Observing MLK Day

In 1983, **President Ronald Reagan** signed a law creating a federal holiday in honor of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. That holiday was first celebrated on January 20, 1986. So today is the 39th year this country has marked this day and this remarkable human being.

King was born on this day 95 years ago. He was murdered 56 years ago.

How are you honoring Brother Martin and his legacy today? A variety of public events are being held today and around this day. What are your thoughts and feelings today? What does the day mean to you? What does all he lived and died for mean to you?

It can be so easy just to let days like this go by. Holidays marking a particular person can cease to have much power to change us. Carl Wendell Hines, Jr., was in his late 20s when Martin Luther King, Jr., was murdered. He wrote his sorrow in these words:

> Now that he is safely dead, let us praise him, build monuments to his glory sing hosannas to his name. Dead men make such convenient heroes; they cannot rise to challenge the images we would fashion from their lives.

And besides, it is easier to build monuments than to make a better world. So, now that he is safely dead we, with eased consciences, will teach our children that he was a great man ... knowing that the cause for which he lived is still a cause and the dream for which he died is still a dream, a dead man's dream.

These are deeply hard words to hear. And that doesn't mean you and I don't need to hear them – and let them confront us with the harsh truth they bear.

It can be hard to know what might be a meaningful way to mark this day, to proclaim we believe this dream is worth making real. But I think it's worth struggling to find something

What is one action a couple of you can take that makes it clear this is a dream that is worth whatever it takes to make real?

Best Laid Plans ...

April Smith, Redeemer's Property Team liaison to Church Council reports, "As we were preparing for worship yesterday, [Sunday, January 14], it was noted that there was a strong electrical type odor in the back of the sanctuary. There was no smoke and we did not find any hot spots indicating any noticeable overheating but we suspected it may be coming from a furnace. Our regular HVAC contractor, Gahanna Heating and Cooling, came and did an inspection of all of our equipment not finding a cause. We then requested a courtesy visit from the Columbus Fire Department and they also suggested it may be one particular furnace. That furnace has been turned off, the smell began to dissipate, and all of the other heating equipment is working in the rest of the building. Gahanna Heating and Cooling will come back again this week ASAP to further investigate this issue."

As far as worship goes, **Pastor Dave** says that essentially the <u>January 14</u> service including the monthly Healing Service now becomes the **January 21** service.

Souper Bowl 2024 Coming!

Once again, Redeemer will join with Lutheran Social Services (LSS) Food Pantry in a Souper Bowl Offering on **Sunday, February 11**.

Please remember that, due to the buying power of the food pantries, each \$1 donated will be able to purchase \$4 of food. However, those wishing to contribute an actual food item, the best soups to collect are tomato, chicken noodle, vegetable while the most needed items to collect along with soup are 16 oz. plastic jars of peanut butter or any canned fruit of approximately 15 oz. However, ANY food items can be used.

The LSS Food Pantry has set a goal of 30 churches participating this year (24 in 2023), raising more than \$30,000 (compared to \$23,000 last year), and collecting 4,000 pounds of food.

Let's see what Redeemer can do while cheering for its favorite team!

Adult Ed Forum to Discuss RLC 2024 Budget Jan. 21

This will be an in-person session only.

Emily Kent will now lead the class sometime in February. As she reports, "I have completed my Death Doula training and am eager to share what I've learned. I'm on a mission to increase conversation and decrease anxiety about the dying process." She hosted her first "Death Café" at the Gahanna Public Library last Tuesday.

On <u>Sunday</u>, <u>January 28</u>, the congregational meeting and lunch will take place immediately following the worship service.

The Sunday Adult Ed class will resume its regular schedule of weekly offerings in February.

January Book Discussion Coming Up

Sheryl Owens reports that Redeemer's book group will be discussion *This Land Is Our Land: An Immigrant's Manifesto* by Suketu Mehta at its meeting on <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>January 17</u>, <u>2024</u> at 7 p.m., both in-person and on Zoom.

She writes, "Mehta's forte is not mincing words or verbal diplomacy. He does not sugar coat his perspective; in fact, he rips off the bandage and throws alcohol on the wound left behind and then douses you with an ice water bath. This is either refreshing, or startlingly shocking, but it is not boring. You immediately feel his frustration and anger.... and hope.

