

Sue Radloff Reflects on Her Time at RLC

Sue Radloff Brady's father, Paul Radloff, was the founding pastor of Redeemer. She is going to be in worship with us on <u>Sunday, June 18</u>, and shares these memories of her family's time in Berwick. Her family moved to Bath, OH, after her second grade year so her father could start another new-church.

Most of our memories when we lived at the parsonage at 1525 Crestwood were of playing with our friends. My oldest brother did remember that after the men's softball games, everyone would go to **Hilda** and **Dick Kautz'** home. They had a player piano.

I remember my mother saying, 'If the kids turn out okay, I'm taking the credit!' She said that much of the time because we were still asleep when he left in the morning and in bed before he returned. Such is the life in starting mission churches. In recent years, I had said to my dad that it must have been very stressful when he was called back to Columbus to start a new church for the American Lutheran Church, where his seminary professors were members. Dad was a People Person, as was my mother. They got 2-for-1 with Paul & Marilyn.

My friends and I all watched the Beatles on Ed Sullivan in February of 1964, when they made America happy again, not quite three months after John F. Kennedy's assassination. Like most of the country, I went CRAZY for the Beatles! I was the ringleader in getting three of my friends to join me in cutting guitars out of cardboard, adding long rubberbands as the strings. Our second grade teacher acquiesced when I asked her if we could get up and sing in front of the class. We sang "She Loves You" and "I Want to Hold Your Hand," while strumming our fake guitars.

The summer after I completed second grade at Scottwood Elementary School, we moved to Bath Township between Cleveland and Akron, where Dad started Bethel Lutheran Church. I cried and cried every night for a year, because I missed my friends on Crestwood Avenue. Bath was a beautiful horse-breeding area, and everyone had lots of land, so it turned out to be great for my brothers and me, after my year of grieving the move. My brothers built treehouses, we had a baseball diamond in our yard, a basketball court, a 9-hole golf course they created, ping pong and bumper pool tables in the basement and, later, a swimming pool in the backyard. The music scene in Cleveland was especially great in those days, so, for this musician, it turned out to be a good move in the long run.

Here's an excerpt from a biography of Dad I found:

"Early on, Paul Radloff knew that he wanted to be a preacher like his Dad who was his hero. His Dad's influence extended to include eight ministers in the Radloff extended brood, though none could duplicate Dad's practice of preaching his sermons both in German and in English.

Some Ways to Connect at Redeemer this Summer

The following highlights a number of ways that folks can be involved here at Redeemer over the summer:

<u>Sunday morning, June 18</u>: Redeemer Founding Pastor Paul Radloff's daughter, Susan, will be in worship and available for conversation afterwards. Susan called us a couple of weeks ago and said she'd enjoy coming by and talking with anyone who wants to about the birth of Redeemer, her dad's ministries, and her early childhood in Berwick, as well as connecting with anyone who was here at that time. <u>Sunday morning, July 2</u>: Former member of the Redeemer family, Mary Ann Horton, who wrote in *Living Lutheran* about how welcomed she felt here years ago as a transgender woman, will sign her book after worship and then speak to the adult ed class. Mary Ann's connections at Redeemer helped encourage us to expand our welcome statement to lesbian and gay persons to include transgender people.

Here's a bit about her: To have invented the email attachment is one thing. To have done so while transitioning

from male to female and paving the way for Trans rights in the workplace is quite another. Her book, *Trailblazer*, describes her childhood as **Mark Horton** and how the question "who am I, really?" became too loud to silence. As she transitioned from Mark to Mary Ann, she quickly learned the challenges and heartbreaks that came with navigating the maze of social, medical and legal rights afforded, or rather not afforded to the Trans community. In 1997, Mary Ann persuaded Lucent Technologies to become the first Fortune 500 company to add transgender-inclusive language to its nondiscrimination policy, and to add coverage for transition care and surgery.



<u>Wednesday evenings in July</u>, 7-8:30 p.m.: Redeemer Summer Book Study explores the realities of experiences on the Mexico-U.S. border. There's an article about our summer book, *The Line Becomes a River*, elsewhere in this issue. These discussions are safe spaces to explore topics about which those who gather bring a wide variety of perspectives which have no easy resolutions ... and about which you might not have conversation partners to talk.

Sloppy Joes by Kathy Mimlitch

(If making 4 lbs. of Sloppy Joes, just double the recipe.)

2 lbs lean ground beef
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1 tsp garlic powder
2 tsp prepared yellow mustard
1 1/2 cups ketchup
6 tsp brown sugar
Salt and pepper to taste
In a medium skillet over m

In a medium skillet over medium heat, brown the ground beef, onion and green pepper. Drain off liquid. Stir in garlic powder, mustard, ketchup and brown sugar. Mix thoroughly. Reduce heat and simmer for 30 minutes. Season with salt and pepper. This makes 12 servings.

From Kathy: "I usually omit the green pepper (I don't like it)! I sometimes I use ketchup and barbecue sauce instead of just ketchup. I almost double the brown sugar as I like it sweet."

Recipe can be made with ground turkey.

Redeemer Safe Church Team Highlights Safety Tips

Redeemer's Safe Church Team (**April Smith, Sara Auman, Sue Yehling**) will be providing a series of monthly "Redeemer Safety Tips" that will be useful reminders in responding to emergency situations as members gather together in the building, in the community and in homes.

