ELCA Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's Easter Message

“So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them, and they said nothing to anyone for they were afraid.” That's where the Gospel of Mark originally ended. And it just seems so odd to me. It's so abrupt. I mean, the women had seen the angel. He'd announced that Jesus was raised from the dead, and then he tells them all this good news and wants them to go on their way. And they just are not going to say a single word.

There are three words in that passage that really stand out for me, especially in the Greek. One is fear — *phobos*. We get phobia from that. The other one is amazement — *ekstasis*. We get ecstasy from that. And the other one has to do with being seized. It actually means “being possessed.” So we take a look at these women, and they've had this miraculous appearance by an angel. They've heard the good news that Jesus has raised from the dead, and they're too afraid to do anything about it, and they just are going to be silent. It seems that nothing changed. They came to take care of Jesus' dead body because on the Sabbath they could not work. But on the first day of the week, they were there. They have this announcement, and then it's all the same.

Sometimes I think we feel like nothing's changed. Sometimes I think that the events in our country, in our church, around the world are just so terrifying and so overwhelming that it seems like the resurrection really didn't make a difference. But these three words really say something about the women, and I think about us and, most especially, about Easter. When they said that they were filled with amazement — this is this ecstasy, *ekstasis* — they were really standing. It means literally standing in a different place. So though they were still in the tomb and they hadn't reacted yet, nevertheless, everything had changed. And because of the resurrection, we, all of us, are standing in a different place. The whole of creation is standing in a different place. And the word for fear, *phobos*, phobia we get from that. But it's really a sense of trembling in the presence of God, of awe that they were actually filled with awe — not paralyzed by fear but filled with awe. And I hope this Eastertide and all year round, we have a sense of the presence of God that fills us with awe.

And it also says that they were seized with fear. Well, the word means “possessed.” And yes, we believe that in baptism because of the resurrection, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit and we now are all Spirit-possessed.

When things seem to be staying the same, when things seem to be happening and coming at us so quickly, I think it's very important to take time to be a little amazed, to be standing in a different place, to have a sense of this awe and trembling before the Lord, and to allow ourselves to be possessed by the Spirit, who will give us power and courage in these times.

My favorite hymn is “Lord Jesus, You Shall Be My Song.” It's ELW 808. And the last verse goes like this: “I fear in the dark and the doubt of my journey; but courage will come with the sound of his steps by my side. And with all of the family Jesus saved by his love, we'll sing to his dawn at the end of our journey.”

Be well, dear church. Happy Easter.

2024 LSS/Food Collective Food Giveaways Begin April 18

"Now's the time, folks! We need your help at the **April Food Giveaway**, and we need the extra items, and we need boxes! If you haven't let us know you're volunteering, now is the time 'cause **April 18** is this Thursday!"

Reminder to volunteers, the church parking lot is off-limits on Thursday afternoon, but there's ample parking nearby.

If you'd like more information or just want to tell us you'll be there, just call or email the Church Office.

Redeemer is scheduled for the third Thursday of every month from April to October. The demand for food assistance is still high, so this ministry effort Redeemer shares with Lutheran Social Services (LSS) and the Mid-Ohio Food Collective is even more important!

Here are the 2024 dates and the "extra" items that will be collected each month. (The extra items are those supplies which are not included in the contributions provided by LSS and Mid-Ohio nor are they covered by food stamps but go a long way in helping those seeking assistance through the food giveaways. These items can be placed in the baskets in Donation Station in the cloakroom by the Tuesday before each Giveaway.)

2024 Giveaway 'Extras'

April 18: Hair care (shampoo, conditioner, etc.)

May 16: Soaps (hand and body soaps, bar, gel, foam)

June 20: Personal summer care (sunscreen, kid's sunscreen, body lotion, insect repellent, etc.)

July 18: Basic school supplies (pencils, crayons, paper, etc., plus boxes of tissues)

August 15: Paper products (paper towels, toilet tissue, baby wipes, etc.)

September 19: Personal products (soap, shampoo, toothpaste, deodorant, dental floss, body lotion, nail care kits, etc.)

October 17: Cleaning supplies (wipes, paper towels, sponges, etc.).

Giveaway Process

Volunteers will follow the processes used the last few years: there will be a drive-thru process where customers stay in their cars and volunteers will follow all the current physical distancing, hand washing, glove and face mask guidelines.

In an effort to gauge the volunteer staffing for these events, and especially the one on **Thursday, April 18**, those who are willing to help are asked to email or call the church office to let the church know. A sign-up sheet is also available on the bulletin board. Volunteers of ALL AGES are welcome! And smaller blocks of time are also possible!

April 21 Adult Ed Class to Discuss ‘Creation Care’

On **Sunday, April 21**, the day before Earth Day, Redeemer’s Adult Ed class will talk about “Creation Care” and how they find themselves responding to climate change. Joining the class from Seattle on Zoom is **Mike Schut**. For 11 years, he served as program co-director for Seattle-based Earth Ministry, an organization that worked to connect Christian faith with care and justice for all creation. Following that he worked as the economic and environmental affairs officer for the Episcopal Church in the USA.

His published works include *Simpler Living, Compassionate Life: A Christian Perspective, Food & Faith: Justice, Joy, and Daily Bread*, and *Money and Faith: The Search for Enough*.

According to **Pastor Dave**, “Mike will weave personal story with a bit of theology and lead us into conversation about how the way we see the world and ourselves impacts caring for creation. April 28 Adult Ed Class to Hear from Columbus Violence Reduction Team

Sunday morning, April 28, after worship, the Adult Ed class will host the director and three intervention specialists who are part of the city's new program, Columbus Violence Reduction.

