Mike has siblings in Maryland, Arkansas, Chicago, and San Diego. Two will be able to come to our wedding.

We're getting married on September 16 at the shelter house in the Park of Roses. We had our first date there on July 5, 2020, after having met on an "over-50s" dating website. A pastor friend of mine I met in Seattle is officiating. We leave for our honeymoon on September 19. I was so glad Mike is as much of a nerd as I am, since he was thrilled with the idea of going on a study trip. We're doing a Road Scholar program in Italy called "Hidden Treasures of Tuscany and Umbria." They take care of everything, we learn some interesting stuff, enjoy a cooking class and a trip to a winery, meet interesting people, and have a good amount of free time as well. It all sounds fantastic. We'll be gone for two weeks. Our dog Isabelle will be enjoying her own air bnb with friends of Mike's.

Those are at least some of the questions you asked Sunday!

Thank you again for the celebration. Thanks also for the gift certificate for a cooking class at Sur La Table. A super appropriate and fun thing for us to do that we'd probably never have invested in on our own.

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: Love Your Neighbor

- * Masks are required coming into the building and in the Narthex. Folks wishing to continue wearing masks for worship are encouraged to sit in the pews on the north side of the Sanctuary; those who wish to remove their masks may sit on the south side of the Sanctuary.
- * Those who wish may stand during the opening and closing hymns and the reading of the Gospel.
- * During the passing of the peace, we suggest you wave or place your palms together under your chin in the "namaste" posture as a way to share the peace in a distanced way.
- * Individual communion elements are available to pick up inside the Sanctuary door or folks can now choose to receive communion at the front of the church from masked servers distributing individual cups for the wine/grape juice.
- * If you wish to use one of the first-floor bathrooms, please follow instructions in the bathroom about disinfecting it after your use. Only one person at a time in the restrooms.

* Please silence cellphones.

We have missed those of you who have not yet returned to in-person worship. There are a whole variety of worship opportunities available. If you feel safe coming back into the sanctuary, your presence and spirit would be a true blessing to us. We are not the same without you.

Redeemer, along with other faith organizations, community leaders, local businesses and organizations work to gather items for those who are homeless or in shelters. Donations may be placed in the bin located in the cloakroom. Cash donations or gift cards are welcome and may be dropped off at the church office.

1. What is your name? Michele Disbro

2. What issues keep you up at night? As I sit here in front of the computer trying to sum up my thoughts, I guess I would have to say I am most troubled by the disparity in our country. So many people experience life drastically different than I do simply because of the color of their skin. Going back to the institution of slavery in our country, people have different opportunities, interactions, and access to power (often achieved through money) based on the color of their skin. I don't know how to reconcile this with my faith. This disparity is the cause of so many problems in our society: lack of affordable housing, equal educational opportunities, economic opportunities, and civil rights. This lack of equality has led to gun violence, civil unrest, and the need for police reform.

3. Why did you join the Justice Team at Redeemer? I joined the Justice Team to become more informed about the disparity in our country and to have open conversation about what might be done.

4. What is your favorite kind of bread? I love garlic bread.

5. Why did you decide to become a Network Member of BREAD? I joined BREAD because I wanted to move from the learning stage into trying to become more active in helping find solutions. Change requires the voice of many people and I want to share my voice.

6. What is your Justice prayer for 2022? Dear God of Justice and Peace, please open the eyes, ears, and hearts of all your children to listen and learn from each other. Help us all to join hands to find ways to lift up the marginalized, to link arms in unity, so that your will might be done on earth.

CMOA Exhibit Features Tapestries with Biblical Themes

The Columbus Museum of Art (CMOA) announced that its newest exhibition, *Raphael —The Power of the Renaissance Images: The Dresden Tapestries and Their Impact*, features six monumental tapestries depicting Biblical scenes. It is now open.

The tapestries have never-before been exhibited in the U.S. and the Columbus Museum of Art is the only American venue for this exhibition. The specific scriptures depicted in the tapestries are:

- St Paul Preaching at Athens (Acts 17:16–34)
- Christ's Charge to Peter (Matthew 16:16–19)
- The Sacrifice at Lystra (Acts 14:8)
- The Healing of the Lame Man (Acts 3:1–8)
- The Conversion of the Proconsul (Acts 13:6–12)

These massive tapestries were created from the same Raphael paintings as the world-famous versions that were woven in the 16th century to hang in the Sistine Chapel. Currently housed in the museum of the Vatican, this original set was temporarily reinstalled in the Sistine Chapel in February 2020 to commemorate the 500-year anniversary of Raphael's death. Each tapestry depicts -- in monumental scale and grand detail -- a Biblical moment in the lives of St. Peter and St. Paul.

Over 100 years after the Vatican tapestries were completed, Raphael's original designs were purchased by King Charles I of England and made into another set of tapestries at the renowned Mortlake Tapestry Manufactory outside London. This second set of tapestries was taken to Germany in the 18th century and now, for the first time ever in the United States, these tapestries will be on view at CMOA, loaned by the Old Masters Gallery of Dresden.

The museum has multiple formats for group visits:

- A Guided Tour: One-hour tours are conversation based and led by trained volunteers to share information about the art and exhibition.
- A Self-Guided Experience: Explore the galleries as individuals or small groups. The Museum can provide stools for slow looking or casual discussion.
- **A VIP Tour with a Curator**: Receive an in-depth look at the incredible history and significance of the tapestries, but also the truly one-of-a-kind exhibition partnership with Columbus' Sister City, Dresden.

The museum strongly encourages weekday visits when the exhibition will be quieter and less crowded and welcomes visitors to extend their visit and enjoy the café and sculpture garden after exploring the museum.
