2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly Summary of Actions

The following summarizes the actions taken at the 2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly held in August here in Columbus. Gathering under the theme "Embody the Word," the assembly worshiped together in services of eucharist and lament, experienced a liturgy rooted in Indigenous traditions, and heard a public apology in a nonlegislative session to Iglesia Luterana Santa María Peregrina for harm experienced from actions taken by the Sierra Pacific Synod and this church.

The following key actions were taken by the assembly:

- Elected **Imran Siddiqui** of the Southeastern Synod as **vice president** of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

- Directed the ELCA Church Council to establish a **Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church** to reconsider the statements of purpose for each expression of this church, the principles of organizational structure and our shared commitment to dismantle racism, with findings to be reported to the 2025 Churchwide Assembly in preparation for a possible reconstituting convention. Directed an external audit of the governing documents of the ELCA to consider diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility, with findings resulting in recommended changes to the governing documents.

- Authorized revisions to the social statement *Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust*; approved exploration of reconsideration of the four stated positions of "bound conscience."

- Encouraged members, congregations and synods of this church to educate themselves about **Indigenous peoples**, calling on the churchwide organization to work with synods and Indigenous partners to identify sources of funding for ministries for Indigenous peoples, and encouraging restorative justice that could include the return of land to the appropriate Native nations.

- Referred a proposed **study of pay gaps** for rostered ministers to the Church Council.

- Mandated a **review process of the roster manual and policies** related to specialized ministries, on leave from call status, and protocols for removal from the rosters; encouraged bishops and synod councils to use sparingly the process of removal from the roster for nondisciplinary reasons.

- Approved the **budget** proposal for the triennium, including a spending authorization of \$68,814,000 for 2023 for the current fund, along with a spending authorization of \$22,869,000 for ELCA World Hunger.

- Affirmed limits on the **use of nondisclosure agreements** by the churchwide organization; urged synods, congregations and other ministries to apply the same limits.

- Reaffirmed the commitment of this church to the **reduction of greenhouse gas emissions**, directing the churchwide organization to set a goal of a 50 percent reduction of net greenhouse gas pollution by 2030, with a long-range goal of achieving net-zero emissions by 2050.

RLC's Current Worship Protocol: *Love Your Neighbor*

- * Masks are required coming into the building and in the Narthex. Folks wishing to continue wearing masks for worship are encouraged to sit in the pews on the north side of the Sanctuary; those who wish to remove their masks may sit on the south side of the Sanctuary.
- * Those who wish may stand during the opening and closing hymns and the reading of the Gospel.
- * During the passing of the peace, we suggest you wave or place your palms together under your chin in the "namaste" posture as a way to share the peace in a distanced way.
- * Individual communion elements are available to pick up inside the Sanctuary door or folks can now choose to receive communion at the front of the church from masked servers distributing individual cups for the wine/grape juice.
- * If you wish to use one of the first-floor bathrooms, please follow instructions in the bathroom about disinfecting it after your use. Only one person at a time in the restrooms.
- * Please silence cellphones.

Senior Choir rehearsals will begin on Sunday September 11 following worship. **Choir Director Kathy Rapp** says the group will practice in the Sanctuary from 11:15 a.m. until noon. "I try to keep rehearsals to 45 minutes so folks can head home and get on with their day. We usually sing three times a month – more if there are special holy days."

"The biggest ask right now is for someone to head up the Christmas program. However, if nobody is wanting to step in to do this the traditional way, I'm open to something new!"

"In recent years, the person who leads this has found a children's book relevant to the Christmas story, and one older kid reads the book while the younger ones act it out. It's pretty low stress; we just need someone to be the person to coordinate everybody. I'm sure we'll have many happy helpers!"

"If we don't have any takers, then we need someone to volunteer for teaching Sunday School on December 11, to do whatever Advent-y or Christmas-y kind of lesson/activity/gathering sounds good to you."

Good Neighbors Picnic Set for Sept 24

The Good Neighbors Picnic will be held this year on **Saturday, September 24** at Wolfe Park on the east side of Columbus. Redeemer members and friends are invited to begin donating new or gently used blankets and cold weather clothing and accessories to help provide for homeless brothers and sisters in the Columbus area.

This all-day event was started in 1999 by **Redeemer member William McCulley** along with a few volunteers as part of the National Make a Difference Day.

On the day of the Good Neighbors Picnic, volunteers work to provide a day of celebration including food, music, games, books, family photos, crafts, and shopping at a Free Store for blankets and winter clothing.

Last year over 350 individuals shopped the Free Store which included coats, blankets, winter clothes, shoes, socks, underwear, and personal hygiene items. Men, women, and children of all ages from local shelters are transported to the park for this day of celebration and fun.

Redeemer, along with other faith organizations, community leaders, local businesses and organizations work to gather items for those who are homeless or in shelters. Redeemer to Offer Active Shooter Training

On **Saturday, October 22**, from 10 a.m. to noon, the Columbus Police Department will offer an active shooter training here at Redeemer. Given the number of shootings in places of worship, Redeemer's Church Council is sponsoring this program so the congregation might learn some best practices about how to respond if it finds itself in an active shooter situation.

