

Sunday Morning Hospitality 2.0

If you spend much time flipping through the pages of the Bible, it doesn't take long to come across a story where a stranger is welcomed, where a sick person is tended, where an outcast is given a place at the table. And food! Lots of food prepared and offered. Small amounts that miraculously multiply into so much more than enough.

The Bible is a library of hospitality. Hospitality. That beautiful word that we've allowed to become an industry in which people have to pay for what used to be provided for free in ancient times. Even not that long ago, travelers hopped off boxcars and searched for signs left by other travelers that told them if this was a safe town, or if they should head to another one. In this "hobo code" language, the number "18" meant, "I ate here"; and a table drawn on a stone wall meant you could get food there; and a stick-figure cat meant "Kind lady lives here," so if you behaved well you'd get the best meal you'd had for days.

Every monastery formed by **St. Benedict of Nursia** (480-547) was guided by a simple rule: *Welcome the guest as Christ*. It's the root meaning of *hospitality*, which comes from the Latin word *hospes* – which seems like it can mean both *guest* and *host*. That's what true hospitality is about. Each person gives and each receives. The Benedictines speak to us all when they say followers of Christ offer an open heart and a stance of availability, and we look for God lurking in every single person who comes through the door. We welcome them as Christ, and treat them like they have gifts to share which will bless us more than anything we can offer blesses them.

It's been a long time since we shared food and drink in the Narthex at Redeemer. One of the deep losses COVID has imposed on us has been preventing us from offering simple refreshments that say, "You are welcome here. Let us stay together for a while."

Council has decided to try going back to having refreshments on Sunday mornings. Starting on <u>Pentecost, June 5</u>, our Sunday morning time of hospitality returns after a worship service in which we will celebrate the rite of confirmation. The Education Team will provide cupcakes and hot and cold beverages. We will open the doors going out into the garden and parking lot to supplement the excellent air filter system we've had installed. You can feel free to go outside if you'd like. Or you can take some refreshments to go!

Unless public health officials suggest a return to indoor mask-wearing, we will try this out in June and see how you feel about it. Please let one of us on Council know how you're experiencing this.

We continue to encourage everyone to get vaccinated and boosted, and to follow public health protocols. Please continue to wear masks when you step into the church building, walk around the church, and enter the sanctuary. Continue to observe our policies that all who sit on the north side of the sanctuary wear masks. Please leave the sanctuary masked, and keep your mask on as you get your refreshments.

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: Love Your Neighbor

- * Masks are required coming into the building and in the Narthex. Folks wishing to continue wearing masks for worship are encouraged to sit in the pews on the north side of the Sanctuary; those who wish to remove their masks may sit on the south side of the Sanctuary.
- * Those who wish may stand during the opening and closing hymns and the reading of the Gospel.
- * During the passing of the peace, we suggest you wave or place your palms together under your chin in the "namaste" posture as a way to share the peace in a distanced way.
- * Individual communion elements are available to pick up inside the Sanctuary door or folks can now choose to receive communion at the front of the church from masked servers distributing individual cups for the wine/grape juice.
- * If you wish to use one of the first-floor bathrooms, please follow instructions in the bathroom about disinfecting it after your use. Only one person at a time in the restrooms.
- * Please silence cellphones.

We have missed those of you who have not yet returned to in-person worship. There are a whole variety of worship opportunities available. If you feel safe coming back into the sanctuary, your presence and spirit would be a true blessing to us.

We are not the same without you.

The group advocates for systemic change in policy and practice in church and society, working to alleviate not only the painful symptoms of oppression but also to eliminate its root causes.

"We are Lutherans working with the recognition that racism, sexism, ageism, able-ism, heterosexism, homophobia, and all the other artificial distinctions that seek to raise one group into privilege and preference over another, conspire together to diminish our world and church.

"An independent, Lutheran, membership-supported organization, ReconcilingWorks is committed to strengthen all of God's beloved for authentic, visible, faithful lives and to work for systemic change with the church and society." LSS Names Interim CEO

Lutheran Social Services (LSS) announced that **Rev. Larry A. Crowell** is now serving as interim CEO, having started <u>Thursday, May 19</u>. "He will lead the organization while the LSS Board of Directors conducts an extensive nationwide search for the next president and CEO after the recent departure of **Stacy Martin**. We are fortunate in that Larry served as president and CEO of LSS for a decade and just recently retired from LSS in May 2021. He has graciously agreed to return during this period. Larry is a great leader and will provide the right guidance and support as we look for the next CEO," said **Benjamin Powers,** congregational relations manager.

