#### The Gift of Life

Most of us have undoubtedly heard this phrase in a variety of contexts. There are even a couple of congregation members who have experienced its reality in a physical way. Organ donation is seen by most denominations as a completely acceptable way of offering a better life to a person with certain conditions. One well-known condition is kidney disease.

Did you know there are more than 95,000 people in the United States who are on the waiting list for a kidney transplant? The average wait time for a kidney from a deceased donor is four years. Think how many people might not live long enough to receive a life-giving kidney.

For several years I have known that I have polycystic kidney disease (PKD). I have just assumed that at some point in the future I would be on dialysis, based on my family history. I have recently been scheduled for an evaluation for a kidney transplant. Since receiving the letter, I have been trying to educate myself and I have learned that

- 1) Receiving a kidney from a living donor is the best option for continuing to live. Not only does it cut down the wait time, but the kidney is in better condition.
- 2) More than half of all people needing a kidney transplant do not ask even one person to donate.
- 3) Family members generally have the best chance of matching the patient.
- 4) Even if the donor's blood type does not match the recipient's type, there can be a "paired exchange."
- 5) During a transplant, a new kidney is placed in the abdominal cavity, but the old, useless kidney is not removed (unless there is a specific reason to disease, etc.).
- 6) Currently the recipient needs to take anti-rejection drugs for the remainder of his/her life.
- 7) Currently there is a trial [Freedom-1 Research Study] using stem cells from a living kidney donor that are placed in the recipient with the goal of not needing the anti-rejection drugs forever.

This past week I donated my "COVID hair" to "Wigs for Kids," for children who have lost their hair and would just like to look and feel like other kids. For me, that was not a big deal – the pandemic gave me the opportunity to have my hair look like it did when I was a child. I really didn't have to do much but let it grow.

Obviously, donating a kidney takes more thought and preparation, including a few days in the hospital following the surgery. I learned that a person who donates a kidney has no difference in life-span prognosis.

Kidney donors need to be between 18 and 60 years of age. My siblings would not qualify based on that alone. Additionally, PKD is hereditary – all of us inherited the disease from our mother, and it's quite likely that I have passed it on to my sons, who are now at the age the condition might surface.

If my evaluation in August says I quality for a kidney transplant, I would encourage each of you – and everyone you know – to consider the possibility of donating a kidney (or other organ) to give the gift of life to another person. Thank you for being my family.

# RLC's Current Worship Protocol: Love Your Neighbor

- \* Masks are required coming into the building and in the Narthex. Folks wishing to continue wearing masks for worship are encouraged to sit in the pews on the north side of the Sanctuary; those who wish to remove their masks may sit on the south side of the Sanctuary.

# July Book Study: Caste: The Origin of Our Discontents

Redeemer is holding its **annual summer book study**, reading and discussing *Caste: The Origin of Our Discontents*, by Pulitzer Prize-winning author **Isabel Wilkerson**. The sessions are running Wednesdays now through **July 27** from 7 to 8:30 p.m. both in-person here at Redeemer and on Zoom.

**Pastor Dave** writes, "If you're like I am, you associate the word 'caste' with a place like India. People are born into a caste and that caste largely determines who they can marry, the jobs open to them, and the kind of life they will have. I never would have described the U.S. as having a caste system. Sure, I know being a White, wealthy male means I've had a lot more options open to me than a lot of people. But 'caste' isn't a word I would have applied to the U.S. ... until I read this book.

"Wilkerson lists eight characteristics of a caste system. And finds all of them are part of our history in the U.S. Central to her argument is the fact that, over time, many White individuals and institutions came to accept treating people differently on the basis of race is part of the natural order of things, even seeing it as God's will. Many of these individuals and institutions convinced themselves that treating Blacks with even extreme cruelty was justified because, well, they aren't 'like us,' they're inferior ... which is another way of saying, they're part of a lower caste than 'we' are.

"It's a remarkable book that feels like it was made to be discussed by people who are open to hearing what Wilkerson has to say, and open to sharing what might be opposing views. We have shown we can talk about hard topics and face hard realities with respect and kindness. This book will invite us to bring those graces together again."

### **BREAD Celebrates Success, Launches Investment Campaign**

B.R.E.A.D. Network members gathered at Christ United Methodist Church on <u>Monday</u>, <u>June 27</u> to celebrate their successes over the past year and their 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of working for justice. Because of B.R.E.A.D.:

- City Council invested \$430,000 for contracts with the National Network for Safe Communities to implement Gun Violence Intervention strategies.
- Nine Restorative Justice Circles are in place to prevent children from entering the Juvenile Justice System.
- -Franklin County now has an Affordable Housing Trust Fund with \$4 million dollars to finance the development of affordable housing.
- -The Franklin County Commissioners continue to approve \$6.5 million for affordable housing.
- Councilmember and President Pro Tempore Elizabeth Brown enthusiastically supported the Columbus canopy Restoration Project to reduce the effects of climate change.

While not every campaign has been completed, B.R.E.A.D. is hopeful with the progress that is being made. It will continue to push for One ID Columbus, the release of one-third of the American Rescue Plan dollars to go to the Affordable Housing Trust, and a reconciliation process with the Columbus Police.

"We also celebrated the attendance at the Nehemiah Action on May 10. Columbus had the largest turnout in the country for the various D.A.R.T. organizations which is the overarching organization for all B.R.E.A.D. type justice organizations. Redeemer Lutheran Church met the goal of having the same number of attendees as the number of our weekly worship attendance. Great job, Redeemer folks!" wrote **Michele Disbro.** 

Then, B.R.E.A.D. kicked off their investment drive. Network members pledged financial support toward a goal of \$180,000. For every \$1 invested in B.R.E.A.D. in 2021, \$41 was leveraged back into the community! Redeemer would love to give an additional gift (besides the membership dues) to support the work towards justice. If you would like to support the work of B.R.E.A.D., please make your check out to Redeemer Lutheran Church and note in the memo line that the donation is for B.R.E.A.D. [Special envelopes are also available on the table in the back of the Sanctuary.] The church will gather the checks and send one large donation to B.R.E.A.D. at the end of the summer.