Columbus Violence Reduction (CVR) is Columbus’s adaptation of the Group Violence Intervention (GVI) model which is an evidence-based strategy out of the National Network of Safe Communities. CVR is a three-pronged approach that aims to reduce group/gang violence in Columbus, focusing on law enforcement, support and outreach, and community moral voice.

The “law enforcement” message is that any future violence will be met with clear, predictable and certain consequences. The “support and outreach” message is an offer of help from social service providers for those who want it. The “community moral voice” message is a moral message from community representatives that violence will not be tolerated.

The guiding principles of GVI are the following: do no harm; strengthen the community’s capacity to reduce violence; enhance legitimacy; offer help to those that want it; get deterrence right; and use enforcement strategically.

CVR conducts two main interventions with participants: The call-session and custom notifications. These will be explained at the presentation. The CVR is also present in the community in other places such as scene response, hospital intervention, marches, and other events that promote peace and support the creation of community.

Research shows that a very small percentage of the community is driving a large (60-70 percent) of the serious violence. Research also shows that if implemented correctly, CVR/GVI strategies can reduce group/gang violence by 30-40 percent.

One of the driving forces behind the creation of CVR was Building Responsibility, Equality, and Dignity (BREAD), of which Redeemer is an active member.

The energy behind this team is to do all they can to make sure people stay safe and alive and out of prison.

When news reports often convey the message that violence is an epidemic that can't be slowed down, these leaders will show us that is not true. Transformation is not only possible, it's happening.

Redeemer Summer Book Study to Focus on *Poverty, By America*

In recent summer book studies, Redeemer's Book Group has focused on immigration, racism, and death and dying. This summer, they will discuss a book that begins with the statement: "The United States, the richest country on earth, has more poverty than any other advanced democracy. Why?"

Pulitzer-prize author **Matthew Desmond** dives into that question in his book *Poverty, By America*. He looks at causes, and, most importantly, presents his own solution for how actually to end poverty.

The group will meet Wednesday evenings from 7-8:30 p.m. on June 19, June 26, July 3, and July 10. The group is starting in June because **Pastor Dave** will be at the ELCA National Youth Gathering in the middle of July. They will meet both in-person and on Zoom.

Both pastor and **Sheryl Owens** look forward to another summer of honest, enriching conversations.

Tuesday Bible Study Focuses on Resurrection Stories

The risen Christ talking with **Mary Magdalene** in the garden when she thinks he's a gardener ... the Road to Emmaus ... Doubting **Thomas** ... the risen Christ cooking breakfast for the disciples and asking **Peter** three times, "Do you love me?": some of the best-known stories in the gospels are stories about encounters people have on or after the first Easter. Being Good Stewards of Earth #2

Michele Disbro writes, "Leading up to Earth Day, we want to offer some good tips on how to be a good steward of the earth. Did you know styrofoam can be recycled? However, don't go putting it into your recycle container. Styrofoam needs to be taken to 3770 Municipal Way in Hilliard or the Convenience Center at 2566 Jackson Pike.

"The Hilliard Styrofoam Collection Shack is across from the compost cans and is open to anyone. While plastic foam is not recyclable through traditional methods, it can be recycled through densification.

"In 2021, the city of Hilliard received a grant from SWACO to purchase Central Ohio's first densifier. The Runi-brand equipment shreds styrofoam and then compresses out the air, reducing the volume of the foam to 1/50th of its original volume. Put into perspective, a stack of styrofoam the size of an SUV can be compressed to the size of one concrete block.

"Recycled styrofoam is commonly used for insulation, picture frames, park benches, coolers, infant car seats and for added protection in sports and motor vehicle helmets.

"Please follow these rules when dropping off styrofoam recycling:

1. "Styrofoam must be clean. Remove all stickers and tape.
2. "Food containers, egg cartons, and styrofoam peanuts are not accepted at this time although they are anticipating accepting those items beginning in July 2024."

“This has been a particularly successful period for BREAD, as solutions that they have pushed for have been implemented and proven effective. As part of the Columbus Violence Reduction initiative, city agencies have engaged 56 known violent offenders. Columbus City Schools has trained over 750 staff which include administrators, counselors, social workers, and nurses in restorative practices. The ‘public tree code’ was passed in December. Thank you for all your support of BREAD that has contributed to these wins!”

Gaza and Palestine

Julie Johnson submitted the following update on Gaza and Palestine:

“Much has happened since I last updated the article on Palestine. Aid workers from World Central Kitchen have been killed and the United States has taken its firmest stance on Israel’s actions. The known death toll in Gaza is over 33,000 with tens of thousands unaccounted for and probably buried in the rubble that is present day Gaza. Death by famine and disease is ongoing. And the hostages are still be held and their condition is unknowable.

“The question continues to be what can we do? Israel says it will open two more land access points for humanitarian aid. The question remains how speedy the process will be to let aid through and how safe the aid workers are from military attacks.

“These are things we can do:

“1. Advocate with the Biden administration to continue to press for an immediate ceasefire. This includes support when the administration does act, as they have most recently.

“2. Support restored funding for UNRWA which has the most experience with aid distribution in Gaza.

“3. Financially support World Central Kitchen, the World Food Program and Red Crescent who are working directly to provide much needed aid.

“This is an incredibly complex time in an unbelievably complex region. Condemnation of any person, group, religion, or country won’t help. But neither can we be silent.”