"Please know, LSS is in good hands, and we will continue to provide the vital services we do each and every day. I want to thank you for your dedication to LSS and ask for your continued support during this time," he added.

"We look forward to the future and continuing upon our 110-year history of creating a better world by serving people in need."

Bishop Eaton Addresses Buffalo Shootings

"Is there no balm in Gilead? Is there no physician there? Why then has the health of my poor people not been restored?" Jeremiah 8:22

ELCA Bishop Elizabeth Eaton issued the following statement on the recent shootings in Buffalo, NY: "Our hearts grieve for those who have been killed and our souls cry out against more lives lost to the hatred birthed by racism. As we mourn those lives lost as a result of the racially motivated killings in Buffalo, we ask God to ease the continued suffering and trauma of our Black siblings throughout the nation and in our church. We are one body in Christ, so when one part suffers, we all suffer.

"We of the ELCA acknowledge our complicity in the ongoing cycle of violence that grows out of white supremacy. Through colonization and slavery, the United States of America helped to create and embrace a system of valuing and devaluing people based on skin color and ethnic identity,' the National Council of Churches declared in 2020. 'The name for this system is white supremacy.' As a predominantly white church, we benefit from this system, and we must double our efforts to dismantle it.

"In 2019 the ELCA Churchwide Assembly adopted the social policy resolution "Condemnation of White Supremacy and Racist Rhetoric." Through this action we committed to pushing back and speaking out against racist ideas that divide God's children and perpetuate white supremacy in our church and society. At the Heidelberg Disputation of 1518, Martin Luther reminded us that 'a theology of glory calls evil good and good evil. A theology of the cross *calls the thing what it actually is.*' Calling a thing what it actually is can be a first step toward healing the wounds of God's people, but not the last. We must take real and lasting action now -- through education, relationship-building with Historic Black Churches, ongoing anti-racism education, advocacy, and self-reflection. Churches have a foundational role in eradicating racism and white supremacy in society.



"The ELCA's European Descent Lutheran Association for Racial Justice (a network of White leaders committed to anti-racism in our church) calls upon all ELCA members, especially White congregations and leaders, to join their communities and other congregations in prayer, study and actions utilizing many churchwide and ecumenical resources. The association will host a drop-in Zoom call on **Tuesday, May 24**, at 7:30 p.m. Eastern time. Advance registration is required at <u>bit.ly/DropInGathering</u>."

ELCA Bishops Urge Congress to Support Funds for Augusta Victoria Hospital

In a May 18 letter, bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) urged congressional leaders to support the transfer of much-needed funds to the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) to cover debt owed to Augusta Victoria Hospital (AVH) in East Jerusalem.

AVH is owned and operated by the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) and supported by the ELCA and several other member churches of the LWF. Located on the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem, the hospital provides lifesaving health care to Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza. The hospital's cash flow problems stem from the inability of the Palestinian Authority (PA) to make regular payments on the fees for cancer patients it refers to the hospital.

"AVH is the first and only hospital to provide radiation therapy for cancer patients in the Palestinian territories and the only medical facility in the West Bank offering pediatric kidney dialysis," the letter states. "On a daily basis, these and other specialty services touch countless lives, both young and old, from communities across the Palestinian territories....

"Please support the transfer of \$120 million to the USAID to meet the urgent humanitarian needs of the Palestinian people in 2022. These allocations are needed to cover the PA's debt to AVH and the other East Jerusalem hospitals," the letter continues.

"From the Holy Land, our Lutheran Palestinian siblings are crying out, asking us to step into the breach and renew funds to Augusta Victoria Hospital," said Rev. Laurie Larson Caesar, bishop of the ELCA Oregon Synod. "Due to no fault of their own, the situation has become an urgent humanitarian crisis. Let's not close our ears and eyes. We are proud of the crucial role this Lutheran medical center has played in the West Bank, but when funds are threatened, so are the lives of refugees, children, elders and more." Caesar is chair of the ELCA Conference of Bishops Middle East Ready Bench.

<u>Youth Summer Camps</u> – Youth Summer Camps are offered at Lutheran Memorial Camp (near Mt. Gilead). These camps are for children in grades K-2nd, 3rd-5th, 6th-8th, 9th-12th as well as confirmation. <u>Family Camps</u> – The majority of family camps are offered at Camp Luther, on the shores of Lake Erie. In addition, Family Camp weekend is offered at LMC.
