

# **Giving God's Children a Place to Lay Their Heads**

The front page of Friday's *Columbus Dispatch* showed a photo of some joyful newly-arrived refugees from Afghanistan celebrating their first Thanksgiving in Columbus: **Naseer Durrani** is a journalist who was a vocal critic of the Taliban. **Sajida Saafi** has a master's degree in political science and was a teacher and advocate for women's rights. In spite of their desire to stay in their home country and continue to try to create a truly democratic Afghanistan, they knew they would were at tremendous risk of persecution and even death were they to stay under a Taliban government. They were at the airport hoping to be let onto a flight when the suicide bomb attack that killed over 100 people happened only 150 feet from their bus. When they were finally able to get onto a plane, they had to leave all of their luggage behind, as well as two family members who were denied spaces on the plane.

This couple are two of the 350 Afghan refugees set to be resettled in Columbus. The primary organization overseeing the resettlement is Community Refugee and Immigration Services (CRIS). Agencies like CRIS have received federal grants to support temporary housing for new arrivals. CRIS also helps refugees connect with their new neighborhoods, fill out government paperwork, and find jobs, permanent, housing, and other needs. Each refugee receives a one-time federal check for \$1,225.

Needless to say, CRIS is looking for people who want to offer financial support to these families, many of whom, like Durrani and Saafi, had to leave all of their possessions behind. One of the items CRIS is asking for is beds. Their website has links to Target, Walmart, and Amazon, which offer a single bedframe and mattress for less than \$200. As a way to show a compassionate welcome to people who have been severely traumatized and who find themselves in a place they never expected to be, the Outreach team of Redeemer invites you to contribute to our efforts to provide as many beds as we can.

When he is talking about the journey of discipleship, **Jesus** tells his followers, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Human One has nowhere to lay his head." These new neighbors have gone through experiences only other refugees can imagine. What a gift and grace it is for us to be able to offer them comfortable places to lay their heads so they can get good rest and have the energy to face what lies before them.

You can give to this fund in whatever ways you normally give to the church: Just indicate that your contribution is for CRIS or Afghan refugees. We will be collecting funds through **Sunday, January 9**, the Sunday after Epiphany. We'll let you know how many beds we've been able to purchase to offer rest for weary and beautiful heads.

## **RLC's Current Worship Protocol:** Love Your Neighbor

# **Report from BREAD Annual Assembly**

A total of 14 members and friends from Redeemer attended BREAD's annual assembly on <u>Monday</u>, <u>November 15</u>.

First, the presenters reported on a recent win by the organization where Columbus City schools agreed to train all their Student Safety Resource personal in Restorative Practice training. Restorative Practices is a program that's an alternative to the 20,000 out-of-school suspensions handed out every year to Columbus Public School students. A current Study Safety Resource person gave her personal story of what a positive difference has made with the students.

Another win was reported from the Gun Violence Research Committee. Columbus City Council invested \$80,000 in 2020 for a contract with the National Network for Safe Communities to make 2022 a safer year for Columbus residents.

They reported on the results of the 2021 Listening Process which included 120 House meetings (six at Redeemer) and 1,000 people engaged. The top three problems that people discussed were



neighborhood safety, mental health and environmental injustice. The people in attendance who have committed to BREAD ("Network Members") voted that the next issue BREAD will work on is environmental injustice.

The next steps in the yearly cycle of BREAD are the following: 1. Research committees to learn about the issues and evaluate solutions; and 2. Faith communities to build their networks because BREAD is only able to make a difference when they have people power to influence decision makers.
