Opening Ourselves to Hearing Something New

When I did a series of messages on the Lord's Prayer earlier this summer, I had us read a version of the Lord's Prayer we weren't familiar with. It was written in the late 1980s by **James England Cotter**, a priest in the Church of England. He wanted to expand on some of the phrases in that prayer so we might hear them in fresh ways.

This is the version, with a slight adaptation I've made, noted in brackets:

Eternal Spirit,
Earth-maker, Pain-bearer, Life-giver,
Source of all that is and that shall be,
Father and Mother of us all,
Loving God, in whom is heaven:
The hallowing of your name echo through the universe!
The way of your justice be followed by the peoples of the world!
Your heavenly will be done by all created beings!
Your commonwealth of peace and freedom sustain our hope and come on earth.
With the bread we need for today, feed us.
In the hurts we [inflict and the hurts we] absorb, forgive us.
In times of temptation and test, strengthen us.
From trials too great to endure, spare us.
From the grip of all that is evil, free us.
For you reign in the glory of the power that is love,
now and for ever. Amen.

Fifteen people gathered for the adult class after we read that prayer together. Most of the people in that class had very positive things to say about that prayer. People found the new images brought the familiar words and phrases alive for them in ways they'd never experienced before. Some said they appreciated the way it brought in language for God that wasn't exclusively male. Others said they'd never understood what it meant to talk about God "in heaven," since that makes it sound like a geographical location no one can locate. So when this version states, "Loving God, in whom is heaven," they find that avoids this issue while it offers a compelling vision of God holding all that is, including all who have died.

Some appreciated the way it starts with language that speaks to the different energies of the Trinity and does so using images that spark the imagination. A few said they weren't sure what "trial" was being addressed in the version we use which states, "Save us from the time of trial." They didn't know if this refers to a last judgment or what. They really liked what Father Cotter does with this:

In times of temptation and test, strengthen us.
From trials too great to endure, spare us.

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: *Love Your Neighbor*

- * We strongly encourage all people to wear masks in worship and in other larger group settings.

Don Luck to Discuss Jesus as 'Son of God'

Don Luck, professor emeritus of systematic theology at Trinity Lutheran Seminary is presenting a four-part exploration of the person and significance of **Jesus** that reflects contemporary biblical and theological scholarship and that reaches beyond popular assumptions by many both within and outside the Christian community. The Adult Education sessions started this past Sunday and run from 11:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. following the Sunday worship service in Room 2 and on Zoom. Here are the themes he will be addressing over the next three weeks:

September 19: Re-introducing Jesus as 'Son of God.' What happens when we begin not with a divine reality ["the Eternal 'Son'"] but the thoroughly human Jesus and some Jewish assumptions? Dr. Luck points to Jesus "here on earth" in order to properly understand references to "the Son" who came "down from heaven."

September 26: Re-introducing Jesus and the Trinity. Because Jesus and God are firmly linked, Christian language about God gets complicated. The result sounds like an exotic – if not irrational – mathematical formula to be taken "on faith." Dr. Luck will explore the meaning of God's "tri-unity."

October 2: Re-introducing Jesus and Non-Christians. Numbers of informed voices in the Christian community are challenging St. Cyprian's assertion that "No one can have God as Father without having the Church as Mother." Find out why and how.

An Update from Jill Disbro

Daughter of the congregation, **Jill Disbro**, who has been on internship from seminary over the past year, shared the following update:

“Greetings, Redeemer! As you know, this past year I was on internship at Our Redeemer Church in Garden Grove, CA. It has been a wonderful year, even during COVID. Being in Southern California we were able to meet outside for worship during most of the pandemic and eventually in our sanctuary as well. I got a lot of great practice preaching and leading worship, leading Bible Study, and working with our Grief Support Group. I also got to work with a nearby Spanish-speaking congregation, where I preached several times in Spanish and worked with children and youth in the community. I learned a lot this past year and have really enjoyed getting to grow in the pastor role.

“I completed my internship last week and wanted to share a little bit of news about what is next for me. I just started working as the new director of admission at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary (the seminary I attended in Berkeley, CA)! In this position I am responsible for recruiting prospective students, walking with them as they discern, hosting discernment weekends and visit events here at the seminary, and much more. It's a called position and the previous director of admission was ordained into this role as a specialized ministry call. My hope is to pursue that path as well, although it is not a guarantee that this alternative path will be approved by the conference of bishops for ordination. Either way, though, I'm really excited for this opportunity to serve the seminary and contribute to the way the seminary is training leaders for the future of the church. Just in my first few days, I've really been able to feel like I'm in the right place at this time in my ministry journey.

