A Message from Bishop Eaton on Roe v. Wade **Decision**

Dear church,

Whatever personal perspective one might take on the June 24 abortion ruling from the Supreme Court, it is the legal framework in which we now minister, and I wish to speak a pastoral word at this time.

The Supreme Court has voted to overturn Roe v. Wade, removing federal constitutional protection for safe and legal abortion and leaving decisions about abortion law largely to the states. As a result, safe and legal abortion will likely not be accessible in every state. This church's 1991 social statement Abortion argues that "the number of induced abortions is a source of deep concern" but teaches that the practice should be legal (pp. 3, 9-10). In other words, "Laws should be enacted and enforced justly for the preservation and enhancement of life, and should avoid unduly encumbering or endangering the lives of women" (p. 9). Overturning Roe v. Wade and placing decisions about abortion regulation at the state level encumbers and endangers the lives of all persons who need to make decisions about unexpected pregnancies.

First, as a pastor of this church, I want to acknowledge that this decision affects many people, especially those whose pregnancies unfold in complex situations and the people who love them. Many now find their moral agency restricted because federal law no longer guarantees access to legal and safe abortion. They already face difficult moral questions, and the Supreme Court decision only adds to their anguish. As our social statement reminds us, we have both the freedom and the obligation to serve neighbors in complex situations. As a church, we are called at this moment to recognize and spiritually support people who are struggling with decisions around pregnancy.

Second, as presiding bishop, I want to remind this church that, despite this new legal landscape, we continue to depend on our social teaching for guidance. Our social statement provides the moral framework for our church's communal discernment and ministry, holding in tension both the strong Christian presumption to preserve and protect all life as well as the complex moral situations in which pregnancy sometimes occurs. Our social teaching is complex and does not hew to clear categories or labels such as "pro-abortion" or "anti-abortion."

That complexity is reflected in several points. The statement recognizes that pregnant persons have moral agency; they are the ones to make decisions about a pregnancy (see pp. 5-6). This church and its ministers trust them to decide but expect them to make such decisions in relationship - with God, self, partner, family, ministers and others.

I also want to underscore for the whole body of Christ the statement's exhortation "that those who counsel persons faced with unintended pregnancies respect how deeply the woman's pregnancy involves her whole person – body,

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: Love Your Neighbor

If you have ever been at any BREAD event, you know that BREAD has a cheer. Many times during an event, a speaker will call "BREAD" and the crowd will respond shouting "Rises."

Every justice organization that is a part of BREAD's parent organization, DART, and probably every justice organization period, has a similar cheer. It is a way to quickly communicate the collective goal, unite the group and build energy. BREAD's sister organization in Knoxville, TN uses the cheer "Justice Knox" complete with a collective single knock.

At the recent Nehemiah Action, our own **Emily Ott** had agreed to volunteer as the ASL interpreter. As part of her preparation, she was thinking about how to sign "BREAD Rises." In English, it is a play on words. Bread literally rises because of the yeast, but the BREAD organization rises by always striving on, looking up, pushing through.

In American Sign Language, those two "rises" each have their own sign and so there is no play on words. Because of that, Emily was trying to decide how to interpret the BREAD cheer. She decided to use "BREAD succeeds," which was perfect. In its over 20-year history, BREAD has succeeded through hard work and perseverance. There are always delays and setbacks and resistance, but BREAD just doesn't stop. The end result is that BREAD ... succeeds.

A Homecoming Concert, also open to the public, will be held in the Redeemer Sanctuary on **Tuesday, July 12,** also running from 7 to 8 p.m.

Fellowship Hall Reopens

Council at July's meeting approved the reopening of the Fellowship Hall and downstairs kitchen with conditions recommended by the Property Team.

First an update on the work completed: the heating and air conditioning units have been replaced as voted by the congregation at the annual meeting. These are the final units - and the most expensive - costing \$45,000. But they are done and iWave air purifiers are installed in them. Because air had not been circulated throughout the area during the pandemic property recommended, and council approved, air duct cleaning in the basement, which has also been completed. Electric and plumbing repairs necessary to open the areas have also been completed.

Not yet completed is additional work in the restroom off the staircase. One of the old furnaces had been installed above this restroom (where it was virtually impossible to service). The new furnace is installed by the main furnace but the restroom ceiling and general condition needs work. You will notice that restroom is taped off and is not to be used.

Folks who want to schedule use of the Fellowship Hall, or other rooms in the building, should call or email the church office with the request.

RLC Supports Lutheran World Relief for Ukraine

During April and May Redeemer collected an additional \$6,520 for relief efforts being coordinated by Lutheran World Relief (LWR) for the Ukrainian people. That money has been sent.

That brings Redeemer's total giving to over \$11,000. Thank you for your generous support of these efforts!

July Book Study: Caste: The Origin of Our Discontents

Wednesday evenings between <u>July 6-27</u>, Redeemer will hold its **annual summer book study**, reading and discussing *Caste: The Origin of Our Discontents*, by Pulitzer Prize-winning author **Isabel Wilkerson**.

Pastor Dave writes, "If you're like I am, you associate the word 'caste' with a place like India. People are born into a caste and that caste largely determines who they can marry, the jobs open to them, and the kind of life they will have. I never would have described the U.S. as having a caste system. Sure, I know being a White, wealthy male means I've had a lot more options open to me than a lot of people. But 'caste' isn't a word I would have applied to the U.S. ... until I read this book.

"Wilkerson lists eight characteristics of a caste system. And finds all of them are part of our history in the U.S. Central to her argument is the fact that, over time, many White individuals and institutions came to accept treating people differently on the basis of race is part of the natural order of things, even seeing it as God's will. Many of these individuals and institutions convinced themselves that treating Blacks with even extreme cruelty was justified because, well, they aren't 'like us,' they're inferior ... which is another way of saying, they're part of a lower caste than 'we' are.

