The Slaves' Appeal to the Royal Governor of Massachusetts May 25, 1774

Years ago, I bought a book called *The American Reader: Words that Moved a Nation*. It's edited by **Diane Ravitch**. In her introduction to this collection, Ravitch writes, "*The American Reader* aims to put its readers into direct contact with the words that inspired, enraged, delighted, chastened, or comforted Americans in days gone by. Gathered here are the classic speeches, poems, arguments, and songs that illuminate – with wit, eloquence, or sharp words – significant aspects of American life."

On the Fourth of July, I always pull out this book and see what I can rediscover in it that I need to read again. Or see what I discover for the first time. Today I came across this piece which I don't recall seeing before, but which I want to share with you as our nation engages in arguments about how to teach and talk about the ongoing legacy of slavery and racism in this country. The words that are spelled differently than we would spell them today are in the original.

A Dutch ship brought 20 Africans to Jamestown, Virginia, in 1619; whether they were slaves or indentured servants is not known. With the rise of the southern plantation system in the late 17th century, the importation of Africans increased, as did colonial laws establishing their permanent slave status. During the 350 years of the slave trade, between nine and 12 million Africans were carried to the Americas under brutal conditions; about 400,000 of these were brought to North America.

*Some colonists opposed slavery, especially Quakers and Mennonites, and leaders such as **Benjamin Franklin, Alexander Hamilton, and John Jay**. Revolutionary appeals based on the natural rights of humans encouraged some slaves to assert that they, too, had a right to freedom. On May 25, 1774, a group of slaves in Massachusetts addressed the following appeal to **Thomas Gage**, the royal governor of the colony.*

When the revolution began, the American army excluded Blacks. But when the British called on slaves to join their side, the revolutionary army reversed its policies. Some 5,000 African Americans, both slave and free, fought in the American Army. Many gained their freedom as a result of wartime service, and thousands of others escaped from slavery during the War. Most Africans, however, remained in slavery, a reproach to the ideals of the new nation.

The Petition of a Grate Number of Blacks of this Province who by divine permission are held in a state of Slavery within the bowels of a free and Christian Country.

Humbly Shewing

That your Petitioners apprehend we have in common with all other men a natural right to our freedoms without Being depriv'd of them by our fellow men as we are a freeborn Pepel and have never forfeited this Blessing by aney compact or agreement whatever. But we were unjustly dragged by the cruel hand of power from our dearest frinds and sum of us stolen from the bosoms of our tender Parents

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: *Love Your Neighbor*

- * Masks are required coming into the building and in the Narthex. Folks wishing to continue wearing masks for worship are encouraged to sit in the pews on the north side of the Sanctuary; those who wish to remove their masks may sit on the south side of the Sanctuary.
- * Those who wish may stand during the opening and closing hymns and the reading of the Gospel.
- * During the passing of the peace, we suggest you wave or place your palms together under your chin in the "namaste" posture as a way to share the peace in a distanced way.
- * Individual communion elements are available to pick up inside the Sanctuary door or folks can now choose to receive communion at the front of the church from masked servers distributing individual cups for the wine/grape juice.
- * If you wish to use one of the first-floor bathrooms, please follow instructions in the bathroom about disinfecting it after your use. Only one person at a time in the restrooms.
- * Please silence cellphones.

We have missed those of you who have not yet returned to in-person worship. There are a whole variety of worship opportunities available. If you feel safe coming back into the sanctuary, your presence and spirit would be a true blessing to us.

We are not the same without you.

July Book Study: *Caste: The Origin of Our Discontents*

Beginning this Wednesday evening, **July 6**, and continuing on successive Wednesday evenings through **July 27**, Redeemer will hold its **annual summer book study**, reading and discussing *Caste: The Origin of Our Discontents*, by Pulitzer Prize-winning author **Isabel Wilkerson**. The sessions will run from 7 to 8:30 p.m. both in-person and on Zoom.

