service at Redeemer, after staying away due to the COVID-19 lockdown and restrictions. As I looked around the sanctuary, with its beautiful stained-glass windows and handmade hangings, it seemed like I'd never been away. The wording of the service and the music by our superb musicians were so familiar, yet so comforting, as was the presence of friends I hadn't seen for months.

Reconnecting after a long time of enforced separation is not always easy, especially after the rigid rules of social distancing and disinfection that we endured this past year became second nature to avoid exposure to the virus. Going to a store or a doctor's appointment required planning and vigilance, and meeting friends was put on indefinite hold. It's amazing how we can become accustomed to living in a strange new way.

Since I don't have a cell phone or Zoom capability, the tri-weekly "Staying Connected" emails from Redeemer and the occasional notes and phone calls from the Care Committee and **Pastor Dave** became my lifeline. I was glad to see that younger and/or braver members continued to serve those in need with the LSS/Mid-Ohio Food Bank produce giveaways and the First English meals. In addition, the IT Group made marvelous improvements in the sound system and online broadcasting of services, so those of us who were "temporary shut-ins" were not completely excluded.

Yet after the long separation, it is so good to be back, and to participate in making a joyful noise unto the Lord!

Not only has Lutheran Disaster Relief responded to the COVID-19 pandemic here in the United States but it has also responded in places around the world, most notably now turning its attention to the coronavirus outbreak in India where it works with partners and companion churches throughout the country. They are supporting communities by distributing food and hygiene kits, conducting livelihood training for migrants, sharing information about COVID-19 and promoting prevention practices.

look around your seats to see if you can find the cat.” We laugh. Such an amusing little event. Forty-five minutes later, the pilot makes the same request, this time with an edge to it.

We land. Frankfurt is a huge airport. I have an hour-and-a-half to make my connection. Then we hear our gate has another plane at it. So we pull over to wait. Then the pilot makes a third announcement: “International aviation regulations prohibit anyone from leaving the plane until we find this cat. Please keep looking!” You’ve never seen a crowd’s mood shift so rapidly. This 747-full of people are even looking in the seat pocket in front us as we’re cursing the cat’s owner and all her relations.

Fifteen minutes later our gate opens. But no cat. So we sit ... for 45 minutes. Fearing a riot, the pilot finally lets us leave the plane. Acting like the Ugly American, I sprint through customs and to my gate ... just when the door down the jetway was about to close.

My time in Bordeaux and Lyon are fantastic.

At the Lyon airport for my flight to Dublin, the Aer Lingus people tell me I can’t carry on the carry-on bag I’ve carried on flights for the past 20 years. So, I have to check it in. The Dublin to Toronto flight leaves a half hour late. But that still means I’ll have 2-1/2 hours to make my connection in Columbus. Even if I have to go to baggage claim before customs since they made me check my backpack, things should be fine. I do feel *some* anxiety, though. Mine is the last Columbus flight that night ... and the next morning I am picking up a U-Haul at 8 a.m. ... so seven friends can help me load it up and move me into my new house in Clintonville ...

We get to Toronto an hour late. Two hours for baggage claim, customs and the trip to the gate for my Columbus flight should be plenty of time. Except when it takes 75 minutes to get my backpack. And 25 to get through customs. I looked on the airport map to see where the gate for my Columbus flight was. It was so far away I think it had a different weather system and was in a different time zone. Again, the Ugly American sprint, another security check, panting as I get to my gate, greeting by the clerk who says with smile, “Thirty seconds later we would have left without you.”

Now, as I prepare to leave my house for CMH at 4:30 Monday morning to begin my vacation, I hope my travel experiences are such a joy that, as I walk to through the airport to meet my ride, I’ll be singing at the top of my lungs, *Getting there IS half the fun.*
