ELCA Good Gifts Reach Folks in Need around World

Contributions to the ELCA's "Good Gifts" this year are "do it yourself" as Redeemer is not staffing a table at church to accept donations. To that end, "Good Gifts" catalogues are available in the Narthex for members to use to consider sending in their own gift that can change others' lives. Those donations can be sent directly to ELCA Good Gifts, ELCA, 8765 West Higgins Road, Chicago, IL 60631-4101, or made online at goodgifts@elca.org. The order form is attached to today's *Reflections*.

There are both familiar gifts such as \$10 for chicks for a family, a blanket for a disaster survivor, or a mosquito net and new gifts like \$25 for a hygiene kit or personal protective equipment or \$100 for a couple of goats or one month of Internet connectivity; \$160 for a week of trauma counseling; \$220 for a community garden and honeybees; \$350 for a week of shelter for a vulnerable LBTQI+ youth; or \$800 for a computer for a community center. That is just a sampling of the Good Gifts that are available to reach others in need around the world and in this country. Some of the other possibilities this year include the following:

Global Barnyard

- \$15 for a rooster.
- \$30 for a piglet.
- \$500 for a cow or \$50 for a share of cow.
- \$250 for a community fish farm or \$50 for a share of a fish farm.
- \$20 for honeybees.
- \$50 for a goat.
- \$715 for a family farm. This contribution supports the provision of a cow, a couple of goats, a dozen chicks, two pigs, farming tools, seeds and agricultural training.

Water

The lack of access to clean water is one of the biggest challenges to overcoming poverty in many parts of the world. It is also one of the most powerful opportunities to create change. With a simple well or spring box as many as 500 families gain access to clean, safe water and communities become healthier.

- \$250 supports a share of a safe water project.
- \$30 provides a water filter.
- \$150 for a latrine.

Agriculture

- \$10 for a fruit tree seedling.
- \$150 to support a fruit tree farm.
- \$50 for seeds and gardening tools.

Women and Children

- \$125 for a microloan for a woman to start her own business weaving, baking or running a storefront, for example.
- \$40 for school fees and uniform for a girl.
- \$10 for school supplies for a child or \$300 for school supplies for a classroom.

Report from BREAD Annual Assembly

A total of 14 members and friends from Redeemer attended BREAD's annual assembly on **Monday**, **November 15**.

First, the presenters reported on a recent win by the organization where Columbus City schools agreed to train all their Student Safety Resource personal in Restorative Practice training. Restorative Practices is a program that's an alternative to the 20,000 out-of-school suspensions handed out every year to Columbus Public School students. A current Study Safety Resource person gave her personal story of what a positive difference has made with the students.

Another win was reported from the Gun Violence Research Committee. Columbus City Council invested \$80,000 in 2020 for a contract with the National Network for Safe Communities to make 2022 a safer year for Columbus residents.

They reported on the results of the 2021 Listening Process which included 120 House meetings (six at Redeemer) and 1,000 people engaged. The top three problems that people discussed were neighborhood safety, mental health and environmental injustice. The people in attendance who have committed to BREAD ("Network Members") voted that the next issue BREAD will work on is environmental injustice.

The next steps in the yearly cycle of BREAD are the following: 1. Research committees to learn about the issues and evaluate solutions; and 2. Faith communities to build their networks because BREAD is only able to make a difference when they have people power to influence decision makers.