This is the first of the series which will cover a variety of subjects such as medical, weather, fire and active shooter threats. Other safety projects being planned are emergency preparedness brochures as well as evacuation maps to be posted throughout the building. The team hopes that this information will remind all to be aware and prepared in the event of an emergency.

By administering immediate care during an emergency, an individual can help an ill or injured person before emergency medical services arrive. This could help save a life.



Checking an Injured or Ill Person

1. Check the scene for safety, form an initial impression, obtain consent, and use personal protective equipment (PPE)

2. Check for responsiveness, breathing, life-threatening bleeding or other life-threatening conditions using shout-tap-shout. Check for no more than 10 seconds.

3. If the person is responsive or responds to stimulation and is fully awake and does not appear to have life-threatening conditions:

- Interview the person (or bystanders if necessary), ask questions about signs and symptoms, allergies, and medications and medical conditions. Take note of any medical identification tags.

- Do a focused check based on what the person told you, how the person is acting and what you see.

- Do not ask the person to move if you suspect a head, neck or spinal injury.

- Do not ask the person to move any area of the body that causes discomfort or pain.

4. If the person does not respond, responds but is not fully awake, is not breathing or is only gasping, or has life-threatening bleeding or another obvious life-threatening condition CALL 9-1-1 and get equipment or ask someone else to do so.

For a person who is unresponsive and not breathing: START CPR and USE AN AED IMMEDIATELY.

Redeemer has an AED unit available in the Narthex to the left of the main doors.

Sister Act would like to provide fans in July at Redeemer's LSS/MidOhio Food Giveaway, to households that may need them. So, to that end, Sister Act is collecting box fans from now until **Thursday, July 20** when they will be distributed at the July food giveaway.

Julie Johnson has gone ahead and purchased 50 fans at \$20/each. Contributions can be made toward those rather than worry about bringing in a fan. Just note "Fans" in the check memo line or on the envelope.

This July, the group will read and discuss *The Line Becomes a River* by Francisco Cantú. Cantú is a Mexican-American who worked for the U.S. Border Patrol on the Mexican border from 2008-2012. Writing about this book, author **Sandra Cisneros** says, "There is a line dividing what we know and do not know. Some see the world from one shore and some from the other. Cantú brings the two together to a spiritual whole. My gratitude for this work of the soul."

Noisy Offering Now Goes to Kindway

During December, the Adult Sunday Education class welcomed people from groups that are out bringing God to a group of people or a neighborhood. One of the groups was Kindway.

Kindway is a God-led prison ministry devoted to investing in the lives of those who've been affected by incarceration. According to Kindway, it has developed "an impressive reputation within Central Ohio prisons and the Columbus community for its EMBARK reentry programming." EMBARK helps individuals build their independence while growing their faith to become active and engaged Christians in the Columbus community. After a thorough selection and orientation process, individuals begin the EMBARK program during their incarceration within a year of release to ensure enough time for intensive personal reflection.

During this time, individuals also participate in Equip programming including trauma recovery, faith-based reentry curriculum and vocational training.

One of the group members who came in December was a young woman who is thriving due to this program. Redeemer's support will help with program cost, rent, setting up housing and many more costs that are incurred as people leave a jailed life and reenter society.

"Born in Wauseon, OH, the eldest of three sons, Paul earned his B.A. degree at Capital University in Columbus, where he met his wife Marilyn.

"Paul and his two brothers were featured in a *New York Times* issue as they excelled as starters on their Capital basketball team. Both older sons had had their education interrupted by World War II. They returned just as their younger brother was ready for college. Hence, the 'fierce-some three-some'.

"Although exempt because of theological status, Paul opted to be a part of World War II, which he felt was 'just'. His duties included months at MacArthur's headquarters in New Guinea on jungle patrol (wet feet, 120-degree heat). He also served over a year in the Philippines. He still hates guns, especially handguns for which he sees no legitimate use.





"After seminary, Paul started new congregations in Ohio communities where school auditoriums were used for Sunday services and the rest of church business was carried on in the parsonages. Their children had to be in bed (or at least out of the living room) by 7:30 p.m. Church business prevailed."

The most important thing in my father's ministry was civil rights and social justice for all. I am so proud he didn't simply talk the talk, but walked and worked his whole life for both. He was a hero to my brothers and me. When we were little, he would crouch down to our level to explain injustices to us and taught us to be proactive and stand up for the marginalized. I remember this first with **Martin Luther King**. My dad's good friend at Capital and in seminary **Bob Graetz**, who was in Birmingham with Martin Luther King in the mid-1950s, when both were brand new 25-year-old pastors. Bob had a great influence on my father. **Rosa Parks** and other activists were meeting at his Lutheran Church there.

I look forward to being with Redeemer this Sunday. I wish you peace.

ELCA Working Group Seeks Input

The 10th chapter of Romans reads, "How are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent?" (Romans 10:14-15).

In response to this and other invitations in Scripture, the church continues to educate, form, and send rostered ministers so that all may call on Jesus Christ, our crucified and risen Lord. Our process to do so is currently under review.

In March 2022 a diverse group was appointed to examine and improve the candidacy process that equips rostered ministers for service in the church. This ELCA team is the Candidacy Leadership Development Working Group (CLDWG.)

In the last year the group has spent much of its time hosting virtual and in-person listening sessions to learn the needs of our church. It also completed a survey for those excluded by the candidacy process. As it moves forward, the working group is prioritizing feedback from the church.

All members of the ELCA are invited to hearings at which the working group will share its findings. There will also be an opportunity for response. More details will be shared at the hearings; an executive summary of the team's work can be found here.
