

Some Words in Which I Find Some Wisdom

It's the time of year when everyone has their Top Tens of 2023. For the first *Reflections* front page in 2024, I thought I'd share some short pieces of writing that I find wise, and that I could benefit from remembering and living in 2024.

Last year, the Redeemer book group read the novel *A Psalm for the Wild-Built* by **Becky Chambers**. One of the two main characters is a robot named **Mosscap**. At one point, he admits to his friend, **Dex**, "I wish I could understand experiences I'm incapable of having."

A bumper sticker: Don't believe everything you think. Or another way of putting it: Our brains are designed to keep us alive, not tell us the truth.

Another bumper sticker I saw in Portland, Oregon, which prides itself on staying weird: Normal people make me nervous.

As my brothers and I were going through some of dad's files this past summer to put his memorial service together, we came across this quote in a number of different places. **I.F. Stone** was an investigative journalist whose courage and honesty got a lot of people really angry with him. When he was initiated into *Who's Who*, and was asked to submit a biographical statement, instead of bragging about all the awards and accolades he'd received, he decided to share with people the values he tried to live by:

> To write the truth as I see it, to defend the weak against the strong, and to seek, as best I can, to bring healing perspectives to bear on the terrible hates and fears of [hu]mankind, in the hope of someday bringing about one world, in which [we] will enjoy the differences of the human garden, instead of killing each other over them.

Howard Thurman: Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive.

Pema Chodron: Fear is a natural reaction to moving closer to the truth.

Tripp Fuller: I don't want to be part of a community where I have to choose between being honest and being loved.

Anne Lamott: You can safely assume you've created God in your own image when it turns out that God hates the same people you do.

January Book Discussion Coming Up

Sheryl Owens reports that Redeemer's book group will be discussion *This Land Is Our Land: An Immigrant's Manifesto* by Suketu Mehta at its meeting on <u>Wednesday, January 17, 2024</u> at 7 p.m., both in-person and on Zoom.

She writes, "Mehta's forte is not mincing words or verbal diplomacy. He does not sugar coat his perspective; in fact, he rips off the bandage and throws alcohol on the wound left behind and then douses you with an ice water bath. This is either refreshing, or startlingly shocking, but it is not boring. You immediately feel his frustration and anger.... and hope.

"You may have heard it before, but this is not a whisper. It is a migrant's tale, and a minority tale. It is an economic tale since migrants and immigrants have all been touched by this saga. However, some have been able to rise above it because they could and chose to blend in.

"I was going to include a quote from this book, but choosing just one is like eating one Lays potato chip. Instead, I'll just invite you to read this book, and join the discussion: ... I believe there is something for everyone on this journey."

Ministry Evaluation Provides Helpful Insights

Last fall, the Mutual Ministry Team joined Church Council in evaluating Redeemer's ministries and **Pastor Dave's** relationship to those ministries. This "ministry evaluation" replaced the traditional personnel evaluation that Redeemer has used in the past to review the pastor. After consultation with the Southern Ohio Synod, both mutual ministry and council concluded that a more holistic approach to reviewing the pastor would provide a clearer picture of the pastor's participation in the current life of the congregation and the goals for the future. "As a group, we found it healthier – and more helpful – to discuss Redeemer's ministries rather than focus solely on the minister. Simply put, if we only focused on the pastor and the pastor's performance, then we would lose the larger picture within which the pastor functions," **Margie Farnham**, a member of the Mutual Ministry Team, explains.

"Mutual Ministry team member **Marques Highland** designed the survey used in the process. Marques' professional experience includes work with data-driven tools such as the one he prepared for us. The survey's purpose was to gauge how closely the congregation perceives their priorities and the pastor's to be aligned. We were asked to rank order the criteria based on our perceptions of the level of importance to the congregation and to the pastor. Once council, mutual ministry, and Pastor Dave had completed the survey, Marques tabulated the results and presented them during a joint meeting of council and mutual ministry.

"Overall, the responses suggest the congregation's priorities and Pastor Dave's priorities seem closely aligned. In a few areas, the responses were on the nose! For instance, we found ourselves in near perfect



alignment in our ranking of what we perceive as the congregation's most important values: inclusion, compassion, and justice (with 'inclusion' at the top). In another example, our ranking of 'ministry priorities' was very closely aligned. Those priorities were:

- "Helping everyone feel welcome.
- "Giving opportunities to serve and grow.
- "Activities to make the world more just.
- "Providing concrete ways for people to show love.

"Most respondents ranked in-person events as the most important means of communication, yet we know social media (ranked near the bottom) is how the world communicates today. How might we expand our social media presence? What does that look like? These were just some of the questions and discussion topics that the survey ignited. We also talked about our Lutheran identity, the liturgy, adult education, and the communities we serve.

"Ultimately, the survey gave Pastor Dave a chance to see what ministries council and mutual ministry believe the congregation deems most important. Those rankings will continue to direct conversations with council and provide some guidance as we consider the future of our programs.

"Overall, council, the Mutual Ministry Team, and Pastor Dave found the survey to be a useful tool. If you would like a copy of the survey with results, you can pick one up in the church office."

December Council Meeting

At the December meeting of Church Council on <u>Monday, December 18</u>, Financial Officer Nate Ott reported that the deficit is less than had been budgeted for 2023. He noted that the deficit the congregation approved in the 2023 budget was nearly \$40k; the deficit Redeemer will end up with is likely to be in the range of \$10-\$20K.

The <u>2024 Budget</u> was reviewed and approved. On <u>January 14</u> during the Sunday School hour, there will be a Budget Overview for all members of the congregation who wish to attend. **Brad Binau** has accepted the nomination for vice president of the 2024 Church Council, completing the slate. Additionally, it was announced that **Terry Warren** has renewed for another term on the Special Funds Team. Both Brad and Terry will be voted on at the Congregational Annual Meeting taking place on <u>Sunday, January 28</u>.

Council briefly reviewed the summary of the 2023 Redeemer Ministry Review prepared by **Pastor Dave** and **Margie Farnham**. Any action will be considered by the 2024 Executive Team and Council. Elsewhere in this issue of *Reflections*, Margie describes that process and some of its findings. Anyone wanting a copy of the questions and results of the review can pick it up in the church office.

Michele Disbro announced that the Special Funds Team had approved the laptop purchased recently, the plaque being ordered for **Larry Jones**, and a new Christmas tree, all of which will be covered by Memorial funds.

Lastly, Michele reminded folks of the retreat on <u>Saturday, January 27</u> for the 2024 Council Members. She thanked the outgoing members **Nate Ott, Sue Yehling**, and **Jennifer Young** for all their efforts during their terms. **Vice President Krista Skipper** thanked Michele for her leadership the past two years.