“Thanks to all of you for your continued support and prayers. Redeemer has been such an important partner for me in this path, and I'm grateful for all the ways the church and individuals have supported and encouraged me financially, emotionally, and spiritually. Many blessings on the coming months as we all continue to adjust to ever-changing COVID realities. You are all in my heart and prayers.”

Carol Heacock reports that Sister Act traditionally participates in a service project for its September activity. "This year, we are leaving the choice to each individual sister. We have all been given a multitude of gifts, which we can readily share with others. Let us, each one, decide how we want to celebrate and show our gratitude to our Lord for His gifts to us by doing something for a friend, family member, or a stranger.

"Maybe *Being Bold* [Sister Act's theme for the year] means serving in a way you've never tried before. Maybe *Being Bold* for you is reaching out to someone you don't know very well, but you sense could use a friend. Use your creativity, if you see someone and sense a need, think about what you could say or do to show the Love of Christ."

She provides the following ideas:

- "Maybe you have a family member or neighbor who doesn't get out much, you could pick up a mum for their porch.
- "Years ago, a friend was going through a difficult time, so a group of us wrote quotes, Bible verses, and loving comments and filled a jar. Each day for a month, she pulled out a slip of paper with words of encouragement.
- "**Michele Disbro** shared that her parents, on their 50th anniversary, each guest was asked to write a memory and share it with them. Her mom and dad collected all these notes and each day, would pull one out, read the memory and pray for the person writing the note
- "It doesn't need to be something that takes a lot of time; intentionally smiling at a person you pass, noticing a clerk's nametag and thanking them by name, and donating gently used winter clothes to the Good Neighbors Picnic.

Redeemer's Noisy Offering – that offering of loose "or noisy" change made during communion – continues to be designated for the ELCA Disaster Relief Fund. Not only has Lutheran Disaster Relief responded to the COVID-19 pandemic here in the United States but it has also responded in places around the world, most notably now turning its attention to the coronavirus outbreak in India where it works with partners and companion churches throughout the country. They are supporting communities by distributing food and hygiene kits, conducting livelihood training for migrants, sharing information about COVID-19 and promoting prevention practices.

I explained the changes I made. The original version said, "In the hurts we absorb from one another, forgive us." That is a powerful confession that the traditional version doesn't include. But this doesn't include hurts we inflict; it says nothing about damage we cause. So I added the phrase "we inflict" and deleted "from one another." That speaks to both, while also include hurts we inflict on creation.

Because there was such a positive response to this version of the Lord's Prayer, I took it to the Worship Team to get their responses to it. Those members also felt it might open the congregation to some new understandings of this prayer and the God we worship. So they are asking us to use this prayer in worship the last Sunday of the month for the rest of the year. It will take the place of the traditional words in the communion liturgy.

We invite you to notice what it's like for you to pray these words. Pay attention to what phrases and images from it speak to you and what new meanings emerge. It will likely feel awkward at first because the words aren't familiar. All of us will have to read the words instead of praying them by heart.

Over these next four months, let the Worship Team know your responses to this prayer. And we'll make decisions about whether to continue using it next year. Members of the Worship Team are **Michelle Clemence, Karen Kent, Julie Larson, Don Luck, Kathy Rapp, Wendy Stoica** and me.

Thank you for your openness to exploring ways to keep our faith fresh and alive.

Lutheran Disaster Response Assists Following Hurricane Ida

The headlines are filled with the devastation from Hurricane Ida, which made landfall near New Orleans on Sunday, August 29 – exactly 16 years after Hurricane Katrina. As a strong Category 4 storm, Hurricane Ida's 150 mph winds, torrential rain and strong storm surge caused widespread flooding and wind damage in Southeastern Louisiana and coastal Mississippi. Homes were flooded and debris has clogged the roads. Strong winds knocked out power lines and electrical substations, leaving more than 1 million people without power, including the entirety of New Orleans. In some areas, electricity is not expected to be restored for weeks.

While Ida weakened into a tropical storm as it moved inland it also caused devastating heavy flooding in the Northeast.

The impact of Ida is yet to be fully assessed, but with a hurricane of this scale, rebuilding will be costly and take years. With extensive experience in accompanying communities throughout the relief and long-term recovery phases, Lutheran Disaster Response is working with local ELCA synods and Lutheran social service organizations to coordinate a response to Hurricane Ida. Immediate needs will include food, basic necessities and temporary housing. Long after the headlines change, Lutheran Disaster Response will continue to accompany communities on the journey of rebuilding their homes and lives.

Your gifts will support survivors of Hurricane Ida. Gifts to "U.S. Hurricanes" – which can be made online at <https://tinyurl.com/2fp5syvu> – be used in full to assist those affected by hurricanes until the response is complete. "We pray that God's presence will be felt in the midst of suffering and bring comfort to those who are hurting. Together, we can show our neighbors that they are not alone."
