How Was Your Honeymoon? Thoughts from 40,000 feet

I wrote this flying over the Atlantic Ocean on October 3.

At different times on our 10-day Road Scholar trip, "Hidden Treasures of Tuscany and Umbria," and during our three days solo in Rome, I thought about how I'd answer when people asked, "How was your honeymoon?" I tried to think of specifics: a *specific* hill village, or meal, or conversation I particularly loved. When nothing came to mind, I realized the joy of this trip wasn't about any specific thing I saw or ate or did. The joy of this trip was that *Mike and I were on our honeymoon*.

We could have been anywhere. But we were in a ridiculously beautiful part of the world, walking through hill towns on 2,000-year-old streets, seeing art that grew out of people's deepest thoughts and feelings and imaginations that redefined what art could be. We ate food and drank wine that had been grown and made within a stone's throw of where we were. Every night we had two-hour dinners, talking with people on our tour whom we'd just met, enjoying the kind of openended time that's possible when no one has anywhere else to be but where they are. We looked up at church ceilings, and looked down alleys, and looked across valleys at olive groves and vineyards and other hill towns, and opened our mouths to forks-full of food, cups, and glasses of deliciousness ... and kept saying "Wow" – sometimes loudly and sometimes like a breath. Because there was always new beauty to take in. So much beauty to take in. And to be doing it together, to be doing it with my husband

At times, I forgot we were on our honeymoon. But then I'd see my wedding ring, or Mike's ring, and I'd remember. When you fill out the online information for the Road Scholar program, there's a question about whether the trip is a celebration of something. Of course I said it was for our honeymoon. At our first hotel in the village of Anghiari, we were given the best room in the joint, complete with a roof-top balcony overlooking most of the old city. The 12 other people in the group also reminded me it was our honeymoon when they congratulated us or asked us questions about "us." They knew we were on our honeymoon because, at the welcome gathering at the beginning of the trip when each of us introduced ourselves, Mike pointed to me and said, "Last Friday, I married him." And everybody in the group clapped ... which was pretty awesome.

To get a feel for the beauty we were surrounded by and immersed in, check out online a few of the different places we visited: Anghiari, Monterchi, Sansepulcro, Cortona, Arezzo, Spoleto, La Verna, Trevi, Gubbio, Puglia, Assisi, Orvieto – particularly Cortona and Orvieto. Not hard places to be at all!

At the end of the Road Scholar portion of our trip, we had three days on our own in Rome. The Colosseum, Roman Forum, Palatine Hills, Vatican Museums, Sistine Chapel were all walkable from our Airbnb. We couldn't get close enough to cont'd on page 5



RLC's Current Worship Protocol: Love Your Neighbor

Given the number of shootings in places of worship, Redeemer's Church Council is sponsoring this program so the congregation might learn some best practices about how to respond if it finds itself in an active shooter situation.

"Of course, we never want to have to face this but no one ever expects it," **Pastor Dave** explained. "So we want to have a plan if it does. This is open to the whole congregation. It would be good to have as many of us trained as possible."

Adult Ed Class to Offer Update on BREAD, Explore Different Ways to Put Commitment to Justice into Action



We have a special adult ed class this Sunday. It's a house meeting for our BREAD ministry. BREAD – Building Responsibility, Equality, and Dignity – is an organization made up of 44 faith communities in Columbus and Franklin County that researches concrete areas of injustice and comes up with proven policy proposals that they present to policymakers for their support and commitment. This year, these proposals address issues of environmental injustice, expanding affordable housing, reducing neighborhood violence, and finding alternatives to school suspensions so children and youth stay engaged with educational institutions. We'll talk about these proposals and share what areas of injustice we care most deeply

about. We'll also explore a variety of ways you might put your passion for justice into practice with our BREAD ministry. So join us **Sunday, October 16** from 11:15-12:15. If you have friends who care about justice and who might be looking for ways to feel like they're making a difference, invite them! We have people in this Ministry who aren't connected to this or any congregation. People care and want to feel like they're part of something that matters! Sue Watson and Dave Shull will facilitate our conversation.

BREAD House Meetings Set for Oct. 16, Oct. 18

Kristi Hildebrand reports that BREAD "had a very good meeting with **Mayor Andrew Ginther** in July. "They used a restorative approach to build bridges and have an agreement to meet periodically during the year. They hope to meet again in October to discuss BREAD's campaigns. One of the mayor's assistants is quite familiar with BREAD and said he'd always been impressed by the 'solid research' BREAD does before adopting a particular policy solution for which to advocate."

BREAD will not take on a new problem this year so that they can focus on their current large campaigns around environment, housing and violence.

BREAD has also decided that the annual assembly this year will be a "mini-action" on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>November 15</u>. They will be working to get other officials to attend and make commitments to further action on the campaigns. The director of public safety has committed to attend.

Here at Redeemer, there will be two house meetings: on <u>Sunday, October 16</u>, at 11:15 a.m. during the adult education hour at the church, hosted by <u>Pastor Dave Shull</u> (see article above) and <u>Tuesday, October 18</u>, at 6:30 p.m. at <u>Emily</u> and <u>Nate Ott's</u> home in Gahanna. These are a great opportunity to talk about justice issues that you care about and to hear about what is going on with BREAD.

"Redeemer has been a member of BREAD for one year now. We had a great turnout for the Nehemiah Action and exceeded our attendance goal. A big thank you to the congregation for their donations to BREAD. We are pleased to announce that Redeemer has donated \$1,240 to BREAD. This is a great example of living out our faith and our values!"

Trevi Fountain to throw a coin over our shoulders, which guarantees a return trip to Rome. But we watched some among the hordes of others there do it. Our last meal was one of our best in Italy: a six-course Euro grocery-store creation of still-warm baguettes, pecorino cheese, fresh tomatoes, perfectly-ripe pears, and a small bottle of chianti left for us by the host of our Airbnb. (Does the wine there seem to taste better *just because* you're in Italy?...) We capped-off the dinner with a walk to the gelateria at the end of the street. Armed with one of the world's greatest dessert creations, we stepped out the gelateria door onto one of the many bridges over the Tiber River. We stopped part-way across. A half-moon shone out of a perfectly clear night sky. We leaned over the bridge and watched the river for a while. Then we turned, leaned against the bridge, and watched the tide of people streaming by. Even though it was 9:30 p.m. on a school night, every size, shape, color, and language – and every possible flavor of gelato – streamed by.

I thought about the song Mike and I walked in to for our wedding just two weeks earlier:

The colors of the rainbow so pretty in the sky are also on the faces of people going by.

I see friends shaking hands, saying, "How do you do?"

They're really saying, "I love you."

I hear babies cry, I watch them grow.

They'll learn much more than I'll ever know.

And I think to myself, "What a wonderful world."

Yes, I think to myself, "What a wonderful world."

That's how this honeymoon trip was: a series of endless invitations to open myself to the wonder and beauty of this world. And if I choose to keep the spirit of our honeymoon alive in me, then I won't need to go to anywhere *else* to feel it and share it. I'll see, eat, and do the wonder and beauty that's right in front of me.