Pastor Dave writes, "If you're like I am, you associate the word 'caste' with a place like India. People are born into a caste and that caste largely determines who they can marry, the jobs open to them, and the kind of life they will have. I never would have described the U.S. as having a caste system. Sure, I know being a White, wealthy male means I've had a lot more options open to me than a lot of people. But 'caste' isn't a word I would have applied to the U.S. ... until I read this book.

"Wilkerson lists eight characteristics of a caste system. And finds all of them are part of our history in the U.S. Central to her argument is the fact that, over time, many White individuals and institutions came to accept treating people differently on the basis of race is part of the natural order of things, even seeing it as God's will. Many of these individuals and institutions convinced themselves that treating Blacks with even extreme cruelty was justified because, well, they aren't 'like us,' they're inferior ... which is another way of saying, they're part of a lower caste than 'we' are.

"It's a remarkable book that feels like it was made to be discussed by people who are open to hearing what Wilkerson has to say, and open to sharing what might be opposing views. We have shown we can talk about hard topics and face hard realities with respect and kindness. This book will invite us to bring those graces together again."

The distribution itself runs from 3 to 6 p.m. Set-up begins at 1 p.m. and clean up runs until approximately 6 p.m. If you can help, please sign up on the sheet on the bulletin board next to the Library.

The giveaway is run in conjunction with Lutheran Social Services and the Mid-Ohio Food Cooperative.

Routinely, Redeemer supplements the food items with personal care items or other supplies. **For July 21, the extra items are school supplies: pencils, crayons, paper, etc. Items can be placed in the baskets in the Donation Station in the cloakroom.**

BREAD Celebrates Success, Launches Investment Campaign

B.R.E.A.D. Network members gathered at Christ United Methodist Church on **Monday, June 27** to celebrate their successes over the past year and their 25th anniversary of working for justice. Because of B.R.E.A.D.:

- City Council invested \$430,000 for contracts with the National Network for Safe Communities to implement Gun Violence Intervention strategies.
- Nine Restorative Justice Circles are in place to prevent children from entering the Juvenile Justice System.
- Franklin County now has an Affordable Housing Trust Fund with \$4 million dollars to finance the development of affordable housing.
- The Franklin County Commissioners continue to approve \$6.5 million for affordable housing.
- **Councilmember and President Pro Tempore Elizabeth Brown** enthusiastically supported the Columbus canopy Restoration Project to reduce the effects of climate change.

While not every campaign has been completed, B.R.E.A.D. is hopeful with the progress that is being made. It will continue to push for One ID Columbus, the release of one-third of the American Rescue Plan dollars to go to the Affordable Housing Trust, and a reconciliation process with the Columbus Police.

“We also celebrated the attendance at the Nehemiah Action on May 10. Columbus had the largest turnout in the country for the various D.A.R.T. organizations which is the overarching organization for all B.R.E.A.D. type justice organizations. Redeemer Lutheran Church met the goal of having the same number of attendees as the number of our weekly worship attendance. Great job, Redeemer folks!” wrote **Michele Disbro**.

Then, B.R.E.A.D. kicked off their investment drive. Network members pledged financial support toward a goal of \$180,000. For every \$1 invested in B.R.E.A.D. in 2021, \$41 was leveraged back into the community! **Redeemer would love to give an additional gift (besides the membership dues) to support the work towards justice. If you would like to support the work of B.R.E.A.D., please make**

Fellowship Hall Reopens

Council at July's meeting approved the reopening of the Fellowship Hall and downstairs kitchen with conditions recommended by the Property Team.

First an update on the work completed: the heating and air conditioning units have been replaced as voted by the congregation at the annual meeting. These are the final units - and the most expensive - costing \$45,000. But they are done and iWave air purifiers are installed in them. Because air had not been circulated throughout the area during the pandemic property recommended, and council approved, air duct cleaning in the basement, which has also been completed. Electric and plumbing repairs necessary to open the areas have also been completed.

