Examining Christian Attitudes toward Heaven, Hell, and Salvation

I wasn't planning on this being the topic of the first *Reflections* front page article of the new year. But when I decided to focus on this topic as the next Sunday adult education series, I thought it might make sense

The Pew Research Center is an organization that collects loads of survey materials around religion in the United States. In September, Pew released the results of surveys they'd done on what Christians in this country believe about heaven and hell. Among the findings:

- Nationwide, 62 percent of all Americans, regardless of religious affiliation, believe in a literal hell.
- 91 percent of those who identify as evangelical Christians believe in a literal hell.
- Mainline Protestants (Lutheran, Presbyterian, Episcopalian, United Church of Christ, United Methodist, etc.) are the least likely among Christian groups to believe in hell, with 69 percent saying they did.
- Black Christians and Republicans are most likely to believe in hell.
- 65 percent of women surveyed believe in hell; 59 percent of men do.
- 26 percent of agnostics believe in heaven while 14 percent believe in hell. Among those who believe in "nothing in particular," 50 percent believe in heaven and 39 percent believe in hell.
- 39 percent of Americans are sure that those who do not believe in God can go to heaven.
- Among American Christians, Roman Catholics (68 percent) are the most likely to say those who do not believe in God may be admitted to heaven.
- Compared to Roman Catholics, only 34 percent of all Protestants believe those who don't believe in God can go to heaven; 21 percent of evangelical Protestants believe this, 56 percent of mainline Protestants believe this, and 31 percent of those in historically black Protestant churches believe this.
- Looking at the flip side of this question, 20 percent of Catholics say unbelievers cannot get to heaven. But 56 percent of all Protestants say unbelievers cannot get to heaven. However, there are large differences among different Protestant groups: 71 percent of evangelicals are sure those who do not believe in God cannot go to heaven; 59 percent of those in historically black Protestant denominations believe this; and 30 percent of those in mainline Protestant congregations believe this.

What do you believe about heaven, hell, and salvation? What do you base those beliefs on? How different are they from anything you were taught about these issues growing up? Have your beliefs changed as an adult?

Numbers like these make it hard to imagine how we talk about *the* Christian church, or talk about what *Christians* believe about anything. We sing songs like, "We are one in the Spirit." And yet, are we one? What makes us one when we have such widely different beliefs about core issues such as these?
