## Why RLC to No Longer Sing Hymns of David Haas

Although Redeemer's hymnal has only four of his hymns, **David Haas** has a rare gift of composing texts and music that find a home in us and bring our faith alive.

Do not be afraid, I am with you. I have called you each by name.  
Come and follow me, I will bring you home; I love you and you are mine.  
("You Are Mine")

We are called to act with justice, we are called to love tenderly;  
we are called to serve one another, to walk humbly with God.  
("We are Called")

Rejoice, and be glad! Blessed are you, holy are you!  
Rejoice, and be glad! Yours is the kingdom of God!  
("Blessed Are They")

Haas's hymns move us. And, given how many hymnals carry his works, we are not alone.

So it is especially devastating to learn that, while he was creating them, Haas was grooming girls as young as 14 for later abuse, and sexually abusing women between 18-60 years of age. Altogether, 44 women have accused Haas of abuse over a 41-year period. While he initially called these charges "false, reckless, and offensive," he later said, "To anyone I have harmed please know that I take full responsibility for my actions and am truly sorry. I am continuing with professional intervention to help me face and understand how my actions have violated your trust. I have continued to give prayerful thought to my actions and ask for forgiveness from anyone I have harmed — those individually and those in the church community who have been harmed because of these accusations. I believe in the God who loves all of us and pray for anyone I have harmed and pray for God's forgiveness." On November 2, 2020, five months after the first women came forward to accuse Haas, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) announced that, "Both the ELCA and 1517 Media/Augsburg Fortress have taken steps to discontinue suggesting hymns by Haas in worship planning resources for this church and to amend existing resources currently available online. The ELCA and 1517 Media have no plans to include his works in future resources and publications."

Redeemer's Worship Team last month talked about whether or not the congregation should continue singing these hymns. They looked at several articles about Haas. One that was particularly moving was written by Mennonite pastor **Melissa Florer-Bixler** in the August 28, 2020 issue of *Christian Century*:

"My congregation will not sing the songs of David Haas again. This isn't because we are vindictive or because we lack grace. Thankfully for me, we don't

### RLC's Current Worship Protocol: *Love Your Neighbor*

- \* Masks are required in worship and in other larger group settings.
- \* Both sides of the sanctuary are set up for social distancing.

## A Guatemalan Story in Adult Ed on Nov. 14

**Janet Schneider, Richard Pautsch's** sister, will lead the Sunday Adult Ed Class on **November 14** to speak about her work in Rio Negro, Guatemala. Janet writes: "Rio Negro is a Maya Achi community of 23 families located about four hours north of Guatemala City in the mountains along the Rio Chixoy, an area accessible only by boat or walking.

"The beautiful area hides a dark history.

"The Maya people suffered greatly during the Guatemalan Civil War (1960 -1996). In March of 1982, government forces, supported and armed by the U.S., massacred 177 women and children from Rio Negro (which means *Black River*). The remaining inhabitants were eventually relocated when the water behind the hydroelectric dam flooded the community. Three families returned to the mountains in 1992.

"In 2012, I visited Rio Negro as a tourist. After hearing the story and climbing to the site of the massacre, I was so moved, I felt compelled to make what small reparations I could on behalf of the American people. Assistance started with solar panels because there was no electricity! Other assistance has included, fishing nets, school supplies, food, shoes, clothing, fruit trees, small business loans and more.

"I look forward to my twice-yearly visits to Rio Negro. Join me and hear the story of these resilient people. My bilingual Spanish/English book, *Armadillos of the Black River*, will be available for purchase as well as some of the weavings by the women of the community."

## BREAD Annual Assembly Watch Party Set for Nov. 15

BREAD has a list of issues that they are currently working on: 1. Jobs, 2. Elder Care, 3. Affordable Housing, 4. Gun Violence, 5. Juvenile Justice, and 6. the One ID Columbus Coalition.

Part of the yearly BREAD cycle is to add one new issue to work on. They do this by conducting listening sessions to learn what people are concerned about and then compiling those results to make a list of possibilities for the new issue.

This year, the list (including the results from Redeemer's five House Meetings) includes: transportation, mental health, substance abuse, education, neighborhood safety, lack of access to health care and the environment (floods/storms, extreme heat/utility bills, contaminated air/water/land, lack of access to nutritious foods).

The team members voted and narrowed that down to these three issues: mental health, neighborhood safety, and the environment.

On **Monday, November 15**, at the Annual Assembly, the Network Members (including 20 from Redeemer) will vote to decide which of those issues is added. It will then join the other issues in being actively worked on by BREAD.

BREAD network members who are passionate about an issue can join subcommittees to research the issue, find potential solutions, identify the policy makers who can get those solutions implemented and petition them to do so.

Redeemer will have a watch party for the Annual Assembly zoom meeting on **Monday, November 15**. Whether or not you are a Network Member, you are welcome to come to see what it's all about.

## **Special Funds Team Information; Sunday, Nov. 21 Deadline for Nominations for Memorial Funds**

The following information is provided to the Redeemer Lutheran Church (RLC) congregation by the Special Funds Team (SFT) as recommended in the SFT Charter.

### **Memorial and Special Gifts Fund Information**

The Memorial and Special Gifts Fund receives gifts given to RLC in memory or in honor of an individual/group and these gifts other than usual contributions are considered "Special" by the Congregation Council. The fund may accept two kinds of gifts:

Unrestricted gifts - not restricted as to use by the donor.

Restricted gifts - restricted to use by the donor.

### **Memorial Gifts Distribution Procedure:**

The SFT shall announce to the congregation (at least annually) the purpose and availability of unrestricted gift monies in the fund, soliciting suggestions for its use. The SFT shall recommend to the Congregation Council any distribution of the Memorial Gifts funds.

**The form to suggest recipients for the Memorial Funds is attached to today's *Reflections*. Fill it out and either place in the offering plate on Sunday or return to the church office by Sunday, November 21.**

### **Special Gifts: Mary Kohler Ministry Fund Distribution Procedure:**

Applications for educational purposes and for new and existing RLC neighborhood ministries receive priority.

The SFT shall announce to the congregation (at least annually) the purpose and availability of the monies in the fund and solicit suggestions for use. The SFT may recommend a distribution of funds to the Congregation Council. The funds are distributed at the direction of the Congregation Council.

expect perfection in our leaders. We have no qualms about the difficult and complicated act of living.

“But we do want to assure all those who would follow in the steps of David Haas [and others] who use their position of authority to take advantage of others – that they are not indispensable. We will mourn their loss for a time, but there are other songs to sing. Eventually, “Blest Are They” will leave my memory, replaced by a new tune.

“In the gospels, Jesus’ constant frustration is his disciples’ jockeying to secure positions of power within his orbit. ... Leaders like these men calculate their wealth, institutional standing, and social influence and conclude that we cannot get by without them. They are essential. We, the ordinary people who show up to church to sing and pray, need their thoughts, writings, and songs. Their gifts and leadership will shield them from the fallout from their bad behavior.

“It is incumbent upon the church to prove them wrong. By putting down the books of abusers and the hymns of predators we are not refusing forgiveness or denying hopes for redemption. We are making clear that no individual, no matter how charismatic or how great their following, is more important than a survivor of that person’s abuse.”

These words, and others in the Worship Team’s discussion, led them to conclude that, “We, too, will no longer be asking you to sing any hymns by David Haas in worship. Our hymns are one of the central ways we worship God. How can we ask any survivors of abuse to sing words someone wrote while they were victimizing God’s beloved? We can’t. And we won’t.”
