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## RLC Members Reflect on Churchwide Assembly

For a week earlier in August, hundreds of Lutherans from across the country convened here in Columbus for the 2022 triennial ELCA Churchwide Assembly at the Greater Columbus Convention Center. While there will be other reports of what transpired over those five days, *Reflections* asked those Redeemer members who volunteered to help out at the event to share their most memorable moment from the assembly.

Here are those responses:

### Michele Disbro

Over 800 delegates gathered every day to make decisions regarding the vision of the church. It was an inspiring week for me to gather with so many people from across the country to discuss how the church needs to be willing to change to embrace and welcome our ever changing society. With the theme “Embody the Word,” we worshipped, listened to devotions, and sang songs to keep us focused in our conversations and decisions. We heard many testimonies about the hurt caused by the church followed by action for reconciliation and healing.

We embraced the Indigenous tribes incorporating a beautiful worship service with the Dakota Drum group, a prayer to the Four Directions, and readings in tribal tongues. The Lord’s Prayer was shared in many different languages.

Discussions were held about how the church needs to support clergy as they counsel women who are making difficult decisions in a post-*Roe v. Wade* world in states with very strict laws. Decisions were made regarding the budget, actions needing to be taken, and future studies.

To be clear, I was not a voting delegate. I was simply a tech support volunteer helping the delegates to use their voting machines to vote on the motions and to follow along with the documents on their iPads. Nonetheless, I felt like I was a part of this huge gathering of Lutherans trying to embody the Word to live as faithful servants.

I was encouraged and hopeful at the end of the week. Now the hard work begins. The delegates need to share the bold vision for the ELCA at the synodical and congregational levels so that real action can happen. I will certainly be lifting this hope up in my prayers!

### Julianne Johnson

I volunteered at the Churchwide Assembly as usher at two worship services which were both memorable. The one on Wednesday was a service of acknowledgement and repentance for the church’s role with indigenous peoples. This is directly related to an action by the previous Churchwide Assembly that overwhelmingly passed the Repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery.

It was a moving service, led by Indigenous peoples and full of wisdom and symbolism of their culture. I left this experience with my ignorance exposed once again. Whose land do we worship and live on? Who have we stolen from? What

### RLC's Current Worship Protocol: *Love Your Neighbor*

- \* Masks are required coming into the building and in the Narthex. Folks wishing to continue wearing masks for worship are encouraged to sit in the pews on the north side of the Sanctuary; those who wish to remove their masks may sit on the south side of the Sanctuary.
- \* Those who wish may stand during the opening and closing hymns and the reading of the Gospel.
- \* During the passing of the peace, we suggest you wave or place your palms together under your chin in the "namaste" posture as a way to share the peace in a distanced way.
- \* Individual communion elements are available to pick up inside the Sanctuary door or folks can now choose to receive communion at the front of the church from masked servers distributing individual cups for the wine/grape juice.
- \* If you wish to use one of the first-floor bathrooms, please follow instructions in the bathroom about disinfecting it after your use. Only one person at a time in the restrooms.
- \* Please silence cellphones.

### **A Big Thank You to All Who Helped with Food Giveaway**

THANK YOU to all who helped with the Lutheran Social Services/Mid-Ohio Food Collective food giveaway on Thursday, August 18! That certainly includes all those who contributed paper products – which all “disappeared”! There were 22 volunteers helping distribute 5,758 pounds of food – yes, that is just over half the amount of food we generally distribute.

What was a surprise it was to receive 1,254 pounds of garlic! And this time, 427 pounds of Cheryl's cookies were also delivered. Redeemer served 150 families which meant 498 people which included 141 children and 130 seniors. There were 51 new families.

There are two more giveaways this year. September's “extra” items will be personal products such as soap, shampoo, toothpaste, dental floss, body lotion, nail care kits, etc. “We truly appreciate everyone's help!”

**Dave Lippert**, who thanked **Kathy Zwanziger** and **Sue Watson** for their work with the food giveaway, reports that his “t-shirt will need three washings to get the garlic smell out!!”

This all-day event was started in 1999 by **Redeemer member William McCully** along with a few volunteers as part of the National Make a Difference Day.

On the day of the Good Neighbors Picnic, volunteers work to provide a day of celebration including food, music, games, books, family photos, crafts, and shopping at a Free Store for blankets and winter clothing.

Last year over 350 individuals shopped the Free Store which included coats, blankets, winter clothes, shoes, socks, underwear, and personal hygiene items. Men, women, and children of all ages from local shelters are transported to the park for this day of celebration and fun.

Redeemer, along with other faith organizations, community leaders, local businesses and organizations work to gather items for those who are homeless or in shelters. ## Questions and Answers Around Death and Dying

Who do you want at your bedside when you are close to death? Do your loved ones know how much or how little pain management you want if you can't communicate? If you don't want Uncle Pete (and his insistence that he KNOWS you want OSU Marching Band music played as the family leaves the church) to make decisions about your funeral, how will your spouse know what you actually want?

**Nancy Magargal** reports that these are some of the issues discussed **Wednesday, August 17** when **Dr. Asma Mobin-Uddin** spoke here at Redeemer "about medical ethics and how good planning and honest communication can make end-of-life medical decisions easier on you and your loved ones. Informing our spouses, children and close friends about how we want to be treated as we are preparing to die are very personal and crucially important issues for them to know, and will remove a great deal of stress during a difficult time.

"My mother's sudden death 30 years ago made me so grateful for the dinners she insisted my sister, she and I have every year to discuss her plans for, as she put it, 'a peaceful end.'" Dr. Mobin-Uddin distributed a booklet titled "Choices-Living Well at the End of Life." It is available from Fairfield Medical Center's Patient Representative Department. To request a copy, call 740-687-8555. "I highly recommend that you read it and make a plan and share it with your loved ones. It's one of the most loving things you can do for yourself and those who love you.

