Closing a Chapter

Julianne Johnson reports that over 20 years ago, during the time Redeemer renovated the building, the congregation went through a legal battle with the original architect/contractor who walked off the job.

The details are many, and some painful, but Redeemer emerged from the renovation stronger and with a very real lesson that the church is more than the building that holds the members. The contractor lost his architect license after Redeemer filed a complaint with the state architect board. The legal battle went to trial and the court found for Redeemer and the contractor was ordered to pay the congregation \$110,000. In all these years Redeemer has never received any money from the contractor.

This summer, the church was approached by the contractor's attorney about settling this case. Council authorized the executive team to negotiate and an agreement was reached for \$25,000. Last week that payment was received. Papers will now be filed with the court to dismiss Redeemer's various claims against the contractor. Council has designated these funds to go toward building expenses.

Celebration! Sunday Set for Sept. 17

Redeemer, along with other faith organizations, community leaders, local businesses and organizations work to gather items for those who are homeless or in shelters. Donations may be placed in the bin located in the cloakroom. Cash donations or gift cards are welcome and may be dropped off at the church office. Book Group to Read Hurston Work

The Redeemer book group on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>September 20</u>, 7-8:30 p.m., will read and discuss *Their Eyes Were Watching God*, by **Zora Neale Hurston**. When she was writing in the 1920s and 30s, Hurston was

faulted by many Black male writers of her day because they didn't believe she was taking the realities of racism seriously. She died in 1960 impoverished.

Then the University of Illinois Press reissued this book, and she has come to be seen as among the most important Black writers in the 20th century.

Alice Walker, author of *The Color Purple* and other works, says, "There is no book more important to me than this one."

Be patient with the dialect! Hurston writes dialogue as she hears it. Though it might be a challenge to many ears initially, one gets used to it. And it rings with authenticity and beauty.

"So everyone is aware, Pastor Dave is planning his Sabbatical from July 30-November 4, 2024!

"Lastly, the financials showed that giving was down in June but was better in July. Our net income has a very slim margin at this point."

Mark writes:

I LOVE TO WRITE!

"At a high school journalism camp, an instructor advised me to "not let my head hit the pillow before writing something!" Since that day and time, I've done my best to follow this good advice as a sports reporter (my first job), religion columnist and high school journalism teacher. This is not to mention 40 plus years of writing sermons, meditations and prayers as a pastor.

"Perhaps a better way of putting it is I LIVE TO WRITE. and in a spiritual sense I write to live. As a trained and certified spiritual director, I'm blessed to comb the depths of my spiritual connection with the Holy One, living learning and growing through prayer, contemplation and journaling, and helping others to do the same.

"It is my great joy and blessing to be able to spend time with you, whether you are curious about journaling or dedicated to journaling. The workshop will be on <u>Saturday</u>, <u>October 14</u>, <u>2023</u> from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. During this time, through various forms of imagery like music, art, photography and the written word (of course) we'll explore ways to journal our blessings (given and received). The spiritual guide in me simply says that this is a time to just breathe in the breath of God, and be together to do that blessed thing each one of loves to do and lives for each day."

Redeemer Safe Church Team: Staying Safe in Public Places

Here are some reminders about staying safe in public places, including houses of worship. This includes a refresher on Avoid, Deny and Defend in responding to armed intruders. These tips are not meant to frighten or alarm you, rather let them remind us to be alert to our surroundings and prepared to protect ourselves, our families and our neighbors.

Prepare before

- Stay alert. Always be aware of your environment and any possible dangers.
- If you see something, say something to local authorities. That includes suspicious packages, people behaving strangely or someone using strange communications.
- Observe warning signs. Signs might include unusual or violent communications, substance abuse, expressed anger or intent to cause harm. These warning signs may increase over time.
- Have an exit plan. Identify exits and areas to hide wherever you go, including work, school and special events.
- Learn lifesaving skills. Take trainings such as You Are the Help Until Help Arrives and first aid to assist the wounded before help arrives.

