LOMO Becomes 'HopeWood Outdoors'

Lutheran Outdoor Ministries of Ohio (LOMO) announced this week that it has changed its name and the names of its camps. Here is their letter:

Dear Siblings in Christ,

We've all been blessed by the incredible community, beautiful camps, and amazing memories that have been experienced through LOMO, Lutheran Memorial Camp, Camp Luther and LOMO Outreach. We love seeing youth and multiple generations enjoying camp together, retreat groups building community, school groups exploring nature, and an incredibly diverse camper community discovering a place to belong, feel safe, and experience faith and joy.

Camp truly is a place that changes lives!

To continue sharing this incredible experience with an increasingly diverse community and a changing world, our board of directors has unanimously made the exciting decision to broaden our organization and camp names from LOMO to **HopeWood Outdoors**, Lutheran Memorial Camp to **HopeWood Pines**, Camp Luther to **HopeWood Shores**, and LOMO Outreach to **HopeWood Connect.** We believe these new names will help us fulfill our vision of "connecting all people to faith and nature for a changing world."

Why these new names?

HopeWood Outdoors brings together two concepts, "heartwood" and "hope", that deeply embody our missional connection to both faith and nature. Heartwood is the name for the wood found in the center of the tree trunk - it is dense, strong, and alive. Hope is one of the central components of our faith. Together, these words combine to embody the unique connection of faith and nature that all people can find in our camp programs.

Why do we need new names?

We want to be a welcoming place for all people to explore faith and nature, regardless of where they are at on their faith journey. In 2020, Pew research discovered U.S. church membership fell below 50 percent for the first time in history. No religious affiliation continues to be the fastest growing religious affiliation. Only 36 percent of millennials are members of churches or places of worship. We believe our camps can be a place where everyone is welcome to find a spiritual home, even if they don't identify as Lutheran or any other religious organization. Our new names will help us continue this safe, inviting and welcoming environment.

What is happening with the current names?

We will continue using these names in meaningful ways, because we understand how impactful comp has been for generations of campers. We will legally retain the names of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries in Ohio (LOMO), Camp Luther, Lutheran Memorial Camp and LOMO Outreach.

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: Love Your Neighbor

1 adult toothbrush in its original packaging

1 sturdy comb

1 nail clipper (with or without attached nail file)

The towels should be light-weight because people who get them often have to wash them or let them dry by hanging them up to air dry.

Lutheran Collaborative Justice Team Begins Work

First English Lutheran Church and its eight partner churches in Franklin County have organized a Lutheran Collaborative Justice Team "to intentionally show mercy to diverse populations." The group meets quarterly at First English to read, study, discuss and pray.

Individuals who would like to participate are asked to email **Sara Neikirk** at ssneikirk@gmail.com to be added to the team and to receive the group's quarterly newsletter. **Kay Ernsthausen** reports that the group has identified four local issues that need attention and prayers:

- **Death penalty** There is pending Ohio legislation to end the death penalty.
- **Gerrymandering** Following rulings from the Ohio Supreme Court ruling on several lawsuits on both proposed state legislative district maps and congressional maps, the Ohio Redistricting Commission is again charged with redrawing both maps.

- **Affordable housing** A recent local panel indicated that there is absolutely no housing available for persons making \$30,000 or less. Columbus is expecting a major population increase and is building everywhere. Shelters are full. Columbus has an **affordable** housing crisis.
- **Education** House bills (HB) 322 and 327 are attempting to abolish efforts to implement the State Board of Education's (SBOE) comprehensive plan which includes strategies for addressing equity and diversity. Two Republican SBOE appointees of Gov. DeWine were forced to step down late last year.
