Someone Who Has Changed Your Life

Every Thursday night, from 6:30-9 p.m., I gather with six other guys for a men's group I've been part of since moving back to Columbus in August 2017. The original group of guys can't agree on when they actually started meeting, but the general consensus is it was around 2010. Two of the founding members were housemates of mine when we rented half a house on Neil Avenue in 1983-84.

The group has been such a Godsend for me. The fact that they live within a one-and-a-half miles of each other was the main reason I chose to buy the house I did. I wanted to be close to the people I knew would be among my closest friends here. Not only do we meet every Thursday, we have movie nights and games nights and holiday celebrations. We're even spending a week together in Traverse City, Michigan, this July.

Each week, a different one of us is responsible for the topic for the evening. We're in the midst of a seven-week topic right now. Each of us has an evening to introduce the group to someone who has changed our lives. This isn't a relative or friend, but someone who is more widely known. The first two in the group introduced us to the Buddhist monk **Thich Nhat Hanh** and the writer **Richard Bach**, of *Jonathan Livingston Seagull* fame.

I'm up this week. My person is someone I've mentioned a few times here: a Jesuit priest from India named **Anthony De Mello**. He's changed my life because he calls on people to look honestly at the ways our culture, families, and religions have taught us to understand what it means to live and to love. He says so many of us don't question how we've been taught to see the world that we're not aware there are other ways to see and understand it.

One of the main ways De Mello has changed me is by how he talks about love. I've always thought love is first a feeling we have toward someone or something. De Mello says no: *It is only inasmuch as you see someone as they really are here and now and not as they are in your memory or your desire or in your imagination ... that you can truly love them; otherwise it is not the person that you love but the idea that you have formed of this person, or this person as the object of your desire not as they are in themselves. Therefore the first act of love is to see this person or this object, this reality, as it truly is (The Way to Love, pp. 131-2).*

Maybe it's happened to you. You've just spent time with someone, and as you leave, you say to yourself, "I really feel seen." When you have felt that way, what's happened between you and the person you were with? My guess is you felt like that person really listened to you. You felt like they have some sense of what it's like to be you, and what you're going through right now. My guess is the person didn't try to change you or give you all kinds of advice. They created space for you to come to some kind of clarity, and to decide for yourself the next step you might take. This is what the unconditional love of Jesus looks like. The love that led the woman at the well from March 19's Gospel to run back to the

RLC Continues Collecting Items for LWR Personal Care Kits

Julianne Johnson reported Sunday that 100 personal care kits have already been assembled for Lutheran World Relief (LWR) and believes Redeemer will have no problem reaching the revised goal of 150 kits. Items still needed are soap and nail clippers. She said the collection will continue through Lent. The kits include the following:

1. Light weight bath size towels – should be **between** 20" x 40" and 27" x 52". Please remember they are to be light-weight and preferably dark colors (so they are easy-to dry and won't show dirt as quickly).
2. Bars of soap equaling 8-9 ounces in original packaging.
3. Adult toothbrushes.
4. **Sturdy** combs.
5. Metal nail clippers.

Please avoid items with religious symbols or messages or the camouflage, military symbols or American flag. No additional items will be included. For those who prefer to give money, write a check to Redeemer but in the memo area put "LWR Personal Care Kits." The funds will be used to complete kits. Any balance will be sent to LWR for shipping costs.

Redeemer Holds BREAD Network Meeting

Kristi Hildebrand reports that the Redeemer BREAD Network Meeting took place **Monday, March 13**. **Pastor Dave** asked the group of network members "Why are you engaged in this work?" The participants' answers were similar: "I see people in need and think 'Someone should do something' and by participating in BREAD, I can be a someone who does something. I kept learning and getting enraged, but BREAD allows me to get engaged and do something. I like being a part of a group that has a mechanism to get things done. I didn't know how to help, and I wanted to do more than just give money. BREAD is a way to really DO something in a group that really cares, is faith based and is diverse. I like working with an organization that is organized."

Redeemer's BREAD liaison **Rob Sievert-Wagner** reported on several of the current campaigns on the BREAD roadmap:

- **"Families First and Housing Now!"** Columbus and Franklin County are sitting on millions of dollars from the American Rescue Plan. We will continue pushing city and county leaders to spend one-third of those dollars for affordable housing. At a recent Housing Convening in Columbus, they shared that while a number of cities have committed \$2-\$3 million of their American Rescue Plan dollars to programs to expand affordable housing, Louisville has committed \$40 million to affordable housing. BREAD's sister organization in Louisville, called CLOUD, lobbied heavily for that action.
- **"Stop Violence! Build Trust!"** After eight years of pushing for proven group violence reduction strategies, a new initiative is underway called the Columbus Violence Reduction initiative. Under the leadership of **Director of Public Safety Robert Clark**, a team of six have been hired to work weekly with the National Network for Safe Communities to implement the initiative with fidelity. Clark has committed to attend the Nehemiah Action on April 25.

The commissioning of the BREAD network members took place during worship on March 19.

The meeting with the BREAD prayer: O God, to those who have hunger give bread; to those who have bread give a hunger for justice.

New Worship Response Being Used to First Reading

Now through the season of Easter, the Worship Team is asking members of the congregation to offer a new response to the first reading. At the end of the reading, instead of the reader's saying, "Word of God, Word of Life," to which the congregation responds, "Thanks be to God," the reader will say, "May we listen for what the Spirit is saying to the church," and the congregation will respond, "Amen."

