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

Reading

Isaiah 40:21-31 (The Message, alt.)

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Isaiah said to the people [in exile in Babylon], "Have you not been paying attention?

Have you not been listening?

Haven't you heard these stories all your life?

Don't you understand the foundation of all things?

God sits high above the round ball of earth.

The people look like mere ants.

God stretches out the skies like a canvas—

yes, like a tent canvas to live under,

and ignores what all the rulers say and do.

The rulers of the earth count for nothing.

Royalty and rulers don't amount to much.

Like seeds barely rooted, just sprouted,

they shrivel when God blows on them.

Like flecks of chaff, they're gone with the wind."

"So-who is like me?

Who holds a candle to me?" says The Holy.

"Look at the night skies:

Glory to you, O Lord.

Directly on leaving the meeting place, Jesus, Simon, and Andrew came to Simon and Andrew's house, accompanied by James and John. Simon's mother-in-law was sick in bed, burning up with fever. 

Since this is his meal, and he is present to us in it, all are welcome.



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Great Thanksgiving




In a refugee child playing under a star, in an unknown young man requesting baptism, in a wandering preacher refreshed by water from a woman's hand, God was waiting to be recognized and known, to transform seeing and change the world.

In the routine smallness of everyday life, in the painful uncertainty of struggle and transition, in the timeless grace of hospitality, and the gifts of bread and wine, God is waiting to be recognized and known, to transform our seeing and change our world.

Here, at this table, under the welcoming light of a morning star, the God of epiphanies waits to be encountered. So – though you may be weary and worn by your journey or stained and sore with travel – look up and see the star, lay aside your packs, and enter with joy for God waits here – to refresh and renew, to comfort and restore, to challenge and transform, to know, and be known.

Now, gathered around this table, we recall and recount how the Epiphany God appeared in the actions and words of Jesus as he shared a last supper with his friends in which Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to his friends, saying, "Take this and eat. This is my body, broken for you. Do this to remember me." And after supper, Jesus took the cup and gave it to them, saying, "This cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood. It is shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. As often as you drink this, do so to remember me." Recalling and treasuring these things, we join our voices with those of all creation to recognize and celebrate the grace and goodness of God present and at work in the world.



Epiphany God, send down your Holy Spirit now on us, and on these gifts of bread and wine – that we might recognize and know you present with us here, and in receiving the gifts of your love find ourselves renewed. By this meal, renew our commitment to make real the prayer Jesus teaches:



Islamic Professor Loren Lybarger returns Feb 4 to continue our conversations about Israel/Palestine