"Of course, we never want to have to face this but no one ever expects it," **Pastor Dave** explained. "So we want to have a plan if it does. This is open to the whole congregation. It would be good to have as many of us trained as possible."

New Monthly Book Group Planned

Keep your eyes opened for word of a new monthly book group! Redeemer's summer book discussions have been so successful and well-attended, **Pastor Dave** reports he and **Sheryl Owens** thought it would be fun to do a monthly book group.

However, instead of spending four consecutive weeks on a book, the group will just discuss the whole book on one Wednesday evening. "We plan on having a variety of books – fiction, non-fiction, short stories, essays, poetry. Sheryl and I will pick the first several, and then participants will make suggestions of ones they'd like us to explore together. We'll get an October date to you soon for our first conversation. It will be both in-person and on Zoom."

Kristi Hildebrand has asked BREAD Network Members to answer a handful of questions, sharing their answers here in *Reflections*. Next up: **Emily Ott**.

1. **Name:** Emily Ott

2. **Justice issues that keep me up at night:** The way we handle poverty – it's expensive to be poor, and our society punishes it at every turn. It feels overwhelming because it spirals into so many other problems of safety, health care, quality of life, etc. And then I start thinking about the institutions that keep things the way they are, including the disproportionate amount of people of color who are poor; it's a lot to try to chip away at.

3. **Why did I join the justice ministry:** I felt very strongly called to take action on issues of racial justice. I didn't know what to do or how, but I felt led to speak up in our congregation and community about the need to interrogate our response to racial justice after **Henry Green** was killed.

4. **Favorite kind of bread:** Dark rye

5. **Justice prayer for 2022:** That we would see some tangible gains, that some of these strategies would have a pronounced impact, to spur greater energy to keep working at this.

Since the supply chain for infant supplies has been interrupted and with the added stress of inflation, the diaper bank has more and more demand. The vision of the Columbus Diaper Coalition is to grow into a diaper bank that can serve all of Columbus.

2022 ELCA Churchwide Assembly Summary of Actions *cont'd from p. 1*

- Called for a **review of the nomination and elections processes** used by synods and the churchwide organization.
- Responded to **memorials** on diversity; nuclear weapons; voting rights and Washington, D.C., statehood; strategies for fortifying urban ministries; a Black migrant strategy; the right to boycott; gun violence; LGBTQIA+ welcome; substance abuse; *Roe v. Wade*; remembrance of Armenian, Assyrian and Greek genocide; parental and medical family leave; a process for pre-identification of nominees for the Office of the Presiding Bishop; revisions to the mission development process; consideration of communion practices related to remote worship; affirmation of the task force created by the Church Council to review the discipline process; and a social message on child abuse and protection.
- Approved or ratified **amendments to the Constitutions, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions** of the ELCA, most of which were related to general clarifications and updates; inclusive language; synod-authorized ministry; designation of advisory members by the Church Council; boards of the separately incorporated ministries; and election procedures for officers and the Churchwide Assembly.
- **Elected members** of the Church Council, Committee on Appeals, Committee on Discipline, Nominating Committee and boards of the separately incorporated ministries.

Kathy Updates Her Health Status

Kathy Zwanziger wrote, "My evaluation by a kidney transplant team was postponed when I had COVID; the next available date is in late October (but I'm hoping someone else will cancel before then). In the meantime, I can look for a living kidney donor.

"Who could donate? Healthy people between 18 and 70 can donate a kidney and have no change in life expectancy. A kidney from a living donor is generally healthier than one from a deceased donor – and the wait for the recipient can be decreased from years to months. Donors are often family members or friends, but some people just want to offer the gift of life to a stranger. Donors are given a complete health work-up; expenses are usually paid by the recipient's insurance company (and would be, in my case). Neither sex nor race matter; blood type does – but if the donor's type does not match the recipient, "paired exchanges" are facilitated, and more lives can be saved.

CMOA Exhibit Features Tapestries with Biblical Themes

The Columbus Museum of Art (CMOA) announced that its newest exhibition, *Raphael —The Power of the Renaissance Images: The Dresden Tapestries and Their Impact*, features six monumental tapestries depicting Biblical scenes. It is now open through Sunday, October 30.

The tapestries have never-before been exhibited in the U.S. and the Columbus Museum of Art is the only American venue for this exhibition.

These massive tapestries were created from the same Raphael paintings as the world-famous versions that were woven in the 16th century to hang in the Sistine Chapel and depict -- in monumental scale and grand detail -- a Biblical moment in the lives of St. Peter and St. Paul. A second set of the tapestries were woven at the Mortlake Tapestry Manufactory outside London. This second set of tapestries was taken to Germany in the 18th century and now, for the first time ever in the United States, these tapestries will be on view at CMOA, loaned by the Old Masters Gallery of Dresden.

The museum strongly encourages weekday visits when the exhibition will be quieter and less crowded and welcomes visitors to extend their visit and enjoy the café and sculpture garden after exploring the museum.