"The reason for this change has to do with the fact that a number of Bible readings contain images of violence, cruelty, and hatred. If we want to take these texts seriously, and wrestle with the hard issues they raise, we believe we can't simply declare them to be 'word of God, word of life.' We believe responding to such texts by saying, 'May we listen for what the Spirit is saying to the church. Amen,' names the reality that these are hard texts, and that their meaning for today is not at all clear. So we ask for the Spirit's guidance to help us listen for what they may be saying to us who live in a very different time and reality than when they were written," **Pastor Dave** explains.

"Please let any of the Worship Team members know what your experiences using this new response are. Your feedback will help guide our decision about continuing to use it after Easter."

The members of the worship team are **Michelle Clemence, Jennifer Collins, Karen Kent, Don Luck, Kathy Rapp, Dave Shull, and Wendy Stoica.**

Redeemer Book Group to Discuss *The Personal Librarian*

Redeemer's Book Group next meets on Wednesday evening, April 19, at 7 p.m., in-person at the church and on Zoom. They will discuss *The Personal Librarian*. **Donna Voelkel**, who recommended the book, says it is a historical novel by **Marie Benedict** and **Victoria Christopher Murray**. **Belle da Casta Greene** was a young Black librarian who identified herself as White. She was hired by financier **J.P. Morgan** to manage and create a library for his large collections of ancient manuscripts, etchings, and noted oil paintings. After Morgan's death, Belle was successful in encouraging J.P. Morgan's son, Jack, to turn the library into public institution to honor his father.

There is much more to say, but that's for the reader to find out and discuss!

village from her conversation with Jesus and exclaim: “Come and see someone who has told me everything I’ve ever done. He can’t be the Messiah, can he?” (John 4.29)

That’s how being truly seen leaves us feeling. That is why De Mello says love is about seeing someone for who they really are, right here and right now. We don’t feel judged. We don’t feel like someone is trying to make us who they want us to be. We don’t feel like someone still sees us like we were 20 years before. They’re not still punishing us for something that happened a long time ago. They’re not comparing us to anyone else. They are looking at us with fresh, open eyes. And they want to know what it’s like to be us, in this moment.

And that’s how we show love to ourselves as well. We don’t look at who we used to be, or who we wish we were. We don’t compare ourselves to others. We look with kindness, openness, and honesty at ourselves. And let the love flow.

I have been so taken by De Mello’s image of love that I used it for the first part of the marriage vows I promised Mike at our wedding last September. This is the first part of what I said:

With gratitude and joy, I stand before you, and before these people we share so much love with, and I say “Yes” to becoming your husband. I say “yes” to seeing you as you really are right now, not as who I wish you were. I say “yes” to who you are now, and to who you are becoming.

If you got the chance to introduce people you care about to someone who’s changed your life, who would that be? How would you talk about why they’ve had the impact they’ve had, and the ways they’ve changed you?

I’m thinking about an adult education class that would focus on this topic, where we’d meet people who’ve made an impact on each other in significant ways. That could be a marvelous way both to get to know each other better, and to introduce us to people who might end up changing our lives as well.

Be thinking about who that might be for you!

An Update from Kathy Z

Kathy Zwanziger has sent another update on her journey on dialysis and toward receiving a kidney transplant: "Murphy's Law' says that 'if anything can go wrong, it will.' Recently week I had another medical procedure – a heart cath. After showing me the catheter (MUCH smaller than my PD catheter) and the size of a stent (should one be necessary), the doctors tried to go in through the (preferred) right wrist, but there was a 'roadblock.' Instead, they went in through my left wrist.

"The heart cath was the last procedure I needed to 'pass' before I would be cleared for a kidney transplant. I had needed to start dialysis because the process includes inserting a contrast dye which is very hard on kidneys and can cause them to fail.

"From family history, I have seen that dialysis affects people differently. Mom also had PD (peritoneal dialysis) and did not have her previous level of energy. My sister (who had hemodialysis) could barely walk from the taxi to her room following a treatment. My brother (also on hemodialysis) could drive himself 16 miles to the clinic, 16 miles back home, eat lunch, and go work on his farm. My energy level seems better than it was for a while. By night I am tired – but that is nothing new.

"Bottom line: the doctors pronounced my heart strong enough to undergo a kidney transplant – even though I got **two** black and blue wrists in the process. Not only does a kidney transplant recipient need to pass several tests, a kidney donor also needs to pass several tests. Then, of course, there needs to be a match. Fingers are crossed!"

Program Offers Clinics on Challenging Home Valuation

The Auditor’s Office is partnering with Columbus Legal Aid to host its third annual Homeowner Assistance Program (HAP). The program is designed to help low-to-moderate income homeowners file a complaint against the valuation of their owner-occupied home with the County Board of Revision (BOR).

The program provides complaint-filing clinics and referrals for possible further representation for homeowners in Franklin County with gross annual incomes below \$75,000. The auditor’s office will host in-person, Zoom, and telephone clinics, where low-to-moderate income homeowners will be paired with an attorney or real estate professional for assistance with completing the BOR complaint form.

The final clinic will be held on **Thursday, March 23** via phone.
