Redeemer Launches Thrive! Campaign

Redeemer launched it's *Thrive!* campaign on Sunday and it will continue over the next four weeks. *Thrive!* is a three-year campaign of the Southern Ohio Synod, initially scheduled to start in 2020 – then COVID hit. The campaign goal is \$1.2 million with a challenge goal of up to \$2 million. Because of COVID many churches, like Redeemer, that planned to launch their campaigns that year had to delay. As of last month, the synod has received pledges of over \$1 million.

At Redeemer's annual meeting it was announced that Redeemer would hold its campaign this spring. Council has approved a goal of \$20,000 for the congregation's campaign: "We would love to exceed our goal," Redeemer team member **Julie Johnson** commented.

Other team members for this effort include Margie Frazier, Wendy Stoica and Pastor Dave.

All the lay people on the team consist of presidents of the congregation during COVID and they each benefited from synod efforts to support churches during the pandemic. Johnson noted, "You should all know that the technology we use to livestream worship was enormously helped by synod efforts by their Out-of-the-Box team, and that they were able to connect us with people for design and installation that greatly reduced our overall costs."

Thrive! was envisioned to equip the people of God in Southern Ohio in ways we have not previously been able to afford or attempt. In next week's *Reflections*, we will share the goals of the Thrive! campaign. Each Sunday there will also be a bulletin insert for your information.

Cheryl Peterson has long been a favorite here. Her time here at Redeemer on <u>Sunday, May 14</u> comes with mixed feelings because she is moving from Columbus and Trinity Seminary at Capital University this summer to become academic dean at Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa.

She will preach and then teach the adult education class after worship, focusing on her brand new book about the Holy Spirit. **Dave Shull** will preside.

On <u>Sunday, May 21</u>, when Dave is finishing a continuing education class on preaching sponsored by Luther Seminary in Minneapolis, Redeemer member **Emlyn Ott** will preach, preside, and teach.

June Book Group to Discuss When Breath Becomes Air

On <u>Wednesday evening</u>, <u>June 2</u>, Redeemer's book group invites folks to gather in-person or by Zoom to discuss *When Breath Becomes Air*.

It is the memoir of a writer and neurosurgeon who at age 36, just when he was finishing 10 years of medical training, was diagnosed with stage IV lung cancer. With his whole future in front of him, a wife and a baby, he now nurtures new life. The novelist **Ann Patchett** says, "This is one of a handful of books I consider to be a universal donor – I would recommend it to anyone, everyone."

Atul Gawande, the author of *Being Mortal*, the book discussed in July 2021, says, Dr. Kalanithi's memoir is "proof that the dying are the ones who have the most to teach us about life." There are a number of copies in the public library. "Join us on June 2!"

LWR Thanks Redeemer for Its Support

Rev. Tim Krick, manager of congregational engagement for Lutheran World Relief (LWR), sent the following letter to the congregation:

"Again, the people of Redeemer are actively living out their faith by sharing their generosity with our neighbors in Ukraine. While we don't hear as much about the war as we used to, the needs are still great and will continue into the foreseeable future as there doesn't seem to be an end in sight.

"As I talked about before when I was with you all in September, you all are bringing housing, food, counseling services along with mobile medical units that are reaching in the far eastern portions of Ukraine.

"Hopefully you have seen and shared the thank you videos with the congregation, but if not, you can find them at www.lwr.org/congregations. There is also a possibility of a content trip happening to Ukraine next month. If that happens, we will have all new pictures, videos and stories to share. I will keep you updated as I learn more.

"I will be coming to Columbus again (I believe later this year) and would love to stop in and provide any additional updates I have, whether about Ukraine or the other work that is happening around the world. ...

"Let me know if you have any questions and again, thank you!"

BREAD Nehemiah Action Report

Kristi Hildebrand reports that BREAD held the Nehemiah Action on <u>Tuesday, April 25</u> with 1,650 attending, 49 from Redeemer. The meeting started with a welcome and preparation for the meeting. After a song and a call to order, they celebrated three recent BREAD wins:

- Environmental Justice
- Elder Care
- Columbus Violence Reduction Initiative (CVR)

The bulk of the action were the active campaign reports:

<u>Stop Violence...Build Trust!</u> Police Chief Elaine Bryant did not respond to the invitation to attend the Nehemiah Action. BREAD leaders had hoped to ask her the following three questions:

- 1. Will you apply to Georgetown University School of Law to provide ABLE (Active Bystandership for Law Enforcement) training for the Columbus Police Department and will you submit the application by the end of August 2023? This training is free, and BREAD is strongly encouraging Bryant to take advantage of it. **BREAD is holding a demonstration on Thursday, May 4** at noon outside police headquarters at 120 Marconi Blvd. All are welcome to participate.
- 2. Related to non-police crisis response, will you ensure a request for proposals for an outside consultant is released by mid-May?
- 3. Will you ensure an advisory committee of community members and crisis response experts is in place, with fire and police as non-voting members, by the end of July?

BREAD will continue to attempt to make contact with Chief Bryant.

<u>Don't ignore, restore!</u> Brother Lloyd Knight gave inspiring testimony based on his previous experiences with Restorative Practices. A video of his talk can be found on YouTube at https://youtu.be/duTFXIhm4MQ.

In an exciting win, **School Board President Jennifer Ada**ir was in attendance and answered yes the following questions asked of her:

- 1. During your term as school board president, will you meet with representatives from a comparable district that has successfully expanded restorative practices district-wide to learn what it took to implement and integrate their plan with fidelity?
- 2. During the superintendent search, will you advocate to the board that accountability for the implementation of restorative practices, as stated in the board's Goals and Guardrails, be part of the selection criteria for the new superintendent?
- 3. If the new superintendent does not have previous experience in restorative practices, will you ensure that they participate in restorative training within the first quarter of employment?
- 4. Starting after the next board monitoring session on June 20, will one or more representatives of the board meet with BREAD quarterly to share progress on these commitments and plan next steps?

