Moving beyond 'Thoughts, Prayers'

"Thoughts and prayers" just doesn't cut it any longer with this latest mass shooting that took the lives of 19 students and two teachers at the school in Texas. There is this yearning to **do** something.

A teacher – the daughter of a friend of **Judith Bird's** – wrote the following:

"Gun violence is not an unsolvable issue, though it does pose a 'wicked problem' which is complex. 'Wicked problems' are social problems that are highly complex and require complex, multi-layered solutions.

"Don't be paralyzed by anger or grief. Use your anger and grief to fuel action.

"Here is what we can do:

"Educate yourself on the facts and research around gun violence This helps you to understand the complexity of the problem and work towards actionable solutions .

"Write your legislators. Even better organize with fellow citizens to visit their offices and meet with them in person. Demand legislative hearings and testify at them. Ask them to propose common sense and reasonable gun control legislation Be a squeaky wheel and encourage your like-minded friends to do the same. Host a letter writing party.

"Put your money where your mouth is. The NRA and other gun lobby groups rely on donations from people and they funnel crap tons of it to politicians for reelection. We need to counter that financing with our own and help financially support candidates who will support reasonable gun legislation.

"Vote. Switch parties if you have to in order to ensure moderates are elected. We need elected officials who will take action or work with others on this issue. Minimally vote to make sure extremists are shut out of elections. We need elected officials who will place nice in the sandbox and actually do something rather than worry about a primary challenge. [Ohio's primary for the state legislative races is Aug. 2.]

"Support school districts in including social emotional learning and antibullying efforts in schools Volunteer in local schools. Spend time with kids. Students who have healthy adult connections are far less likely to commit these atrocities. Teachers can't do it alone; this requires an entire community effort. And ... kids are pretty fun.

"Support social welfare programs (health care, food programs, rent assistance, minimum wage increases, etc.) that allow families to have a little economic stability. Poverty causes high levels of stress in families and is destabilizing to families. Kids are not immune from these stressors. Stress leads to a whole host of emotional and behavioral issues which can play out in homes and schools. In all of the shootings studied by the Secret Service, 100 per cent of the attackers experienced intense stressors (abuse, neglect, loss of loved one, familial drug or alcohol abuse, family mental health issues, divorce, parental job loss) in the months leading up to the attacks.

"There are things we can do. Take action." Here's one resource: "Protecting America's Schools" from the U.S. Secret Service:

A total of 691 people were served at the May giveaway. That included 136 seniors and 229 children. All 10,466 pounds of food that Redeemer received was given away.

ELCA Bishops Urge Congress to Support Funds for Augusta Victoria Hospital

In a May 18 letter, bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) urged congressional leaders to support the transfer of much-needed funds to the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) to cover debt owed to Augusta Victoria Hospital (AVH) in East Jerusalem.

AVH is owned and operated by the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) and supported by the ELCA and several other member churches of the LWF. Located on the Mount of Olives in Jerusalem, the hospital provides lifesaving health care to Palestinians in the West Bank and Gaza. The hospital's cash flow problems stem from the inability of the Palestinian Authority (PA) to make regular payments on the fees for cancer patients it refers to the hospital.

"AVH is the first and only hospital to provide radiation therapy for cancer patients in the Palestinian territories and the only medical facility in the West Bank offering pediatric kidney dialysis," the letter states. "On a daily basis, these and other specialty services touch countless lives, both young and old, from communities across the Palestinian territories. . . .

"Please support the transfer of \$120 million to the USAID to meet the urgent humanitarian needs of the Palestinian people in 2022. These allocations are needed to cover the PA's debt to AVH and the other East Jerusalem hospitals," the letter continues.

"From the Holy Land, our Lutheran Palestinian siblings are crying out, asking us to step into the breach and renew funds to Augusta Victoria Hospital," said Rev. Laurie Larson Caesar, bishop of the ELCA Oregon Synod. "Due to no fault of their own, the situation has become an urgent humanitarian crisis. Let's not close our ears and eyes. We are proud of the crucial role this Lutheran medical center has played in the West Bank, but when funds are threatened, so are the lives of refugees, children, elders and more." Caesar is chair of the ELCA Conference of Bishops Middle East Ready Bench.