"It's a remarkable book that feels like it was made to be discussed by people who are open to hearing what Wilkerson has to say, and open to sharing what might be opposing views. We have shown we can talk about hard topics and face hard realities with respect and kindness. This book will invite us to bring those graces together again.

"We'll meet in-person and on Zoom from 7 to 8:30 p.m., Wednesday evenings in July, starting **July 6**. Let me know if you'd like to join us so I can send any handouts and the Zoom link.

RLC Summer Basketball Camp Underway

Redeemer's summer basketball camps, led by former NBA and ABA player Coach Larry Jones, is now underway— even as the temperatures are to soar again this week. Persons interested in donating water are asked to make it the 8 oz bottle size.

Redeemer provides these camps for free to youth ages 8 to 14. The camps run six weeks, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. for either the Monday and Wednesday camp or the Tuesday and Thursday camp. They conclude on **Thursday**, **July 21**.

Adult Education Class Explores 'Wisdom of Enneagram'

Running into July, the Sunday morning adult education class (to which high-school-age youth are invited!) is now discussing *The Wisdom of the Enneagram*. Pastor Dave is leading the class and writes, "That last word is pronounced *ANY-a-gram*. It combines two Greek words that mean *a nine-pointed figure*. The Enneagram is a personality system that describes nine different patterns of thinking, feeling, and acting. Each number represents one of these different patterns, and, according to the theory underlying the Enneagram, one of these numbers applies to each of us. Each number is based on the ways we perceive the world and try to make sense of how it operates and what we experience. Think about it for a moment. How we understand what's going on in the world determines what we pay attention to and how we direct our energy in response. At the heart of the Enneagram is the belief that each of us came to believe something about what we needed to do to survive and to be happy that isn't true. This false belief leads us to focus our energies on areas that take us away from lives that are whole, free, and healthy.

"For example, until I took a couple trainings on the Enneagram back in Seattle, I never understood why I focused so much energy on what was missing in my life. I spent lots of time looking back at how good things used be, or looking forward to how much better my life would be 'if only' this or that happened. I carried a lot of regret, a lot of 'why did I ...?' or 'why didn't I ...?' It wasn't a fun way to live. And I felt stuck in it. Discovering the Enneagram brought me into a new world. It helped me see where I got stuck (and I still do at times!), and it offered ideas about how I can choose a different path.

"The Enneagram talks about how we react to stress based on our 'number,' what we try to avoid, what our strengths are, what brings up anger in us and the nature of our anger. And, importantly and helpfully, the Enneagram talks about what helps us move from this false belief, what helps us grow in healthy ways and what keeps us back, and how others can support our healing and development.

"I have used this a lot for myself, with clients, with friends, and with graduate students I've supervised over the years. I find it extraordinarily helpful as a way to understand ourselves better, make sense of where and how we get stuck, and, without judgment or fault-finding or finger-pointing, begin to change directions, and start to see ourselves and the world in new ways, and, so, begin to think, act, and feel in new ways.

"If this sounds intriguing, come and join us this Sunday morning from 11:15 a.m.-12:15 p.m., inperson or on Zoom. If you're not already on the email list for the Sunday morning classes, let me know. You'll get the Zoom link and discussion handouts."

Noisy Offering to Go to Columbus Diaper Coalition

Redeemer's Noisy Offering – that offering of loose change that is deposited in the offering plate just insider the entrance to the Sanctuary – will now be used to support the Columbus Diaper Coalition.

This coalition began in November 2013 because diapers are not covered by Ohio Works First, SNAP (food stamps) benefits, or any other social-service organization.

The Columbus Diaper Coalition is a diaper bank that currently supports four area food pantries. Since the supply chain for infant supplies has been interrupted and with the added stress of inflation, the diaper bank has more and more demand. The vision of the Columbus Diaper Coalition is to grow into a diaper bank that can serve all of Columbus.

mind and spirit – in relation to all the commitments that comprise her stewardship of life" (p. 5).

Further, our church teaching holds that there are no exclusive rights in pregnancy. A pregnant person does not have an exclusive right to abort a fetus at all points during the pregnancy. A developing life does not have an exclusive right to be born (p. 2). This church does not support abortion as a normative form of birth control but rather understands it as necessary in some morally responsible circumstances. This church does not condone late-term abortions except in extreme circumstances, which must be determined by the individual with their medical caregivers (p. 7).

This church acknowledges that individuals and religious traditions hold divergent viewpoints over when life begins. These divergent views are not only scientific but also biblical and cultural. The ELCA social statement acknowledges these ethical ambiguities and states that "the closer the life in the womb comes to full term the more serious such [moral] issues become." (p. 7).

As we live into this new legal framework, we can respond to and minister in the current situation, for instance, by ministering to individuals who seek abortions; advocating for laws that provide free or affordable health care, child care and education; providing and promoting sex education; continuing to be a community of discernment where thoughtful and diverse perspectives can be shared and heard; and

advocating for state laws that provide legal, safe and affordable abortions, and against legislation that would outlaw abortion in all circumstances (p. 9).

Finally, I wish to remind everyone that this church supports peaceful means of expression within a diverse society. Peaceful protest is a crucial element of civic engagement; violent protest is not, and this church reproves it. Likewise, this church is on record against hate speech. Let us be instruments for peace where there is none. Let us listen to one another. Let us serve the needs of neighbors in all the complexities life presents. God calls us to be *for* others, just as God in Christ is for us.
