The next Redeemer Book Group book will discuss *All You Can Ever Know* by **Nicole Chung**. Chung was born extremely premature, placed for adoption by her Korean parents, and raised by White parents in a tiny Oregon town.

The book, a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award for Autobiography, explores the discrimination she faces and her search for her birth parents. There are plenty of copies in the library to check out. The group meets in-person and on Zoom **Wednesday evening, October 18**, from 7-8:30 p.m. "We'd love your voice in our conversations."

September Giveaway Distributes Nearly 10,000 Lbs of Food

It's hard to believe that the numbers for the September Mid-Ohio Food Collective/Lutheran Social Services Food Giveaway here at Redeemer on **Thursday, September 21** were a little lower than in August because the line of cars stretched to Scottwood Road until nearly 5 p.m. There just wasn't a break – and all the food (except some onions) was gone by then. Redeemer was back to the typical eight pallets of food (9,882

pounds). A total of 195 families came through the line, translating to 626 people (including 183 children and 141 seniors). There were 49 new families.

“THANK YOU ALL for your support and the 200 or so personal care items that you contributed. (Not many left!!) Thanks to all the volunteers who worked so diligently to help our neighbors. Our last produce market will be October 19; the extra item will be cleaning supplies,” **Kathleen Zwanziger** reports.

RLC Safe Church Team Offers New Emergency Preparedness Brochure, Guidelines for Staying Safe in Public Places

Redeemer's Safe Church Team has developed a new emergency preparedness brochure that can be found in the pew racks and in the Narthex. This summarizes information on ways to respond to various emergency situations while in the church building. Be prepared, stay safe!"

Here are some reminders about staying safe in public places, including houses of worship. This includes a refresher on Avoid, Deny and Defend in responding to armed intruders. These tips are not meant to frighten or alarm you, rather let them remind us to be alert to our surroundings and prepared to protect ourselves, our families and our neighbors.

Prepare before

- Stay alert. Always be aware of your environment and any possible dangers.
- If you see something, say something to local authorities. That includes suspicious packages, people behaving strangely or someone using strange communications.
- Observe warning signs. Signs might include unusual or violent communications, substance abuse, expressed anger or intent to cause harm. These warning signs may increase over time.
- Have an exit plan. Identify exits and areas to hide wherever you go, including work, school and special events.
- Learn lifesaving skills. Take trainings such as You Are the Help Until Help Arrives and first aid to assist the wounded before help arrives.

Stay safe during

- Seek safety. Getting away from the attacker is the top priority.
- Cover and hide if you can't evacuate.
- Fight only as a last resort. When you can't run or take cover, attempt to disrupt the attack or disable the attacker.
- Take care of yourself first. Then, if you are able, help the wounded get to safety and provide immediate care.

Know what to do after

- Remain calm.
- Keep hands visible and empty.
- Report to designated areas.
- Follow law enforcement's instructions and evacuate in the direction they tell you to go. Listen to law enforcement for information about the situation. Share updates as you can with family and friends.

AVOID: Move away from the source of the threat as quickly as possible. The more distance and barriers between you and the threat, the better.

DENY: If you cannot AVOID - Create barriers to prevent or slow down a threat from getting to you. Turn the lights off. Remain out of sight and quiet by hiding behind large objects and silence your phone.

DEFEND: If you cannot AVOID or DENY - be prepared to defend yourself. Be aggressive and committed to your actions. Use any object as a weapon. Do not fight fairly. Fight to survive.

Noisy Offering to Hawai'i Relief Efforts

The Noisy Offering is now going for the Hawai'i disaster relief. Funds will be sent directly to the ELCA synod in Hawai'i. RLC member **April Smith** has provided the following update on Hawai'i relief efforts via **Terri Robertson**, executive assistant for finance and accounting of the Pacifica Synod on behalf of **Bishop David Nagler**:

“Thank you for your congregation’s support of those affected by the wildfires in Hawai'i. Bishop Dave is there through the end of the month. In fact today he is on Maui and meeting with partners there.”

“As of August 22, donors from across the United States have donated almost \$42,000 to our synod’s Hawai'i Relief fund. Here is what I can share with you (from Bishop Dave) about the fund:

1 “100 percent of any donations will be given to support people affected by the fires.

2 “We are working with local agencies on the ground to ensure that the money is used wisely.

3 “Our commitment is long term. We stand by communities long after the news cycle has moved on. We are proud of our Lutheran focus on restoring people; body, mind, and soul.”

Deadline to Register to Vote Nears

For those Ohioans who have not voted before or have not voted recently or who have voter information to update, the deadline to register to vote for the **Tuesday, November 7** election is **Tuesday, October 10** and early in-person and absentee voting by mail begins **Wednesday, October 11**.



Voters can cast their ballots early in-person; vote-by-mail; or on Election Day. Absentee voting has already begun for military and overseas voters with those ballots mailed out Friday, September 22.

New voter registration and needed updates to a current registration can be done entirely online at <http://VoteOhio.gov>. Additionally, every county board of elections will be open until 9 p.m. Tuesday, October 10 for anyone who chooses to register in-person.

Early, in-person voting hours at local county boards of elections will be as follows:

- Wednesday, October 11-Friday, October 13, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Monday, October 16-Friday, October 20, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Monday, October 23-Friday, October 27, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Monday, October 30- Friday, November 3, 7:30 a.m.-7:30 p.m.
- Saturday, November 4, 8 a.m.- 4 p.m.
- Sunday, November 5, 1-5 p.m.
- Election Day Tuesday, November 7 polls will be open 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Voters may also choose to vote by mail. Information about requesting an absentee ballot can be found online at VoteOhio.gov. The deadline for absentee ballot applications to be received by the local board of elections is **Tuesday, October 31**. Absentee ballots must be post marked by Monday, November 6 or delivered directly to the local board of elections by 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, November 7.

Once their ballot request is received by their county board of elections, voters may track their ballot at <http://VoteOhio.gov/Track>. As long as a ballot is postmarked by the day before the election, **Monday, November 6**, and received by Saturday, November 11, the vote will be tabulated.

Ohio voters will find two issues on their ballot this election: State Issue 1 is the reproductive/abortion rights constitutional amendment while State Issue 2 is an initiated law legalizing recreational use of marijuana. Also on this ballot are local elected offices.