"You may have heard it before, but this is not a whisper. It is a migrant's tale, and a minority tale. It is an economic tale since migrants and immigrants have all been touched by this saga. However, some have been able to rise above it because they could and chose to blend in.

"I was going to include a quote from this book, but choosing just one is like eating one Lays potato chip. Instead, I'll just invite you to read this book, and join the discussion: ... I believe there is something for everyone on this journey."

Redeemer to Assemble Brown Bag Meals for First English on Jan. 20

This year Redeemer will be providing brown bag lunches for those at First English on the third Sunday of the odd numbered months. On Sunday mornings along with providing breakfast, First English gives the people leaving breakfast a brown bag lunch for that week. Since there will be no Thursday dinners this year, **Kay Ernsthausen** said Redeemer could help provide the sack lunches.

On <u>Saturday</u>, <u>January 20</u> folks will gather at Redeemer to put together 150 brown bag lunches. Check the list on the bulletin board for what donations are needed:

- Bottled water
- Juice boxes
- 300 Hostess deserts (individually wrapped).

There is a signup sheet on the bulletin board next to the Library. **Kay Ernsthausen** stressed Sunday that items need to be provided by count rather than packaging because so many different sized packages are available.

Noisy Offering Now Goes to Star House

Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will now go to Star House – a drop-in center for youth experiencing homelessness and the only housing village of its kind in Central Ohio for college-age youth who are exiting homelessness. Young people experiencing homelessness, ages 14-24, are provided a safe location along with basic needs and access to crucial, stabilizing resources.

In addition, Star House, along with the Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority and Finance Fund, jointly owns and operates Carol Stewart Village, an affordable neighborhood for youth coming out of homelessness. It has 62 studio apartments and onsite access to a wide array of programs and social services.

Bishop Dillahunt: Pick up Your Story and the Gospel and Let's Go!

The 12 Days of Christmas end as Epiphany begins: where the star led people to Jesus. A star that showed people from different lands, languages, and customs that hope had been born in a manger in Bethlehem, the Savior of the entire world.

They knew this child was different. The Good News about this child named Jesus didn't stay in Bethlehem, the shepherds and the Magi heralded this story to others as they traveled home. The travelers got back home and told a story of the journey, of the star that led them to Jesus and led them back again, for their own protection, by another way.

The journey of Advent is done and yet we continue to watch and wait for Jesus to come again. Christmas journeys and celebrations are a memory and decorations, for the most part, are put away. Yet, Jesus, God with us, continues his journey through the season of Epiphany.

Epiphany is a time of journeying, a time of wandering, a time of exploring led by the star. Journey with me in what it means to be a disciple, a follower of Jesus, who came to us as a human baby because of God's love and desire to have a relationship with us. This is Good News that we can talk about - we can be a STAR which leads someone to know Jesus. Who knew stars could be heralds, too?

Here we are just 12 days after the Christmas journey, in the beginning of January, with a road ahead in a new year, with new opportunities and stories to share as those followers of Jesus.

The Season after Epiphany is an in-between time which gives us a new way of thinking about faith. It's a new journey of excitement and a chance to SHINE, to share the Good News of Jesus with the world.

Epiphany **pushes** us to move forward knowing what is coming next in Jesus' life and ministry.

Epiphany shows us a different way of looking at the world. It's not about us.

Epiphany guides us to focus on where we fit in the story of God in Jesus.

Epiphany **invites** us into God's story of life, love, grace and forgiveness.

Epiphany **moves** us beyond ourselves to share our story of faith, with another.

Epiphany signals a shift from keeping quiet about Jesus to sharing the Good News

Epiphany is about **discipleship** and what that means in 2024 and into the future to let our star shine to others.

My prayer for you this Epiphany season is that the star leads you on a journey of discovery of the potential of sharing the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in new ways **without** being afraid of what might come of the invitation to follow. Epiphany is a time for us to both Come and See and Go and Tell.

Blessed Epiphany, Season Southern Ohio, as we journey together knowing we walk along side each other arm in arm, as shining stars ready to share Jesus with those we meet along the way as we clarify, collaborate, and cultivate. We are Stronger and Better Together ... Joining Jesus in the restoration of the world.

- **24** Give thanks for the ELCA Foundation, which helps us to fund God's work in the world, now and well into the future.