Not yet completed is additional work in the restroom off the staircase. One of the old furnaces had been installed above this restroom (where it was virtually impossible to service). The new furnace is installed by the main furnace but the restroom ceiling and general condition needs work. You will notice that restroom is taped off and is not to be used.

Folks who want to schedule use of the Fellowship Hall, or other rooms in the building, should call or email the church office with the request.

RLC Supports Lutheran World Relief for Ukraine

During April and May Redeemer collected an additional \$6,520 for relief efforts being coordinated by Lutheran World Relief (LWR) for the Ukrainian people. That money has been sent.

That brings Redeemer's total giving to over \$11,000. *Thank you for your generous support of these efforts!*

RLC Summer Basketball Camp Underway

Redeemer's summer basketball camps, led by former NBA and ABA player **Coach Larry Jones**, is now underway— even as the temperatures are to soar again this week. **Persons interested in donating water are asked to make it the 8 oz bottle size.**

Redeemer provides these camps for free to youth ages 8 to 14. The camps run six weeks, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. for either the Monday and Wednesday camp or the Tuesday and Thursday camp. They conclude on **Thursday, July 21.**

Adult Education Class Explores 'Wisdom of Enneagram'

Running into July, the Sunday morning adult education class (to which high-school-age youth are invited!) is now discussing *The Wisdom of the Enneagram*. **Pastor Dave** is leading the class and writes, "That last word is pronounced *ANY-a-gram*. It combines two Greek words that mean *a nine-pointed figure*. The Enneagram is a personality system that describes nine different patterns of thinking, feeling, and acting. Each number represents one of these different patterns, and, according to the theory underlying the Enneagram, one of these numbers applies to each of us. Each number is based on the ways we perceive the world and try to make sense of how it operates and what we experience. Think about it for a moment. How we understand what's going on in the world determines what we pay attention to and how we direct our energy in response. At the heart of the Enneagram is the belief that each of us came to believe something about what we needed to do to survive and to be happy that isn't true. This false belief leads us to focus our energies on areas that take us away from lives that are whole, free, and healthy.

Noisy Offering to Go to Columbus Diaper Coalition

Redeemer's Noisy Offering – that offering of loose change that is deposited in the offering plate just insider the entrance to the Sanctuary – will now be used to support the Columbus Diaper Coalition.

This coalition began in November 2013 because diapers are not covered by Ohio Works First, SNAP (food stamps) benefits, or any other social-service organization.

The Columbus Diaper Coalition is a diaper bank that currently supports four area food pantries. Since the supply chain for infant supplies has been interrupted and with the added stress of inflation, the diaper bank has more and more demand. The vision of the Columbus Diaper Coalition is to grow into a diaper bank that can serve all of Columbus.

Our children are also taken from us by force and sent maney miles from us wear we seldom or ever see them again there to be made slaves of for Life which sometimes is very short by Reson of Being dragged from their mothers Breest Thus our Lives are imbittered to us on these accounts By our deplorable situation we are rendered incapable of shewing our obedience to Almighty God how can a slave perform the duties of a husband to a wife or parent to his child....

There is a great number of us sencear ... members of the Church of Christ how can the master and the slave be said to fulfil that command Live in love let Brotherly Love contuner and abound Beare yea onenothers Bordenes How can the master be said to Beare my Borden when he Beares me down with the Have chanes of slavery and opperson against my will and how can we fulfill our parte of duty to him whilst in this condition and as we cannot searve our God as we ought whilst in this situation. Nither can we reap an equal benefit from the laws of the Land which doth not justify but condemns Slavery or if there had bin aney Law to hold us in Bondage we are Humbely of the Opinion ther never was aney to inslave our children for life when Born in a free Countrey. We therefor Bage your excellency and Honours will give this its deer weight and consideration and that you will accordingly cause an act of the legislative to be pessed that we may obtain our Natural right our freedoms and our children be set at lebetty at the yeare of twenty one for whoues sekkes more petequely your Petitioners is in Duty ever to pray.
