

Julie Hutson: *What I Shared on Facebook the Afternoon Bruce and I Joined Redeemer*

Today my Beloved and I made the transfer of our membership to a local congregation official. Y'all, this was a strange and wondrous thing. I started seminary 21 years ago, which means that any time I've technically transferred my congregational membership since then, there was never any ritual note of it because how does one receive oneself as a new member/pastor of the congregation? *Note: This actually should happen. The congregational president or kids or wise elders could do the welcoming of the pastor as a new member.*

Anyway, this is also the FIRST TIME EVER that our photo was on a bulletin cover, which was wild! ... I love that it says "The Holy Trinity" which is the liturgical date, and would be hilarious if three of us had joined instead of four.

I also felt oddly displaced, like I was standing in the wrong spot and wearing the wrong clothing.

But oh, how I love having a pastor again. Don't get me wrong, I have served under the care of amazing bishops. But they have other things to do like resolving conflict and going to important meetings and keeping the clergy from just burning it all down. So, I have a pastor; we have a pastor. (Clergy cannot be their spouse's pastors, you know). And he's a person of deep and abiding faith and joy and wisdom and he delights in good meals and travel and hearing people's stories.

Someone asked me why we'd chosen to join Redeemer Lutheran Church in Columbus Ohio. The reasons for joining one congregation over others are deeply personal and wrapped up in all of who we are and what we hope for and what we bring with us. But here's what I've got:

1- Redeemer is a Reconciling in Christ congregation. This means they are open and affirming and welcome all people and aren't afraid to live into what that truly means. They were the first RIC congregation in the state of Ohio and have been RIC for something like 30 plus years!

2- Every worship service begins with **Pastor Dave Shull** welcoming the assembly and reminding us that we are God's beloved children and that God's love for us is unconditional and that we are worthy of that love even when we can't believe that for ourselves. I tear up every single time I hear him say that because in spite of being called and ordained etc., it's still hard to imagine that I deserve it. Which I don't. Which is the point.

3- This congregation rolls up their sleeves and serves! They have food ministries and a basketball court where the kids in the neighborhood are invited to play and helping ministries and so much else that puts feet to their faith.

4- There are more ordained folks as members of this congregation than I can count. If you threw a rock you'd hit one of us! What this means is that they understand *cont'd on p. 5*

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: Love Your Neighbor

- * Masks are required coming into the building and in the Narthex. Folks wishing to continue wearing masks for worship are encouraged to sit in the pews on the north side of the Sanctuary; those who wish to remove their masks may sit on the south side of the Sanctuary.
- * Those who wish may stand during the opening and closing hymns and the reading of the Gospel.
- * During the passing of the peace, we suggest you wave or place your palms together under your chin in the "namaste" posture as a way to share the peace in a distanced way.
- * Individual communion elements are available to pick up inside the Sanctuary door or folks can now choose to receive communion at the front of the church from masked servers distributing individual cups for the wine/grape juice.
- * If you wish to use one of the first-floor bathrooms, please follow instructions in the bathroom about disinfecting it after your use. Only one person at a time in the restrooms.
- * Please silence cellphones.

We have missed those of you who have not yet returned to in-person worship. There are a whole variety of worship opportunities available. If you feel safe coming back into the sanctuary, your presence and spirit would be a true blessing to us.

22nd Street Cookies Coming to Redeemer This Sunday

The 22nd Street Cookies, a program that employs teens who face obstacles to craft and create the cookie dough, will be coming to Redeemer on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>June 26</u> to sell cookie dough. The program is an outreach group started by First English Lutheran Church and its goal is to get teenagers off the street and to complete high school.

Cookie dough comes in the following flavors: chocolate chip, oatmeal cranberry white chocolate, chocolate peanut butter and famous corn cookie dough. It runs \$12 for 16 oz. containers which make approximately 12 to 16 cookies.

"Supporting this program means providing opportunities for our youth to stay engaged in a positive productive environment and learn important life skills. With each purchase, you're ensuring a chance for them to surpass their outside barriers and become successful at work and in life."

RLC Summer Basketball Camp Underway

Redeemer's summer basketball camps, led by former NBA and ABA player **Coach Larry Jones**, is now underway– even as the temperatures are to soar again this week. **Persons interested in donating water are asked to make it the 8 oz bottle size**.

Redeemer provides these camps for free to youth ages 8 to 14. The camps run six weeks, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. for either the Monday and Wednesday camp or the Tuesday and Thursday camp. They conclude on **Thursday, July 21**.

A BIG Thank You from a VERY HOT Food Giveaway

Thanks to all those who helped at the produce market on a VERY HOT Thursday! **Kathy Zwanziger** reports, "Little surprise to anyone there that we had fewer people this month: perhaps it was too hot to leave the house -- or perhaps their electricity was off so there would be no place to keep the food.

"Still we had 130 official guests (but again three or four came after the iPads were shut down). That was a total of 691 people served, 129 of them children. There were 89 seniors and 39 new families!

"There were 25 hot volunteers, including a couple people from the neighborhood helping, and what a great help they were. The rain even held off until we were done. It was a great day (but we're hoping for a cooler day on July 21, when our extra item will be school supplies!)."

School supplies include pencils, crayons, paper plus boxes of tissues.