"As for me, I'm taking suggestions for the recessional hymn for my funeral. I thank **Sue Yehling** for telling me about her friend who has chosen "Zippity Doo Dah" as her last hoorah!"

1. **Name:** Emily Ott

2. **Justice issues that keep me up at night:** The way we handle poverty – it's expensive to be poor, and our society punishes it at every turn. It feels overwhelming because it spirals into so many other problems of safety, health care, quality of life, etc. And then I start thinking about the institutions that keep things the way they are, including the disproportionate amount of people of color who are poor; it's a lot to try to chip away at.

3. **Why did I join the justice ministry:** I felt very strongly called to take action on issues of racial justice. I didn't know what to do or how, but I felt led to speak up in our congregation and community about the need to interrogate our response to racial justice after **Henry Green** was killed.

4. **Favorite kind of bread:** Dark rye

5. **Justice prayer for 2022:** That we would see some tangible gains, that some of these strategies would have a pronounced impact, to spur greater energy to keep working at this.

other actions have we taken and justified in God's name?

But I can't end there. I also got to usher at the session where the top three candidates for vice president of the ELCA answered three questions. This is the highest position a lay person can hold. What a gifted and diverse group of candidates! A Black woman, a gay man, and a man who was a Muslim 10 years ago! All well qualified, all bringing gifts to the possible job. And the assembly elected **Imran Sadduqui**, the former Muslim. One of those times I'm proud to call myself a Lutheran!

### Al Rider

I volunteered to help on the tech team for the ELCA Assembly, and as we wrapped up our week together, about 1,000 delegates made a rush out the door to catch flights home. There, the next incoming group was already crowding the Convention Center lobby, perhaps 200-300 of them: A COSPLAY convention...!

It was *Maturicon 2022*, an event for digital and board gamers, with hundreds of folks in amazing get-ups: winged angels, horned beasts, walking mushrooms, witches, goblins, knights in armor, wild animals, you name it! Lots of color, plenty of imagination. And as those fully-costumed gamers clustered there in the lobby, suddenly the doors of "Hall A" swung open and out came a thousand fully-costumed Lutherans who had just finished their closing worship: dressed in funny white bathrobes, purple bishop's shirts, odd backward collars, colorful stoles, processional gear including candles, banners ... All mixing together.

I wish I'd had a camera! It was the most amazing and colorful collection of "sinners and saints" I've ever seen, except of course that all the "saints" were also sinners and most of the "sinners" were no doubt also saints. A vivid parable of what our Church is all about as we boldly exit our own congregation every Sunday and head back, charged up with the Gospel, into the colorful and messy world we live in, which has its own agenda and its own spiritual attire. ... where the differently-costumed folks we meet are not our opponents: they are our neighbors. Thanks be to God!

### ***Kathy Updates Her Health Status***

My evaluation by a kidney transplant team was postponed when I had COVID; the next available date is in late October (but I'm hoping someone else will cancel before then). In the meantime, I can look for a living kidney donor.

Who could donate? Healthy people between 18 and 70 can donate a kidney and have no change in life expectancy. A kidney from a living donor is generally healthier than one from a deceased donor – and the wait for the recipient can be decreased from years to months. Donors are often family members or friends, but some people just want to offer the gift of life to a stranger. Donors are given a complete health work-up; expenses are usually paid by the recipient's insurance company (and would be, in my case). Neither sex nor race matter; blood type does – but if the donor's type does not match the recipient, "paired exchanges" are facilitated, and more lives can be saved.

## CMOA Exhibit Features Tapestries with Biblical Themes

The Columbus Museum of Art (CMOA) announced that its newest exhibition, *Raphael —The Power of the Renaissance Images: The Dresden Tapestries and Their Impact*, features six monumental tapestries depicting Biblical scenes. It is now open.

The tapestries have never-before been exhibited in the U.S. and the Columbus Museum of Art is the only American venue for this exhibition. The specific scriptures depicted in the tapestries are:

- St Paul Preaching at Athens (Acts 17:16–34)
- Christ's Charge to Peter (Matthew 16:16–19)
- The Sacrifice at Lystra (Acts 14:8)
- The Healing of the Lame Man (Acts 3:1–8)
- The Conversion of the Proconsul (Acts 13:6–12)

These massive tapestries were created from the same Raphael paintings as the world-famous versions that were woven in the 16th century to hang in the Sistine Chapel. Currently housed in the museum of the Vatican, this original set was temporarily reinstalled in the Sistine Chapel in February 2020 to commemorate the 500-year anniversary of Raphael's death. Each tapestry depicts -- in monumental scale and grand detail -- a Biblical moment in the lives of St. Peter and St. Paul.

Over 100 years after the Vatican tapestries were completed, Raphael's original designs were purchased by King Charles I of England and made into another set of tapestries at the renowned Mortlake Tapestry Manufactory outside London. This second set of tapestries was taken to Germany in the 18th century and now, for the first time ever in the United States, these tapestries will be on view at CMOA, loaned by the Old Masters Gallery of Dresden.

The museum has multiple formats for group visits:

- **A Guided Tour:** One-hour tours are conversation based and led by trained volunteers to share information about the art and exhibition.
- **A Self-Guided Experience:** Explore the galleries as individuals or small groups. The Museum can provide stools for slow looking or casual discussion.
- **A VIP Tour with a Curator:** Receive an in-depth look at the incredible history and significance of the tapestries, but also the truly one-of-a-kind exhibition partnership with Columbus' Sister City, Dresden.

The museum strongly encourages weekday visits when the exhibition will be quieter and less crowded and welcomes visitors to extend their visit and enjoy the café and sculpture garden after exploring the museum.
