

What Does the Bible Tell Us about God?

In my reflection yesterday, I invited the congregation – and all Christians – to consider giving up for Lent saying anything like, "*That Old Testament God is so violent and vengeful. The New Testament God is so much more loving.*" I suggested three reasons I thought we should do this.

I had some interesting conversations with a few of you after worship about this. One of you wanted to hear more about one of the points I'd made, so I said I'd write about it for *Reflections*.

Yesterday I said the Bible doesn't have any recordings or snapshots of things God actually said or did. It only has things the writers tell us God said or did. Everything we read in the Bible was written by someone who was trying to figure out who God was and what God had to do with them, their communities, human history, and the larger world. And, like any of us, when the writers sat down to write about what they observed, experienced, and believed about God, they weren't a blank slate. They brought to their writing task their biases, prejudices, assumptions, hopes, and fears. And all of these shaped what they wrote about God.

In my reflection, I gave an example that many Christians point to when we talk about how violent *that Old Testament God* is. The book of Joshua tells the story about the Hebrew people conquering the people who happened to be living in the land they believed God had promised to give them. The writers of Joshua say God orders the people to destroy any of these original inhabitants if they aren't willing to believe in God. So the storytellers tell us God commands genocide.

Does that mean it is God's will for people to carry out acts of genocide?

If you believe the story of Joshua tells us something about God, then perhaps you have to answer *Yes*.

However, if you believe that the only thing this story tells us is that the writers believed God ordered genocide, then you can conclude this story tells us nothing about God. I suggested in my reflection an idea about why they would have told the story in this way. Perhaps they believed God wanted them to have a land they could live in so badly that God was willing to do anything for them to have a land to call their own, including killing the original inhabitants. The writers felt God favored them over all other people, and God showed that by giving them permission to kill anyone who might prevent them for living in this land.

However, we don't just find violent stories in the Jewish Scriptures. There are violent stories in the Christian Scriptures as well. In yesterday's reflection, I talked about how Christians invented the idea of hell as a place of eternal separation from God and eternal torment. Judaism doesn't have anything like that. In my mind, such an idea is a uniquely abhorrent and violent one. And a number of stories in the Christian Scriptures talk about people who don't do what God wants and don't believe what God wants who are sent to hell. It would be understandable for Jews reading such stories to say, "Look at that violent New Testament God who sends people to suffer in hell for all eternity! What kind of a God is that?"

In the end, we can't be sure that what we read in the Bible tells us anything about what God actually said or did. They simply tell us what the writers' biases, prejudices, assumptions, hopes, and fears led them to believe about God and God's relationship to them and to the world around them. And we cannot assume these are the same at all.

So I don't believe we can talk about *that violent Old Testament God* just like those of other faiths can't talk about *that violent New Testament God* because it's very possible God wants nothing to do with the violence which the writers of either testament have said God supports. I'm happy to be in conversation with any of you who would like to explore this – or anything else!

Noisy Offering to Go to Star House

Redeemer's "Noisy Offering" will now go to Star House – a drop-in center for youth experiencing homelessness and the only housing village of its kind in Central Ohio for college-age youth who are exiting homelessness. Young people experiencing homelessness, ages 14-24, are provided a safe location along with basic needs and access to crucial, stabilizing resources.

In addition, Star House, along with the Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority and Finance Fund, jointly owns and operates Carol Stewart Village, an affordable neighborhood for youth coming out of homelessness. It has 62 studio apartments and onsite access to a wide array of programs and social services.