Adult Education Class Explores 'Wisdom of Enneagram'

Running into July, the Sunday morning adult education class (to which high-school-age youth are invited!) is now discussing *The Wisdom of the Enneagram*. Pastor Dave is leading the class and writes, "That last word is pronounced *ANY-a-gram*. It combines two Greek words that mean *a nine-pointed figure*. The Enneagram is a personality system that describes nine different patterns of thinking, feeling, and acting. Each number represents one of these different patterns, and, according to the theory underlying the Enneagram, one of these numbers applies to each of us. Each number is based on the ways we perceive the world and try to make sense of how it operates and what we experience. Think about it for a moment. How we understand what's going on in the world determines what we pay attention to and how we direct our energy in response. At the heart of the Enneagram is the belief that each of us came to believe something about what we needed to do to survive and to be happy that isn't true. This false belief leads us to focus our energies on areas that take us away from lives that are whole, free, and healthy.

"For example, until I took a couple trainings on the Enneagram back in Seattle, I never understood why I focused so much energy on what was missing in my life. I spent lots of time looking back at how good things used be, or looking forward to how much better my life would be 'if only' this or that happened. I carried a lot of regret, a lot of 'why did I ...?' or 'why *didn't* I ...?' It wasn't a fun way to live. And I felt stuck in it. Discovering the Enneagram brought me into a new world. It helped me see where I got stuck (and I still do at times!), and it offered ideas about how I can choose a different path.

"The Enneagram talks about how we react to stress based on our 'number,' what we try to avoid, what our strengths are, what brings up anger in us and the nature of our anger. And, importantly and helpfully, the Enneagram talks about what helps us move from this false belief, what helps us grow in healthy ways and what keeps us back, and how others can support our healing and development.

"I have used this a lot for myself, with clients, with friends, and with graduate students I've supervised over the years. I find it extraordinarily helpful as a way to understand ourselves better, make sense of where and how we get stuck, and, without judgment or fault-finding or finger-pointing, begin to change directions, and start to see ourselves and the world in new ways, and, so, begin to think, act, and feel in new ways.

July Book Study: Caste: The Origin of Our Discontents

Wednesday evenings between <u>July 6-27</u>, Redeemer will hold its **annual summer book study**, reading and discussing *Caste: The Origin of Our Discontents*, by Pulitzer Prize-winning author **Isabel Wilkerson**.

Pastor Dave writes, "If you're like I am, you associate the word 'caste' with a place like India. People are born into a caste and that caste largely determines who they can marry, the jobs open to them, and the kind of life they will have. I never would have described the U.S. as having a caste system. Sure, I know being a White, wealthy male means I've had a lot more options open to me than a lot of people. But 'caste' isn't a word I would have applied to the U.S. … *until I read this book*.

"Wilkerson lists eight characteristics of a caste system. And finds all of them are part of our history in the U.S. Central to her argument is the fact that, over time, many White individuals and institutions came to accept treating people differently on the basis of race is part of the natural order of

things, even seeing it as God's will. Many of these individuals and institutions convinced themselves that treating Blacks with even extreme cruelty was justified because, well, they aren't 'like us,' they're inferior ... which is another way of saying, they're part of a lower caste than 'we' are.

"It's a remarkable book that feels like it was made to be discussed by people who are open to hearing what Wilkerson has to say, and open to sharing what might be opposing views. We have shown we can talk about hard topics and face hard realities with respect and kindness. This book will invite us to bring those graces together again.

The vision of the Columbus Diaper Coalition is to grow into a diaper bank that can serve all of Columbus.

BREAD Rises

If you have ever been at any BREAD event, you know that BREAD has a cheer. Many times during an event, a speaker will call "BREAD" and the crowd will respond shouting "Rises."

Every justice organization that is a part of BREAD's parent organization, DART, and probably every justice organization period, has a similar cheer. It is a way to quickly communicate the collective goal, unite the group and build energy. BREAD's sister organization in Knoxville, TN uses the cheer "Justice Knox" complete with a collective single knock.

At the recent Nehemiah Action, our own **Emily Ott** had agreed to volunteer as the ASL interpreter. As part of her preparation, she was thinking about how to sign "BREAD Rises." In English, it is a play on words. Bread literally rises because of the yeast, but the BREAD organization rises by always striving on, looking up, pushing through.

In American Sign Language, those two "rises" each have their own sign and so there is no play on words. Because of that, Emily was trying to decide how to interpret the BREAD cheer. She decided to use "BREAD succeeds," which was perfect. In its over 20-year history, BREAD has succeeded through hard work and perseverance. There are always delays and setbacks and resistance, but BREAD just doesn't stop. The end result is that BREAD ... succeeds.

Volunteers Sought for Colonial Village Cleanup on June 25

Approximately 200-300 community volunteers are being sought by the Columbus Police Department and other community leaders to assist with at cleanup event at Colonial Village on <u>Saturday, June 25</u>. The kickoff is set for 8:30 a.m. with the clean up to run from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

According to **Columbus Police Officer Wendell Tolber**, "Colonial Village [at E. Livingston and Rand Aves.] has been in the news due to deplorable living conditions. Over a period of time, the complex was legally taken from the previous owners. There is now a strong effort in place to get the Colonial Village community cleaned up so the residents can have pride in where they live.

"We (CPD and the community) want to come together and give the village residents a fresh start and a ray of hope by cleaning up the complex on a large scale.

"There will also be social services and organizations onsite to give services and information that will add to the quality of life, not just for village residents but for residents of the city of Columbus."
