

Surprised by Grief ... Caught by Grace

The third anniversary of my mom's death on July 12 surprised me by how deep the pain was. I felt Mom's absence with an intensity I hadn't before. Maybe part of it is because Dad had died in April. But it doesn't really matter why. I just know the grief has stayed in a way it hasn't before. I've continued to find myself thinking about her, and wishing she were around to talk to. I want to hear more from her than the voice-mail recording that's been on my phone since March 21, 2020.

That's how grief "works," though, isn't it? We're going along with our lives, and, seemingly out of nowhere, the loss comes. Maybe it comes as a wave that knocks us off our feet and we feel like we're drowning. Maybe it comes as a weight that makes it impossible to breathe, or move, or catch our breath. Maybe it comes as fear, as anger, as emptiness

And I know all I can do is receive it. All I can do is let it come. And feel it, and listen to it, and be with it. And, at some point, say thank you for the gift of 62 years together - so much longer than most people have with a parent. So much more love shared than many people have with a parent.

Being with this grief this past month took me back to some words which have lived in my quote file for some time from **Steve Garnass-Holmes**. In the hope that they might catch you in arms of grace as they are holding me right now, I offer them to you.

> A friend is dying and I am sweeping the garage. I am repairing the upper rack in the dishwasher and he's being detached from life support. I am shopping, in the produce section, looking for good organic baby spinach and remembering to get shallots and his family are gathered around in that strange camaraderie of abysmal love and loneliness. I am strangely here. Life goes on, he has died, life is going on.

Loss is not an object we encounter, but a landscape. The presence of an absence that haunts without leaving. Grief is not a thing we have, like a stone in your pocket, or a boil; it's music deep within us and around us, music of love in the key of longing, and sometimes we can't help but sing along, full throated, heads tipped back, because it's all we hear, and at times we just hum the tune while we go on with life. But the music doesn't stop, beautiful and sad and grateful, and it makes us dance, even if we just sway a bit and always, just beyond our hearing, God is singing with us. Powtor Dave

July 20 Food Giveaway Report

Kathleen Zwanziger writes: "THANK YOU to all who helped at the giveaway on Thursday, July 20.

"Because of your generosity, we were able to distribute 153 fans and over 430 school supplies. It was a hot day, but fortunately the storms held off. Last month we had 150 guests, but on this hot July day, we had at least 174. Because of computer problems, a few additional families also received food even though they could not be registered.

"Not only did we run out of fans, but we also ran out of food. We had been advised earlier in the year that the Food Bank does not have the resources it has had in the past. We received only 7 skids of food, totaling 6,195 pounds (compared to the usual 8 skids – and 10,330 pounds last month).

"Last month there were 477 children; this month there were 621. YES, even with 30 volunteers, we were busy! *Thanks again to all of you who contributed to this successful day!*"

Redeemer Safe Church Team Highlights Safety Tips: Severe Weather

If you are in the church building or on the grounds, help all who are present to move safely to the basement and away from any windows or doors. Monitor weather reports as able and do not leave the basement until it is declared safe to do so by broadcasters or first responders.

What should you know about lightning?

To keep your members and staff safe, your leadership team should be aware of the following tips.

- Thunder can be heard up to 25 miles from the original lightning storm.
- Assume that if you can hear thunder, you can be struck by lightning.
- Thunder and lightning should serve as a final warning to immediately seek shelter indoors or in a vehicle NOT under a tree.
- Wait 30 minutes after the storm to resume outdoor activities.
- Remember, "When thunder roars, go indoors!"

How can you protect against hail damage?

Hail is produced in strong and severe storms across the country, especially in the High Plains.

- Hail one inch (quarter size) or larger is most likely to cause damage. Roofs, windows, siding, air conditioning units and vehicles are most commonly damaged by hail.
- Look for roofing products that boast a "Class 4" rating or advertise impact resistance.
- Install protective coverings over windows to prevent cracks and shattering and over air conditioning units with exposed fins to prevent denting.

What about wind damage and tornadoes?

Wind from convective storms comes in two main forms:

1. Straight-line wind: Strong, damaging winds that can reach up to 100 mph -- these winds account for one-half of all severe weather reports.

2. Tornado: A narrow, rotational wind extending from the base of a thunderstorm to the ground. Winds resulting from convective storms can cause catastrophic damage to buildings and lead to serious injury or death.

- Not all tornadoes have advance warnings, and straight-line winds can be just as dangerous as a tornado.
- All thunderstorms should be treated with respect, and people should seek shelter in the lowest level of a sturdy building whenever a strong storm approaches.
- Pay attention to local weather updates and have a plan to shelter in place in the event of a severe storm.
- Before a storm hits, if you have time to do so safely, secure loose items, such as lawn furniture or other items that may become airborne during high winds and cause damage.

Noisy Offering Now Goes to Star House

Starting in July, Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will now go to Star House – a drop-in center for youth experiencing homelessness and the only housing village of its kind in Central Ohio for college-age youth who are exiting homelessness. Young people experiencing homelessness, ages 14-24, are provided a safe location along with basic needs and access to crucial, stabilizing resources.

In addition, Star House, along with the Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority and Finance Fund, jointly owns and operates Carol Stewart Village, an affordable neighborhood for youth coming out of homelessness. It has 62 studio apartments and onsite access to a wide array of programs and social services.

'National Night Out' Set for Tuesday, Aug. 1

On <u>Tuesday, August 1</u>, neighborhoods throughout Columbus are being invited to join with thousands of communities nationwide for the "40th Annual National Night Out" (NNO) crime and drug prevention event. NNO, which is sponsored by National Association of Town Watch and co-sponsored locally by Berwick Civic Association (BCA), will involve over 17,000 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases around the world.

NNO is designed to: (1) Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; (2) Generate support for, and participation in, local anti crime efforts; (3) Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships; and (4) Send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Join Berwick neighbors, along with members of the BCA, at Berwick Elementary School (2655 Scottwood Road) from 6 p.m. -8 p.m. to celebrate the neighborhood! There will be games, food, and drinks! Line dancing anyone? See you there!

Early Voting for August Special Election Now Underway

Early voting for all voters is now underway as voters are asked to weigh in on Issue 1, which would raise the passage threshold of constitutional amendments to 60 percent in the future.

According to the secretary of state's office, there are currently 7,947,090 registered voters in Ohio.

"August 8 provides an opportunity for Ohioans to democratically determine how Ohio's constitution is to be regarded, and I encourage everyone to participate in an election that addresses the foundational, governing document of our state," said Ohio Secretary of State Frank LaRose. "Ohio makes it easy and convenient to vote, and beginning tomorrow, Ohioans will start casting their ballots by voting early. Please encourage friends, family members and anyone who is currently unregistered to vote to register now, and engage in our democratic process and help shape the future of our state."

Voters can cast their ballots early in-person; vote-by-mail; or on Election Day. Absentee voting is also underway for military and overseas voters.

Early, in-person voting hours at local county boards of elections will be as follows:

- Monday, July 31- Friday, Aug. 4, 7:30 a.m.-7:30 p.m.

- Saturday, Aug. 5, 8 a.m.- 4 p.m.
- Sunday, Aug. 6, 1-5 p.m.

Polls will be open on Election Day 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.



Voters may also choose to vote by mail. Information about requesting an absentee ballot can be found online at VoteOhio.gov.

Once their ballot request is received by their county board of elections, voters may track their ballot at <u>http://VoteOhio.gov/Track</u>. As long as a ballot is postmarked by the day before the election and received within 10 days (20 days for overseas and military voters) after the election at the county board of elections, the vote will be tabulated.