Stay safe during

- Seek safety. Getting away from the attacker is the top priority.
- Cover and hide if you can't evacuate.
- Fight only as a last resort. When you can't run or take cover, attempt to disrupt the attack or disable the attacker.
- Take care of yourself first. Then, if you are able, help the wounded get to safety and provide immediate care.

Know what to do after

- Remain calm.
- Keep hands visible and empty.
- Report to designated areas.
- Follow law enforcement's instructions and evacuate in the direction they tell you to go. Listen to law enforcement for information about the situation. Share updates as you can with family and friends.

AVOID: Move away from the source of the threat as quickly as possible. The more distance and barriers between you and the threat, the better.

DENY: If you cannot AVOID - Create barriers to prevent or slow down a threat from getting to you. Turn the lights off. Remain out of sight and quiet by hiding behind large objects and silence your phone.

DEFEND: If you cannot AVOID or DENY - be prepared to defend yourself. Be aggressive and committed to your actions. Use any object as a weapon. Do not fight fairly. Fight to survive.

Noisy Offering to Hawai'i Relief Efforts

The Noisy Offering is now going for the Hawai'i disaster relief. Funds will be sent directly to the ELCA synod in Hawai'i.

As has been reported in previous issues of *Reflections* from RLC member **April Smith**, "The ELCA has 10 congregations in Hawai'i, spread across four islands. My friend and Westerville native, **Pastor Keith Wolter**, is the Dean of the Hukilau Conference, which is the assembly of these 10 congregations as a region of the Pacifica Synod. The Pacifica Synod is now accepting donations for Hawai'i relief efforts following the devastating fires on the islands of Maui and Hawai'i (The Big Island).

"The ELCA churches on the islands are safe although they have members and friends who have suffered losses of life and property. Kehei Lutheran Church writes: 'We have been deeply grateful to witness how Aloha shows up: Native, Local, resident, transplant, etc. We're all individual threads that create this complex twine, binding together all who live here on Mother Maui.'

"Your gifts in their entirety will be used to support emergency relief efforts on the Hawaiian Islands of Maui and Hawai'i in response to the August 2023 wildfires that have claimed lives and destroyed homes and businesses. All funds received will be sent to organizations and agencies providing direct relief to those affected by the fires. ...

"Please continue to pray for all of Hawai'i as these tragedies will impact everyone statewide.

An Update from Kathy Z.

"At my three-month 'anniversary' last week, several of my restrictions were lifted (e.g., I can vacuum again!), but I still must be very careful around dirt. Who knew dirt/soil had so many bad things in it! I may do all my stretching exercises again, and I may lift over 10 pounds (but 'don't overdo it!'). I only need to have labs drawn once a week. The 'dance' with meds will continue: enough to prevent certain infections and yet enough to not reject the new kidney. I may drink communion wine, but still may not eat anything with grapefruit or pomegranate (interfere with meds), nor raspberries, strawberries, cauliflower, or broccoli—because of the possibility of dirt in them. I may eat at restaurants, but not buffets.

"THANKS to all of you who supplied me with food (I got some new recipes!), gift cards, or cash; to those who mowed my lawn; to those who planted or weeded or dead-headed for me; to those who drove me to

appointments; and to all who inquired about my health. I am feeling good – if I get my daily nap and drink 90 oz. of water every day! It's great having you as my family."

- 10 "God's work. Our hands." Sunday on the 10th anniversary of our annual day of service, give thanks for the chance to draw closer to our neighbors and embrace them as children of God, listening with respect and empathy and responding to their needs.
- 11 Ask God to help us understand more fully how our lives and faith express God's love, compassion and respect for the neighbor. "To be your presence is our mission bold, to feed the poor and shelter homeless cold, to be your hands of justice, right uphold, alleluia!" (ELW 546).
