A Reason to Mark Indigenous Peoples' Day

This past Friday, President Biden signed a proclamation declaring today, October 11, 2021, "Indigenous Peoples' Day." The declaration makes a confession we all know to be true: Our country was conceived on a promise of equality and opportunity for all people — a promise that, despite the extraordinary progress we have made through the years, we have never fully lived up to. That is especially true when it comes to upholding the rights and dignity of the Indigenous people who were here long before colonization of the Americas began. For generations, Federal policies systematically sought to assimilate and displace Native people and eradicate Native cultures.

One example of our nation's sin is the story of Chief Logan – someone I confess I'd never heard of until I came across him looking through *The American Reader: Words that Moved a Nation.* Here's what it says about Chief Logan and his story:

In 1774, a series of bloody incidents occurred between Native Americans and whites living in the Ohio River valley. According to an account by Thomas Jefferson in his *Notes on Virginia* (1784-85), white settlers were outraged by robberies committed by Native Americans. In retaliation, white soldiers killed many innocent Natives, including the family of Logan, chief of the Mingos, who was known as a friend of the whites. Led by Logan, the Natives launched a war against the white settlers, scalping a large number of innocent men, women, and children, but were finally defeated by the Virginia militia in October 1774. After the decisive battle, Logan refused to join the other chiefs who asked the victorious whites for forgiveness. Instead, he sent the following speech to Lord Dunmore, royal governor of Virginia. It was reprinted in the *Virginia Gazette*, in papers across the continent and even in Great Britain.

Thomas Jefferson reprinted the speech in his *Notes on Virginia*. He offered it as proof "of the talents of the aboriginals of this country, and particularly of their eloquence." He asserted "that Europe had never produced anything superior to this morsel of eloquence." The speech was a regular feature in school reading books throughout the United States in the 19th century, and was familiar to generations of American young people at that time.

The speech:

I appeal to any white man to say, if ever he entered Logan's cabin hungry, and he gave him not meat; if ever he came cold and naked, and he clothed him not. During the course of the last long and bloody war Logan remained idle in his cabin, an advocate for peace. Such was my love for the whites, that my countrymen pointed as they passed, and said, "Logan is the friend of the white man." I had even thought to have lived with you, but for the injuries of one man. Colonel Cresap, the last spring, in cold blood, and unprovoked, murdered all the relations of Logan, not even sparing my women and children. There runs not a drop of my blood in the veins of any living creature. This called on me for revenge. I have sought it: I have killed many. I have fully glutted my vengeance: for my country I rejoice at the beams of peace. But do not harbour a thought that mine is the joy of fear. Logan never felt fear. He will not turn on his heel to save his life. Who is there to mourn for Logan? – Not one.

Redeemer member **Jeff Montgomery** works with questions like this every day. Jeff is a social work supervisor at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Chillicothe. He is part of an effort to implement Trauma Informed Care within the VA nationally. You'll learn a lot more about what that is during these three weeks together starting on **Sunday, October 17**.

Dr. Gabor Mate is one of the foremost experts on trauma in the world. He says, "Trauma is not what happened to you. Trauma is what happens inside you, as a result of what happens to you." This means trauma has a lot to teach us.

That's why Jeff and **Pastor Dave** are inviting you to watch and discuss the film "The Wisdom of Trauma" during the 11:15 a.m. Sunday adult education hour on **Sundays, October 17, 24**, and **31**. Learning about trauma beyond our assumptions and beyond stereotypes gives us the ability to change the ways we treat each other as individuals and as groups so we're aware of how we can respond to people in the safest and most healing ways possible. Part of our discussion will be to discover the relevance of this movie to our ministries at Redeemer.

Memorial and Special Gifts Fund Information

The memorial and special gifts funds receive gifts given to RLC in memory or in honor of an individual/group and gifts other than usual contributions which are considered "Special" by the Congregation Council. The Fund may accept two kinds of gifts:

Unrestricted gifts - not restricted as to use by the donor

Restricted gifts - restricted to use by the donor

Memorial Gifts

Distribution Procedure:

The SFT shall announce to the congregation (at least annually) the purpose and availability of unrestricted gift monies in the fund, soliciting suggestions for its use. The SFT shall recommend to the Congregation council any distribution of the Memorial Gifts funds.

Special Gifts: Mary Kohler Ministry Fund

Applications for educational purposes and for new and existing RLC neighborhood ministries receive priority.

Distribution Procedure:

The SFT shall announce to the Congregation (at least annually) the purpose and availability of the monies in the fund and solicit suggestions for use. The SFT may recommend a distribution of funds to the Congregation Council. The funds are distributed at the direction of the Congregation Council.

LSS Issues 2021 Impact Report

Lutheran Social Services (LSS) issued its 2021 **Impact Report**, highlighting response to the pandemic as it sought to keep its programs open and safe for those seeking shelter, food, housing, safety and health care. As LSS President and CEO Stacy Martin noted, that was "no small task given the congregate living environments we have and the sheer number of people we serve. Our CHOICES shelter alone provided safety to 33 percent more domestic violence victims and their children.

"We have also spent time and resources this year on addressing racism through our anti-racism workgroup, with the goals of promoting education and understanding of racism with LSS employees, eliminating racial disparity and promoting equity in the LSS organization and advocating for racial justice in our communities.

"We also began what we term an ecosystem initiative, which is a network of LSS programs, services and people working together across the agency and in conjunction with diverse community partners to eliminate poverty by ensuring increased opportunities for individual households and challenging social structures that create and maintain poverty, especially in communities of color."

ODI Warns Ohioans about Medicare Scams

Department of Insurance (ODI) Director Judith L. French urges Ohioans on Medicare to guard against scams seeking their personal information when selecting 2022 coverage during the **Friday**, **October 15** to **Tuesday**, **December 7** open enrollment period.

"Fraud is rampant this time of year. Scammers know people are overwhelmed evaluating the different Medicare plans," French said. "I encourage Ohioans to learn how to best protect themselves and become more familiar with Medicare. As a consumer protection agency, we're closely monitoring the marketplace with our partners to protect Ohioans."

Ohioans should be on alert for fake Medicare communications seeking personal information or money in exchange for any of the following: to help with enrollment, to schedule health services, to sign up for a Part D prescription drug plan or Medicare health plan coverage, and to provide a new Medicare card.

How to protect yourself:

- Never give personal information, including Medicare, Social Security, bank account, and credit card numbers, to anyone who contacts you unsolicited by telephone, email, text, or in person, such as door-to-door sales.
- Medicare will never call you to sell anything, visit your home, or enroll you over the phone unless you called first.
- Medicare or Medicare health plans will only call and request personal information if you're a plan member or you called and left a message.
- Only give certain personal information to your doctors, insurance companies acting on your behalf, or trusted people in the community officially working with Medicare such as the department's Ohio Senior Health Insurance Information Program (OSHIIP).

Report fraud and predatory sales practices:

- OSHIIP partners with Ohio's Senior Medicare Patrol (SMP) to detect and report wrongdoing. The SMP provides education and response to reported Medicare fraud, waste, and abuse. Contact SMP at 800-488-6070.
- If you feel an insurance agent is using high-pressure, fraudulent, or dishonest sales practices, contact the department's Fraud and Enforcement Division at 800-686-1527 or the SMP.

For Medicare plan information and to enroll, visit www.medicare.gov.

To determine the license status of an insurance company or agent, go to www.insurance.ohio.gov. On the website, you'll also find an in-person and virtual OSHIIP Medicare Check-up Day events schedule. OSHIIP representatives are available at 800-686-1578 to answer Medicare questions.
