Adult Ed to Explore Use of Apostles' Creed in Worship

During the 11:15 a.m.-12:15 p.m. adult education hour on Sundays, October 22 and 29, the Worship Team invites Redeemer members and friends to participate in an important conversation. The team would like to hear their views about what the Apostles' Creed means to them, and how meaningful it is to them to recite it in worship.

On October 22, Redeemer member, pastor, and theologian **Don Luck** will begin the discussion. Don will talk about the development of the Apostles' Creed and how creeds have been used in the history of the church. He will also talk about the use of the Creed in worship. The following week, **Pastor Dave** will facilitate a conversation when folks are invited to listen to each other while they share what the Creed means to them.

The Worship Team is sponsoring these discussions in response to a letter we received several months ago. Here are excerpts from what a Redeemer member wrote: "The creed has prompted discussion at Redeemer for years, as members have followed their individual faith journeys and have ended up in different places in terms of their relationship to the creed. Many years ago, we sought out Don [Luck] to help us craft a descriptive sentence to accompany the creed – positioning it in its historic context. That certainly helped but hasn't resolved the underlying issue – which is basically our varying understandings of the three parts of the Trinity, about which the creed has some very definite things to say....

"I've been told by a good number of folks over the years that they're uncomfortable saying the creed. So they've found a variety of ways to handle the situation – staying quiet, mumbling their own words, imagining their own versions, even trying to be absent at that point in the service. And I confess to my own discomfort recently when a visitor without adult church experience joined us, and I felt the need to somehow discreetly convey to him that the creed was not necessarily a statement of anyone's individual faith or belief.

"I've been intrigued over the years as I've heard about more modern versions of the creed; but I've never seen one that really captured the sense of the creed in a satisfactory way. And I understand the difficulty inherent in such a rewrite anyway – it might not speak to most people, and there remain (probably) a good number of members who would not willingly give up the creed in its current form. Perhaps it's time to check out how congregational members actually feel about the creed and its role in our worship service...."

The Worship Team believes it is time for us to ask members this question, and engage them in this conversation. "So please join us for these important discussions. We look forward to hearing from you. If you cannot attend in person or on Zoom, please feel free to send your thoughts, concerns and questions to Dave Shull by mail or email (dshull@redeemerluth.com). The team wants to hear from all of you who wish to express your views. Your input will be an essential part of the Worship Team's future conversations about what kinds of changes, if any, we will recommend." Dave Shull, on behalf of the Worship Team

Sign Ups Underway for 2022 Advent Devotional Booklet



Highlights of September Congregational Council Meeting

Attendees at the Monday, September 18 meeting included Pastor Dave Shull, President Michele Disbro, Vice President Krista Skipper, Nathan Ott, Katie Jacobs, Jennifer Young, Diane Brobeck, Elyce Herring, Sue Yehling, Laura Warren and Sue Watson.

The meeting began at 7:05 p.m. with an opening devotion from Pastor Dave provided a recording of The Lord's Prayer in Swahili (baba yetu, YouTube).

After asking for feedback on how we are living into our mission, vision and values, Michele and Laura led a lively discussion of Sunday's Celebrations (church anniversary, ministry volunteers, choir celebration, and the dedication of the new basketball hoops). It was unanimously agreed that the event was very successful and should become an annual event.

The August 21 minutes were approved unanimously. Also, an electronic vote had been taken since the last meeting, after the Executive Team approved the replacement of the AC unit for the educational wing at a cost of \$19,575.

The Financial Reports were approved with Nate commenting that there has been a trend of having one month with higher income and the next month with a lower income. The month of August was a lower income month. Also, typically the end of the year shows an increase in income. The net operating through August is actually looking pretty good considering a deficit was projected.

The Ministry reports were also reviewed.

Greg Ruban's updates to the Financial Process Audit Report were reviewed in detail, and it was noted by Michele that current **Treasurer Julie Johnson** has requested that both a treasurer and a backup be appointed for next year. Also, credit card limits were reduced from \$29,000 to \$15,000.

The Safety Team (**April Smith, Sara Auman** and **Sue Yehling**) have prepared a brochure. Council unanimously moved to approve its use. The intent is to place the brochure in each of the pews, on the Kiosk in the Narthex, among other locations. Also discussed was the need to provide them to regular users of Redeemer's space, i.e., Suzuki, Berwick Civic Association, Girl Scouts, etc.

Council was reminded that the next meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. on <u>Monday, October 16</u>, immediately before the RLC Ministry Evaluation at 7 p.m. **Marques Highland** is preparing a form for council and mutual ministry team members to complete and return to him so he can compile the responses for this meeting.

Council also approved the Facility Use Request to use the Fellowship Hall by Thomas Mitchell (basketball assistant coach) on Nov 23 for a family Thanksgiving dinner.

Michele again reminded Council that budgets are the current focus. Nate will need those numbers soon.

After the Lord's Prayer, the meeting was adjourned.

