For Thanksgiving Week: An Invitation to Practice Gratitude

It was only in this past year that I realized how important joy is in the ministry of Jesus. In John's Gospel, after he tries to give the disciples the encouragement and wisdom they need to carry on after he is killed and is no longer physically with them, Jesus says to his disciples, "I've told you all these things so that my joy can be in you, and your joy can be complete" (John 15:11).

In other words, more than anything, Jesus wants his followers to be people who bring joy to the world. Everything he says and does is for the purpose of bringing joy alive in us, and freeing us to let joy flow through us to a world that is hungry for it.

Joy isn't happiness. Joy isn't a "get out of jail free" card that protects us from struggle or depression or loss or anxiety or any other human experience.

Joy is a deep sense that, in spite of anything we're dealing with in the moment, we are grateful to be alive.

So when Jesus says he's telling the disciples how to carry on without his physical presence leading them so his joy can be alive in them, he's saying any community that comes together in his name will be a community that knows how to nurture joy and keep joy alive.

How might we do that?

Brené Brown is a social work researcher whose company consults with organizations around the world about how to create work environments that are healthy, effective, and courageous. Her researchers have discovered that the one thing people who bring joy to their lives and workplaces have in common is *gratitude*. Brown says people who bring joy to the world *practice gratitude*. She says, "It's not an attitude of gratitude – it's an actual practice." These people keep a journal or make a note of what they're grateful for on their phones or share that with others.

Brown writes, "The research is clear. ... Embodying and practicing gratitude changes everything. It connects us with each other. It's allowing yourself the pleasure of accomplishment, or love, or joy – of really feeling it, of basking in it. It's allowing yourself to be grateful that you have something you want, in your hand, that it feels good to hold and recognize. Something as simple as starting or ending a meeting with a gratitude check, when everyone shares one thing they're grateful for, can build trust and connection, and give your group permission to lean into joy."

Because Brown's research made this connection between joy and practicing gratitude, her husband and their two kids are trying to practice at home. At dinner, after they sing a favorite church camp-style grace, each person in the family shares a specific thing from that day they're grateful for. She says it's a super simple thing to do – and "It's changed us. It's given – [me and my husband] an invaluable window into our kids' lives and hearts." (References are from **Brené Brown's** book *Dare to Lead: Brave Work, Tough Conversations, Whole Hearts*, Random House, 2018, which I read during my recent study leave.)

As we celebrate Thanksgiving this week, maybe it's a good time to check in and see where gratitude shows up in your life. How freely do you express it? Might you try a gratitude moment each day with a family member or friend, to share what each of you is grateful for. This Advent, we prepare our Christmas-time celebration of the Joy who comes into the world. If we commit ourselves to practice gratitude as we enter this new church year, perhaps Redeemer will become a place where we bring joy alive and bless a hungry world with it.

Dear church,

In the book of Leviticus we read: "You shall not render an unjust judgment; you shall not be partial to the poor or defer to the great: with justice you shall judge your neighbor" (19:15).

Our social message on <u>Community Violence</u> urges us to become more involved in countering the reality and fear of violence in our communities and our neighbors' communities, pursuing justice and seeking peace no matter how long the journey or complex the challenge.

When a child is allowed to become a vigilante in our society without recourse, we are forced to confront the idols of our society: guns, violence and white supremacy. To be sure, this is not about one person, but indeed about all of us, together.

Today's acquittal is an injustice. It points to the disorder in which we all live. As we seek to restore justice, so also will we restore God to God's rightful place at the center of our life together.
