In Preparation for Worship


- Within the sanctuary please remember that some people use this time of silence to prepare for worship.



WE PROCLAIM THE WORD

Reading Romans 4:1-5, 16-18 (The Message, inclusivized)

A reading from St. Paul's letter to the early church at Rome

How do we fit what we know of Abraham, our first parent in the faith, into a new way of looking at things? If Abraham, by what he did for God, got God to approve him, he could certainly have taken credit for it. But the story we're given is a God-story, not an Abraham-story. What we read in Scripture is, "Abraham entered into what God was doing for him, and that was the turning point. He trusted God to set him right instead of trying to be right on his own."

If you're a hard worker and do a good job, you deserve your pay; we don't call your wages a gift. But if you see that the job is too big for you, that it's something only God can do, and you trust God to do it—you could never do it for yourself no matter how hard and long you worked—well, that trusting-God-to-do-it is what gets you set right with God, by God. Sheer gift.

This is why the fulfillment of God's promise depends entirely on trusting God and God's way, and then simply embracing God and God's actions. God's promise arrives as pure gift. That's the only way everyone can be sure to get in on it, those who keep the religious traditions and those who have never heard of them. For Abraham is parent of us all. He is not our racial parent—that's reading the story backward. Abraham is our faith parent.

We call Abraham "parent" not because he got God's attention by living like a saint, but because God made something out of Abraham when he was a nobody.

May we listen for what the Spirit is saying to the church



Gospel

John 3:1-8, 16-18 (The Message, inclusivized) The Holy Gospel according to St. John Glory to you, O Lord.

There was a man of the Pharisee sect, Nicodemus, a prominent leader among the Jews. Late one night he visited Jesus and said, "Rabbi, we all know you're a teacher straight from God. No one could do all the Godpointing, God-revealing acts you do if God weren't in on it."

Jesus said, "You're absolutely right. Take it from me: Unless a person is born from above, it's not possible to see what I'm pointing to—to God's beloved community."

"How can anyone," said Nicodemus, "be born who has already been born and grown up? You can't re-enter your mother's womb and be born again. What are you saying with this 'born-from-above' talk?"

Jesus said, "You're not listening. Let me say it again. Unless a person submits to this original creation—the 'wind-hovering-over-the-water' creation, the invisible moving the visible, a baptism into a new life—it's not possible to enter God's beloved community. When you look at a baby, it's just that: a body you can look at and touch. But the person who takes shape within is formed by something you can't see and touch—the Spirit—and becomes a living spirit.

"So don't be so surprised when I tell you that you have to be 'born from above'—out of this world, so to speak. You know well enough how the wind blows this way and that. You hear it rustling through the trees, but you have no idea where it comes from or where it's headed next. That's the way it is with everyone 'born from above' by the wind of God, the Spirit of God."

"This is how much God loved the world: God sent the Only Begotten One into the world so that no one need be destroyed; by believing in the Only Begotten, anyone can have a whole and lasting life. God didn't go to all the trouble of sending the Only Begotten merely to point an accusing finger, telling the world how bad it was. This One came to help, to put the world right again. Anyone who trusts in the Only Begotten is acquitted; those who refuse to trust have long since been under the death sentence without knowing it. And why? Because, when introduced, they failed to believe in this one-of-a-kind Only Begotten of God."


We take time to greet one another with words like Peace be with you.

Jesus invited all who were hungry for food, healing, justice, and joy to share this communion meal.


Since this is his meal, and he is present to us in it, all are welcome.

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
Great Thanksgiving


