Questions Lent Asks Us to Spend Some Time With

In 1903, a young poet wrote a letter to the poet **Rainer Maria Rilke**. He wrote about his anxiety, and asked Rilke for answers to what he was struggling with. Rilke responded, "Have patience with everything unresolved in your heart and try to love *the questions themselves* as if they were locked rooms or books written in a very foreign language. Don't search for the answers, which could not be given to you now, because you would not be able to live them. And the point is, live everything. *Live* the questions now. Perhaps then, someday far in the future, you will gradually, without even noticing it, live your way into the answer." (*Letters to a Young Poet*, Translation Steven Mitchell, New York: The Modern Library, 1984, pp. 33-35; emphasis original).

I've always loved these words. And, when I'm honest, most of the time I don't have the patience to follow this wisdom. I want to figure out the big questions *now*. I mean I'm in my 60s, for heaven's sake! Shouldn't I *know* what's important to know by now? Shouldn't I have most of life figured out by now?

Maybe Lent is the liturgical calendar's answer to my anxiety about not knowing more answers and not having figured out whatever I assume I should be clear about. Since it's a time when the weather can't make up its mind and we have a second worship service each week, there's a bit more time to pause to make a bit more room to risk listening to what's stirring in and around me – maybe Lent is a good time to see what life questions come up. Not so I can jump to clear answers but so I can see where the questions take me.

Every year the Gospel reading for the first Sunday of Lent is the story of Jesus being tempted in the wilderness. The earliest Gospel, Mark, only tells us the temptation by the Satan happens. Mark doesn't tell us how the Satan tries to tempt Jesus. Writing 20 or so years after Mark, Matthew and Luke give us those details. Though they agree on the content, they don't agree on the order the questions came. This year we're following Luke's order.

The questions these temptations raise might be questions you can let live in you during this season of Lent.

Jesus responds to the first temptation to turn stones into bread by saying, "No one can live only on food." What questions does this raise for you? For me, I might spend some time this Lent reflecting on the question, *What makes me feel alive?*

In Luke, the second temptation is to get power and glory by worshiping the Satan. Jesus responds, "The Scriptures say: 'Worship the Lord your God and serve God only!'" What's a question this raises for you? I hear Jesus asking, What are a couple of the most important things in your life? Are these connected to your commitment to following Jesus? How do they compete with that commitment? How do you respond to the tensions between these competing commitments?

In the third temptation, the Satan tells Jesus to throw himself off the top of the Jerusalem Temple because God has promised to send angels to keep him safe. Jesus replies, "Don't try to test the Lord your God!" What's a question or two that

Two Ash Wednesday Services Set for March 2; Lenten/Holy Week/Easter Schedule Set

Lent begins this <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>March 2</u>, with Ash Wednesday worship services at 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. Redeemer will have Wednesday sung evening prayer services the next five Wednesdays, from <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>March 9</u> through <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>April 6</u>.

If anyone would like to share a five-minute spoken reflection that evening, please see the article below about the theme for these messages, and sign up on the sheet in the hallway outside the library.

Sundays, Redeemer will have the regular 10 a.m. Sunday morning services. [Remember to turn clocks **AHEAD** one hour before going to bed **Saturday evening, March 12**!]

Holy Week begins with the Palm Sunday service at 10 a.m. on <u>April 10</u>. The congregation will gather for Maundy Thursday worship at 7 p.m. <u>April 14</u>; foot- and hand-washing along with the Lord's Supper will be offered that evening.

The Good Friday service will include reflections on the Seven Last Words of Christ by members of Redeemer and Christ United Methodist Church. Christ UMC hosts the service this year. Those who wish to speak about "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do," "Woman, behold thy Son," "I thirst" or "Father, into Thy hands I commend My spirit," please sign up in the hallway outside the library.

On **April 17**, Redeemer will celebrate Easter Sunday with services at both 8:30 a.m. and 11 a.m.

All of the services that Redeemer is hosting will be livestreamed on the church's YouTube channel *except* for the 7 a.m. Ash Wednesday service on March 2.

We have missed those of you who have not yet returned to in-person worship. If you feel safe coming back into the sanctuary, your presence and spirit would be a true blessing to us. We are not the same without you.

1 adult toothbrush in its original packaging

1 sturdy comb

1 nail clipper (with or without attached nail file)

The towels should be light-weight because people who get them often have to wash them or let them dry by hanging them up to air dry.

Adult Ed Discusses 'Seven Deadly Sins'

Surprise! The classic "seven deadly sins" (Pride, Anger, Envy, Sloth, Greed, Gluttony, Lust) are not really sinful actions! Rather, they are deadly attitudes or dispositions that can *lead* to sinful actions. For seven weeks, Redeemer's Adult Education class is exploring these "deadly seven" and when in the cycle of our lives each disposition is most likely to take hold of us.

Along the way, the class will also consider the life-giving potential inherent in each of the seven and those virtues that serve to thwart their influence. The first Sunday, the class discussed gluttony.

As we enter Lent, what better time to take a hard, and sometimes humorous, look at who we are and who God is calling us to be.

Dr. Brad Binau, a Redeemer member and professor of pastoral theology at Trinity Lutheran Seminary at Capital University will lead the discussion. He is currently teaching a course at Trinity on the Seven Deadly Sins.

Report from Redeemer's BREAD Network Meeting

The Redeemer BREAD Network Meeting took place on February 23. Pastor Dave started off the meeting with a welcome and a reminder of why justice is important. Redeemer's BREAD liaison **Rob Sievert-Wagner** reported on the current campaigns on the BREAD roadmap. The upcoming Nehemiah Action will be addressing four campaigns: **Police Reform & Gun Violence**, **Affordable Housing**, **One ID and Environmental Justice**. Here are summaries of each campaign:

- The **Police Reform & Gun Violence** committee is working with the city on the non-police crisis response unit. The new **Public Safety Director Robert Clark** has met with BREAD and is open to working with them. We hope to be celebrating progress on the group violence reduction campaign.
- The **Affordable Housing** committee is pushing Columbus and Franklin County to use 1/3 of the half a billion dollars they received from the federal government's American Rescue Plan for housing for people who are hurting the most -- i.e., families making under \$30,000 per year. They are also asking the city to require housing developers to make a priority of building affordable housing.
- One ID is the longest running campaign and had been stalled but the new Police Chief Elaine Bryant is in favor of it and has previous experience with a similar program in Detroit.
- The **Environmental Justice** committee is continuing to explore what can be done to address the immediate harms caused by climate-driven flooding, heat, and worsening air quality.