<u>Trees protect us, We protect trees</u> gave statistics about the extreme heat and lack of air quality in Columbus. They are working to protect trees on public and private land to increase air quality.

<u>Families first....housing now</u> had questions for Commissioner O'Grady, Councilmember Shayla Favor, and Mayor Andrew Ginther but unfortunately they were not in attendance.

- 1. Will you advocate for one-third of the American Rescue Plan dollars to go to the Affordable Housing Trust Fund, targeting families at or below 50 percent of the area median income (\$30,000 or less) by July 11, 2023?
 - 2. Will you meet with BREAD by July 11, 2023?

<u>ID equals, Opportunity!</u> Councilmember Barroso de Padilla was not in attendance, but has expressed her support for the municipal ID. The questions that BREAD wanted to ask her were:

- 1. Will you be our advocate on the City Council for a Columbus ID program?
- 2. Will you meet with One ID Columbus by July 28, 2023, to lay out a plan for engaging stakeholders, funders, and other community support? **YOU** can help by signing the petition: https://actionnetwork.org/petitions/one-id-columbus

BREAD will continue to apply pressure to Mayor Andrew Ginther, Police Chief Elaine Bryant and other officials to encourage them to meet and keep the dialogue open.

The event concluded with a summary, the BREAD prayer, "O God, to those who have hunger give BREAD, and to those who have BREAD give the hunger for justice!" and a song.

A special shout out to Redeemer's **Emily Ott** who provided ASL interpretation of the event.

One More Chance to Right a Wrong

The Adult Education Class on April 23 with **Peter Kobak** of Ohioans to Stop Executions (OTSE) was really informative and motivational, **Mary Benis** notes. "Thanks to all 35 folks who attended in person or by Zoom – it was a great turnout!

"If you haven't yet been able to submit a postcard in support of freeing **Tony Apanovitch** from his wrongful incarceration on Death Row, you can still do so. There will be cards available in the Narthex through **Sunday, May 7**, along with a sample text. Or you can contact the church office and ask that a form be emailed to you. The sample text is available online at bit.ly/takeactionfortony.

"For maximum impact, the best way to return your cards is to bring or send them back to Redeemer by Sunday, May 7. They will then be forwarded to OTSE. But if that's not possible, just add the stamps yourself, and mail your cards directly to the governor and the parole board. In addition, we're encouraged to call the governor's office at 614-644-4357 and ask for clemency for Tony.

"All the details of Tony's case can be found at www.justice4apanovitch.com. These postcards are a way to turn our righteous outrage into positive action and, hopefully, justice for Tony."

Exploring the God We Do and Don't Believe In Redeemer Sunday Adult Education for May 7

Pastor Dave writes, "A question about how people might respond to someone who says they're angry with God because of some tragic event that has happened led to a lively conversation about God in the Sunday morning adult education class on April 16.

"On $\underline{May 7}$, we will continue to broaden that conversation by looking at a couple of articles about God and talk about how our beliefs about God have changed during our lifetimes. Sometimes it's just as important to name what we no longer believe about God – or what we never believed about God – as it is to talk about what we do believe.

"These two weeks will give us opportunities to hear from each other about what we do and don't believe, and what that means for how we live today."

Noisy Offering Now Goes to Kindway

During December, the Adult Sunday Education class welcomed people from groups that are out bringing God to a group of people or a neighborhood. One of the groups was Kindway.

Kindway is a God-led prison ministry devoted to investing in the lives of those who've been affected by incarceration. According to Kindway, it has developed "an impressive reputation within Central Ohio prisons and the Columbus community for its EMBARK reentry programming." EMBARK helps individuals build their independence while growing their faith to become active and engaged Christians in the Columbus community. After a thorough selection and orientation process, individuals begin the EMBARK program during their incarceration within a year of release to ensure enough time for intensive personal reflection.

During this time, individuals also participate in Equip programming including trauma recovery, faith-based reentry curriculum and vocational training.

One of the group members who came in December was a young women who is thriving due to this program. Redeemer's support will help with program cost, rent, setting up housing and many more costs that are incurred as people leave a jailed life and reenter society.

April Council Meeting Highlights

There was considerable discussion surrounding the responses to the recent "Values" survey at the Monday, April 17 meeting of the Church Council. Results of the survey will be published shortly.

Wendy Stoica spoke to the council about the Thrive Campaign and asked us to pledge our support. The Thrive Campaign will officially begin on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>April 30</u>, with a presentation to the congregation.

Council discussed the automatic doors for the main floor bathrooms. The estimated costs connected with this project were \$6,800+ for the installation and the electrical work required. It was agreed that we would temporarily move this to the "wishlist" category.

Finance Officer Nate Ott advised that the financial reports for the first quarter show we are in a healthy position. Also, as requested, they are working on getting quarterly financial reports to the teams; Nate has requested these documents and will distribute them as soon as they arrive from the accounting firm.

Lastly, Council approved the transfer request from Tommy Spahn and Bailey Sanders to a church nearer their home in Johnstown.

Food Giveaway Serves 131 Families

A total 131 families or 448 people were served at Redeemer's first Food Giveaway of the year on **Thursday, April 20**, according to **Kathy Zwanziger.** That included 159 children and 105 seniors. There were 40 new families receiving assistance.

The church received a total of 6,681 pounds of food although it normally receives 10,000 pounds of food.

A total of 22 volunteers participated.
