Six months [after he visited Mary's kinswoman, Elizabeth, to tell her she would give birth to John the Baptizer,] the angel Gabriel was sent from God to a city of Galilee named Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David; and the virgin's name was Mary. And Gabriel came to her and said, "Hail, O favored one, God is with you."

But Mary was greatly troubled at the saying, and considered in her mind what sort of greeting this might be.

And the angel said to her, "Fear not, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High; and God will give him the throne of his ancestor David. And he will reign over the house of Jacob and Rachel for ever; and of his dominion there will be no end."

And Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?"

Luke 2:2-7 – Revised Standard Version



And also with you. We lift them to the Lord.


It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Long after this holy night in Bethlehem, Jesus gathered with his friends in Jerusalem. After supper, he took a cup of wine, gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is the blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink this, do so to remember me."

This is Christ the Lord. Masters be ye glad! Christmas is come in, and no one should be sad: REFRAIN




Prayer of Thanksgiving
