Brad Binau: *Reflections on Next Chapter*

*A lot of us are retired and have been for a while. Some of us have just begun that chapter. Others are getting close. Still others are years away. In a week, Redeemer member **Brad Binau** retires after teaching at Trinity Seminary for 29 years. He wrote a piece for the Trinity Seminary newsletter reflecting on the completion of the first two chapters of his life and looking ahead to beginning the third chapter. With his permission, and in the hope that some of his thoughts might guide some of us, no matter which chapter of our lives we living, we share his words with you. – Pastor Dave*

Forty-nine autumns ago, my parents drove me from my hometown of Upper Sandusky, OH, to Capital University. Since eighth grade I had felt a call to ministry and enrolling at Capital was a step in that vocational direction. We parked in the lot next to the Capital Law School, which in 1973 occupied the space that now houses Brassica and Bexley Urgent Care on the northeast corner of college and Main. As we carried boxes and bags across Main Street to Lehmann Hall, which stood on what is now the green space between Blackmore Library and Renner Hall, I nodded toward the seminary and I said to my mother, “If all goes well I’ll be there in four years.” All did go well. Very well in fact. After seminary, and a dozen years divided between graduate work at Princeton Theological Seminary and parish ministry in La Jolla, CA, I returned to Trinity 29 autumns ago as a faculty member. I’ve been here ever since. And now the time has come to close this chapter of my life. On **October 31** I will retire.

I think of my life as having three chapters. The first was preparing for my calling. The second was actually doing it. And now I am turning the page to author chapter three. And what will I do in retirement? That’s a question everyone seems to ask. And my answer is, “I’m not sure, but I’m reasonably intelligent and I’m pretty sure I can figure it out.” To begin, I’m going to embrace the rest of this academic year as sabbatical time. I’m looking forward to having time to ponder. **Erik Erikson** wrote that the stage of life I am entering is a time for “the acceptance of one’s own and only life cycle and of the people that have become significant to it as something that had to be and that, by necessity, permitted of no substitutions.” So I am going to ponder what has been.

Looking back over my time at Trinity, both as a student and as a faculty member, I’ll be pondering and giving thanks for significant people: the faculty who formed me as a student and those who became my faculty colleagues, staff who made so many things possible, and, of course, students.

My rough estimate (at which I arrived by counting faces on the photos in the Alumni Room) is that some 900 students have graduated from Trinity since I joined the seminary. A slightly rougher guess (because I never developed the knack for maintaining detailed gradebooks as **Wally Taylor** did) is that I had some 650 of those students in class or I-Group. If a study conducted a few years ago by the Association of Theological School is correct, that one person in ministry over a 30-year span can influence the lives of 100,000 people, then it is possible that through the ministries of hundreds of Trinity graduates I may have indirectly influenced millions of lives.

Mission Endowment Fund Seeks Suggestions for 2022 Distribution

Every year the congregation donates a percentage (4 percent) of the year-end market value of the Mission Endowment Fund (MEF) to other charities on behalf of the congregation. The 2022 3rd quarter market value was \$123,400 which would provide \$4,936 for distribution, **Dave Engel**, chair of the Special Funds Teams (SFT) reports. "The final amount may increase or decrease depending on the fourth quarter value.

The guidelines for distribution, as established in the constitution; to establish/support ministries of outreach on behalf of the congregation, and to further partnerships in mission through the synod and other arms of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Some prior recipients include LSS Food Pantry, Lutheran Memorial Camp/HopeWood Pines, Bishop Griffin Resource Center, Mid-Ohio Food Co-operative, Grace Missions Inc, Haiti, Lutheran Social Services, Renewed Strength Zambia, Ronald McDonald House, WELS Youth Leadership Program, and Groveport Special Olympics.

SFT is seeking suggestions for the use of the funds for 2022. Please use the **pink** form found at the end of *Reflections* or on a table in the Narthex to nominate possible recipients.

Complete it and place it in the Sunday offering plate or leave it in the church office. Suggestions are due by **Sunday, November 27**.

The SFT will then make its recommendation to council for action by the congregation at the Annual Meeting in January.

Update from Church Council

Church Council President Wendy Stoica reports, “The church has been staffing a nursery attendant since worship services returned in-person but we find that few families or children are using this service. We believe this is a positive sign that children are welcome in worship, however, it is a concern about whether we should continue paying for a weekly attendant.

“Beginning in November we will discontinue the paid nursery attendant for Sunday worship understanding that the nursery room is always available for parents to utilize. We will schedule a nursery attendant for special services (Christmas, Easter) and rely on feedback from families to ensure we remain a welcoming congregation for young children.

“Council continues to discuss evolving changes with making members and visitors feel safe within the building. Beginning next **Sunday, October 30** the sanctuary will return to mask-optional during worship. We encourage the congregation to continue sharing feedback with us.

