Emily Ott Offers Perspective on Evolving COVID-19 Safety Protocols

Changing policies around COVID mitigation can cause a lot of strong feelings, which is not surprising after the traumatic nature of the last two years. It's confusing and difficult to face a constantly changing landscape.

Like many of us, I have experienced changing policies in my workplace, in my children's school and extracurricular environments, and in places where my higher-risk parents spend time. I wanted to share some of the ways I've been thinking about decision making about levels of risk as mitigation strategies shift.

Redeemer has been responsive to ways we can worship together safely during the changing situation with COVID, and as I write this, Franklin County falls into the "green/low transmission" category in the CDC's classification. As such, some worship protocols have changed. The practice of leaving every other pew vacant has already changed, so folks can sit anywhere in the sanctuary again. Hymnals and joyful noise makers are back in the pew racks. The new protocols that will begin on **Sunday, March 27** include communion distributed at the front of the sanctuary again for those who choose to partake that way, with the servers remaining masked, and the grape juice/wine in individual cups. Additionally, as of March 27, masks will be optional on the south side of the sanctuary. The north side will be for people who are more comfortable continuing to wear a mask and who prefer to sit near others who are also wearing a mask.

Initially, considering any change to a mask requirement in any setting unnerved me, which I think is a common response, since the last two years have repeatedly taught us to associate the sight of masked faces with safety. Our brains learn patterns, and that has been an important pattern to learn!

One factor that has helped my comfort level with other people making their own choices about masks has been the efficacy of one-way masking. In the beginning of the pandemic, when low-efficacy cloth masks were the best anyone could get, we depended on each other wearing masks to reduce transmission. I'm thankful that now, high filtration masks are available, and I was reassured to read that a well-fitting N95 mask provides 95 percent protection. By comparison, surgical masks are about 70 percent effective, so two people wearing surgical masks in an interaction leads to 91 percent protection, whereas a single person wearing an N95 that fits appropriately (with an unmasked interaction partner) is better protected, at 95 percent. I'm grateful to be in a situation where an individual action can be so protective, which was not the case in the beginning. Now, N95 masks are available for adults at many pharmacies, and websites like Project N95 help consumers order verified, tested masks.

Certainly, vaccines provide the greatest single element of protection, and I would love to talk at greater length than anyone cares to hear about how vaccines work, and the way our T-cells continue to mature long after vaccination to provide better and better protection. (It's called affinity maturation, it's wild. Fearfully and wonderfully made indeed!)

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: Love Your Neighbor

- * Masks are required coming into the building and in the Narthex. Folks wishing to continue wearing masks for worship are encouraged to sit in the pews on the north side of the Sanctuary; those who wish to remove their masks may sit on the south side of the Sanctuary.
- * Those who wish may stand during the opening and closing hymns and the reading of the Gospel.
- * During the passing of the peace, we suggest you wave or place your palms together under your chin in the "namaste" posture as a way to share the peace in a distanced way.
- * Individual communion elements are available to pick up insider the Sanctuary door or folks can now choose to receive communion at the front of the church from masked servers distributing individual cups for the wine/grape juice.
- * If you wish to use one of the first-floor bathrooms, please follow instructions in the bathroom about disinfecting it after your use. Only one person at a time in the restrooms.
- * Please silence cellphones.

RLC's COVID Practices Updated

It has been a very long two years. You have been incredibly supportive of the efforts by the Executive Team and Church Council to try to keep us all safe as we follow the guidance of the Columbus Public Health Department and Centers for Disease Control around limiting the spread of COVID. Here are the steps being taken:

The every-other-row seating has now been removed and folks are invited to sit wherever they would like. This coming <u>Sunday</u>, <u>March 27</u>, masks will only be required while coming into the building and gathering in the Narthex. For worship, Redeemer will keep the **north side** of the sanctuary masked, while those sitting on the **south side** can be unmasked.

Small group meetings at the church will remain masked unless everyone at the meeting is comfortable being unmasked.

In addition, Sunday, March 27 marks the return of communion being offered at the front of the church. Individuals wishing to continue using the individual cups are free to do so.

The Executive Team invites your feedback about these changes.

Again, we thank you for two years of extraordinary resilience and creativity as we have sought to keep deepening our sense of community in the most challenging of times.

Another factor that has a huge impact is ventilation. Thankfully, Redeemer has been under the stewardship of a very diligent council and property team during the pandemic (as always!), and they made some significant upgrades to the ventilation system. Air is circulated through our indoor spaces very frequently, and it gets purified by an iWave system, which traps and neutralizes COVID particles. This firmly places our indoor spaces in the category of "well-ventilated," which is key for safety.

If you're interested in keeping up to date on Franklin County's COVID case numbers, go to this website: https://tinyurl.com/yrbr5kt4 >COVID19 Summary p2 and adjust the jurisdiction level to "Columbus & Franklin County." Scroll down to the bottom of the page, where you'll see the rolling seven-day average case count, as well as numbers for individual days. It updates every Monday.

I wanted to share some of these factors, because as I talk to people around me, the efficacy statistics for masking are not always widely known, nor are the specifics about vaccine efficacy and ventilation. One of the ways I coped with COVID was to get deep in the weeds with all of this information, and I'm grateful to be in a position (finally!) where the information provides comfort rather than fear. I'm confident that if and when the situation changes for the worse, as a community, we will again joyfully embrace whatever precautions are necessary to keep each other safe.