RLC Safe Church Team Offers New Emergency Preparedness Brochure, Guidelines for Staying Safe in Public Places

Redeemer's Safe Church Team has developed a new emergency preparedness brochure that can be found in the pew racks and in the Narthex. This summarizes information on ways to respond to various emergency situations while in the church building. Be prepared, stay safe!"

Here are some reminders about staying safe in public places, including houses of worship. This includes a refresher on Avoid, Deny and Defend in responding to armed intruders. These tips are not meant to frighten or alarm you, rather let them remind us to be alert to our surroundings and prepared to protect ourselves, our families and our neighbors.

Prepare before

- Stay alert. Always be aware of your environment and any possible dangers.
- If you see something, say something to local authorities. That includes suspicious packages, people behaving strangely or someone using strange communications.
- Observe warning signs. Signs might include unusual or violent communications, substance abuse, expressed anger or intent to cause harm. These warning signs may increase over time.
- Have an exit plan. Identify exits and areas to hide wherever you go, including work, school and special events.
- Learn lifesaving skills. Take trainings such as You Are the Help Until Help Arrives and first aid to assist the wounded before help arrives.

Stay safe during

- Seek safety. Getting away from the attacker is the top priority.
- Cover and hide if you can't evacuate.
- Fight only as a last resort. When you can't run or take cover, attempt to disrupt the attack or disable the attacker.
- Take care of yourself first. Then, if you are able, help the wounded get to safety and provide immediate care.

Know what to do after

- Remain calm.
- Keep hands visible and empty.
- Report to designated areas.
- Follow law enforcement's instructions and evacuate in the direction they tell you to go. Listen to law enforcement for information about the situation. Share updates as you can with family and friends.

AVOID: Move away from the source of the threat as quickly as possible. The more distance and barriers between you and the threat, the better.

DENY: If you cannot AVOID - Create barriers to prevent or slow down a threat from getting to you. Turn the lights off. Remain out of sight and quiet by hiding behind large objects and silence your phone.

DEFEND: If you cannot AVOID or DENY - be prepared to defend yourself. Be aggressive and committed to your actions. Use any object as a weapon. Do not fight fairly. Fight to survive.

Noisy Offering to Hawai'i Relief Efforts

The Noisy Offering is now going for the Hawai'i disaster relief. Funds will be sent directly to the ELCA synod in Hawai'i. RLC member **April Smith** has provided the following update on Hawai'i relief efforts via **Terri Robertson**, executive assistant for finance and accounting of the Pacifica Synod on behalf of **Bishop David Nagler**:

"Thank you for your congregation's support of those affected by the wildfires in Hawai'i. Bishop Dave is there through the end of the month. In fact today he is on Maui and meeting with partners there."

"As of August 22, donors from across the United States have donated almost \$42,000 to our synod's Hawai'I Relief fund. Here is what I can share with you (from Bishop Dave) about the fund:

1 "100 percent of any donations will be given to support people affected by the fires.

2 "We are working with local agencies on the ground to ensure that the money is used wisely.

3 "Our commitment is long term. We stand by communities long after the news cycle has moved on. We are proud of our Lutheran focus on restoring people; body, mind, and soul."

Deadline to Register to Vote Is Tuesday; Early Voting Starts This Week

For those Ohioans who have not voted before or have not voted recently or who have voter information to update, the deadline to register to vote for the <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>November 7</u> election is <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>October 10</u> and early in-person and absentee voting by mail begins <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>October 11</u>.

Voters can cast their ballots early in-person; vote-by-mail; or on Election Day. Absentee voting has already begun for military and overseas voters with those ballots mailed out Friday, September 22.

New voter registration and needed updates to a current registration can be done entirely online at http://VoteOhio.gov. Additionally, every county board of elections will be open until 9 p.m. Tuesday, October 10 for anyone who chooses to register in-person.

Early, in-person voting hours at local county boards of elections will be as follows:

- Wednesday, October 11-Friday, October 13, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Monday, October 16-Friday, October 20, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Monday, October 23-Friday, October 27, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Monday, October 30- Friday, November 3, 7:30 a.m.-7:30 p.m.
- Saturday, November 4, 8 a.m.- 4 p.m.
- Sunday, November 5, 1-5 p.m.
- Election Day Tuesday, November 7 polls will be open 6:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Voters may also choose to vote by mail. Information about requesting an absentee ballot can be found online at VoteOhio.gov. The deadline for absentee ballot applications to be received by the local board of elections is <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>October 31</u>. Absentee ballots must be post marked by Monday, November 6 or delivered directly to the local board of elections by 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, November 7.

Once their ballot request is received by their county board of elections, voters may track their ballot at http://voteOhio.gov/Track. As long as a ballot is postmarked by the day before the election, Monday, November 6, and received by Saturday, November 11, the vote will be tabulated.

Ohio voters will find two issues on their ballot this election: State Issue 1 is the reproductive/abortion rights constitutional amendment while State Issue 2 is an initiated law legalizing recreational use of marijuana. Also on this ballot are local elected offices.