“The 2023 budget preparation is in high gear. A final draft will be available for the congregation in early January. We will schedule opportunities to meet as a group to review and discuss questions prior to the Annual Meeting.”

I'll also be pondering and giving thanks for significant events that I had a hand in shaping but that also shaped me: the transition from our one-year MIC program to our two-year LIC program, the renaming and reshaping of our "Introduction to Pastoral Care and Counseling" course to "Care of Souls," my six and a half years as academic dean and the launching of our 2+2 internship program, the seminary's acquisition by Capital and the building of relationships on the east side of College Avenue, the construction and dedication of the Meuser Courtyard, our becoming an RIC Seminary, opportunities to travel on behalf of the seminary – to Tanzania, Russia, Estonia, Germany.

And I am going to look ahead and ponder what the future, to the extent that I have any say in the matter, will be. I'm not bereft of ideas; I've filled more than a page in my journal with possibilities. I have a growing interest in cosmology and its implications for theology. The burgeoning literature on shame can keep me occupied as long as I want it to. Cooking, drawing, traveling, singing, and a lot of home projects all await exploration.

As I approach the beginning of chapter three I'm experiencing the feeling of being almost at the top of that first big hill on a roller coaster. There has been a lot of expectation on the climb. Next comes that liminal moment when you're neither climbing nor descending but suspended in a brief pause at the apex. Then you're off on a new adventure that combines exhilaration and terror in some unpredictable ratio.

It's the unpredictable part that I find most exciting. My hope for the future – both my personal future and the future of the cosmos – rests not in what I can predict, or on whether any specific dreams I have come true. My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus, God with us. At the beginning of chapter three all I need to take for my own are the words of **Julian of Norwich**: "All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well."

To all of you who have made my journey so meaningful and memorable, thank you. And for all who are continuing your journey at Trinity, may deep meaning and lasting memories be yours as well.

Update on Kathy Z's Health Journey

Kathy Zwanziger reports on the latest updates regarding her health journey: "My initial kidney transplant evaluation was **Friday, October 21** – but it was only the beginning of an evaluation as a potential kidney transplant recipient. Besides meeting with a nurse coordinator, my support person and I met with a doctor who asked lots of questions of me and answered many of my questions. I need to get clearance from all my doctors (including my dentist), have an appointment with a transplant social worker, and speak with a dietitian.

"My appointment concluded with the drawing of approximately 20 vials of blood and a chest x-ray. If all these conditions can be met within 90 days, the transplant team will debate the suitability of a kidney transplant. If the answer is positive, it was emphasized that a living donor would greatly reduce the amount of wait time, from three to five years to several months.

"Thank you for joining me in this journey."

Wartburg Presents Award to Former RLC Member

Congratulations go out to former Redeemer member **Jacqueline Bussie**, an author, professor, theologian and advocate for justice, who Monday received the Wartburg College annual Grave Award. This award, now in its 33rd year, honors one "whose life is nurtured and guided by a strong sense of Christian calling and who is making a significant contribution to community, church and society." It is named for the late Judge Henry N. and Helen T. Graven of Greene, whose lives reflected those same commitments.

As the executive director of the Collegeville (Minnesota) Institute for Ecumenical and Cultural Research, Bussie helps bring together people of diverse backgrounds and perspectives to foster healing through the power of religious ideas, insight and practices.

"In her current position, she is serving as a leader who empowers writers to tell their stories and to write authentically at the intersection of faith and public life. Having witnessed the way that her writing empowers our students to live at their own intersections of faith and learning, I expect even more amazing things to come," wrote Caryn Riswold, Wartburg's Mike and Marge McCoy Family Chair in Lutheran Heritage and Mission.

Bussie also taught religion, theology and interfaith studies courses at Concordia College in Moorhead, Minn., where she served as the founding director of the Forum on Faith and Life.

She is regularly featured as a keynote speaker at synod assemblies and is often invited to speak for congregational book reads, community events on faith and life, and various other academic and professional gatherings. Her leadership roles within the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America include time on the Theological Education Advisory Council and the Faculty Working Group on Lutheran Higher Education.

She also served on the Network of ELCA Colleges and Universities' committee of theologians who wrote "Rooted and Open," the statement that united all NECU institutions with a shared mission that celebrates the schools' Lutheran heritage while embracing the diversity on their campuses. Bussie also helped craft the ELCA's Interreligious Policy Statement.

Her books include "Outlaw Christian: Finding Authentic Faith by Breaking the Rules," which won the 2017 Gold Medal Illumination Award for Christian Living, and "Love Without Limits: Jesus' Radical Vision for a Love with No Exceptions," which has been recognized with the Readers' Favorite Bronze Medal International Book Award for Christian Living and the 2020 IAN Outstanding Religion Book of the Year Award.

"Dr. Bussie is a model of lay leadership in the Lutheran church tradition, and her extensive body of work exemplifies a strong sense of Christian calling," Riswold said.
