

A Chance to Right a Wrong by Mary Benis

I've been drawn to a lot of worthy causes in my adult life, but justice issues have been the most constant theme in one form or another. Almost immediately after I stopped teaching, I was matched with a 15-year-old girl who was getting into trouble. That relationship lasted until she died, some 40 years later, and among other things, it introduced me to the inside of the criminal justice system. I've been concerned ever since.

That experience has led me to support all sorts of related groups, especially those focused on the injustice that ripples through the whole justice system. One particular area of passion began way back when our kids were writing high school essays on the death penalty, and we all came to recognize how unfairly and ineffectively it was administered.

Fast forward to earlier this year, when I clicked on a link in an email from Ohioans to Stop Executions (OTSE) and was outraged by what I read. It was the story of **Tony Apanovitch**, who had spent 32 years in prison for a rape and murder he hadn't committed, before the conviction was overturned and he was released from death row. But two years later an absurd technicality put him back on death row. You can read the story at <u>www.justice4apanovitch.com</u>.

Peter Kobak is coordinating a campaign to correct this injustice and has agreed to come and meet with us during the Adult Education hour on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>April 23</u>, starting at 11:15 a.m. He'll talk about abolishing the death penalty in general and the work of OTSE, in addition to discussing the particulars of Tony's case. Then we'll have time to write letters to be submitted as part of the campaign to free Tony. For the folks who can't attend the Sunday discussion but want to be involved, we'll have letter-writing materials available in the Narthex that day and can also email a sample letter if necessary.

I hope you'll take the time to check out Tony's story and then will take the next step to get involved somehow. If you have questions or concerns or would just like to know more, please get in touch with me, **Mary Benis** -- phone or email is fine. I think our faith, as well as our Lutheran heritage, challenges us to confront injustice wherever we encounter it.

2023 LSS/Food Collective Food Giveaways Almost Here!

The season for Redeemer's Lutheran Social Services (LSS)/Mid-Ohio Food Collective (MOFC) Food Giveaway events rapidly approaches. Redeemer is scheduled for the *third* Thursday of every month from April to October, so that means the first event is on <u>Thursday, April 20</u>! The demand for food assistance remains high, so this ministry effort shared with LSS and MOFC continues to be very important!

Here are the 2023 dates and the "extra" items the congregation will be collecting each month:

- April 20 Hair care items (shampoo, conditioner, etc.)
- May 18 Skin care (lotions, sunscreen, etc.)
- June 15 Soap, dish detergent, laundry soap
- July 20 School supplies and tissues
- August 17 Paper items (paper towels, toilet tissue, baby wipes, etc.)
- September 21 Personal items (soap, shampoo, toothpaste, deodorant, dental floss, etc.)
- October 19 Cleaning supplies (wipes, paper towels, sponges, etc.)



Volunteers will follow the processes used the last few years including a drive-thru process where customers stay in their cars and those working the event will follow physical distancing, handwashing, glove and face mask guidelines.

In an effort to gauge the volunteer staffing for these events, and especially the one on April 20, folks are asked to email or call the church office saying if they can help. A sign-up sheet is also available on the bulletin board next to the library.

Sue Watson notes, "I know our congregational efforts to combat food insecurity in our communities are very meaningful for many of us, and our outreach means so much to those we serve. So if you can volunteer (or if you'd like more info), please get in touch with the church office ASAP. We'll take all the help we can get!"

1. What is your name? Lynn Belhorn

2. What issues keep you up at night? "Disparities in access to health care; infant mortality; community violence; lack of safe, affordable housing; lack of dignity, respect and empathy for individual differences and circumstances. No wonder I have trouble sleeping!"

3. Why did you join the Justice Team at Redeemer? "I no longer want to be a bystander, wondering who is going to be part of inspiring change. The passion of the team, joining with others to wrestle with difficult issues, moved me to action."

4. What is your favorite kind of bread? "Warm, crusty French bread slathered with butter."

5. Why did you decide to become a Network Member of BREAD? "Organizing and uniting our voices can bring about greater focus on critical local issues affecting quality of life for all of us."

6. What is your justice prayer for 2023? "Heavenly Father, I'm filled with gratitude for all you have provided. Help us to see others through your eyes and magnify their voices with dignity, empathy and respect as we seek equity for all. Amen."

New Worship Response Being Used to First Reading

Now through the season of Easter, the Worship Team is asking members of the congregation to offer a new response to the first reading. At the end of the reading, instead of the reader's saying, "Word of God, Word of Life," to which the congregation responds, "Thanks be to God," the reader will say, "May we listen for what the Spirit is saying to the church," and the congregation will respond, "Amen."

"The reason for this change has to do with the fact that a number of Bible readings contain images of violence, cruelty, and hatred. If we want to take these texts seriously, and wrestle with the hard issues they raise, we believe we can't simply declare them to be 'word of God, word of life.' We believe responding to such texts by saying, 'May we listen for what the Spirit is saying to the church. Amen,' names the reality that these are hard texts, and that their meaning for today is not at all clear. So we ask for the Spirit's guidance to help us listen for what they may be saying to us who live in a very different time and reality than when they were written," **Pastor Dave** explains.

"Please let any of the Worship Team members know what your experiences using this new response are. Your feedback will help guide our decision about continuing to use it after Easter."
