Throughout my years of schooling, I never liked assignments when my teacher said, "Write on whatever aspect of this topic you want to." Maybe those teachers thought they were doing their students a favor by giving us so much freedom. Maybe they'd gotten tired of reading papers by students who clearly had no interest in more focused assignments. I'm sure some students loved such an open-ended approach. I didn't. I like being given some ideas or themes to start with. I like having something to respond to, as opposed to having to come up with something totally from scratch.

That's why I appreciate the fact that we use the lectionary in worship here. While there are challenges with the lectionary, there are more challenges that come from not having that structure and framework. Without the lectionary as a starting place, each week is a blank slate. Each week, a preacher stares at the entire Bible, and chooses a couple of readings to focus on. That makes it too easy to pick only texts that reflect what the preacher already believes, as opposed to having to wrestle with texts that stretch us in uncomfortable ways.

<u>**Reflections**</u> editor **Judith Bird** and I have a rhythm in which one of us writes this front page one week and the other does the next. Most weeks when it's my turn, I sit in front of my computer on the Sunday afternoon ... and I feel like I'm back in school, trying to complete the assignment for a class in which the teacher has said, "Write on whatever aspect of this topic you want to." Because I can write anything I want.

Most weeks, there's not an obvious theme to focus on.

So most Sunday afternoons, I sit in my office at home and say to myself, "The folks at Redeemer hear me preach every week. What more can I say in this column that would be of any interest to them?" And I stare at the blinking cursor, until something comes up that I hope you might be interested in.

As I stared at my clicking cursor this week, I realized I've never asked you if there are topics or themes you'd like me to explore on this page. So that's what I'm inviting you to you to let me know. Some of you might read this and say, "What a cop-out!" or, "How do you spell p-u-n-t?" And there might be a bit of truth in that! At the same time, I do hope you take my question seriously, and spend a few moments thinking about what you'd enjoy or value my writing about. I genuinely enjoy and value hearing what's on your minds. And enjoy being freed from feeling like I'm back in school trying to come up with some intelligent essay for an assignment that feels infinitely open-ended  $\bigcirc$  !

# April 28 Adult Ed Class to Hear from Columbus Violence Reduction Team

<u>Sunday morning, April 28</u>, after worship, the Adult Ed class will host the director and three intervention specialists who are part of the city's new program, Columbus Violence Reduction.

Columbus Violence Reduction (CVR) is Columbus's adaptation of the Group Violence Intervention (GVI) model which is an evidence-based strategy out of the National Network of Safe Communities. CVR is a three-pronged approach that aims to reduce group/gang violence in Columbus, focusing on law enforcement, support and outreach, and community moral voice.

The "law enforcement" message is that any future violence will be met with clear, predictable and certain consequences. The "support and outreach" message is an offer of help from social service providers for those who want it. The "community moral voice" message is a moral message from community representatives that violence will not be tolerated.

The guiding principles of GVI are the following: do no harm; strengthen the community's capacity to reduce violence; enhance legitimacy; offer help to those that want it; get deterrence right; and use enforcement strategically.

CVR conducts two main interventions with participants: The call-session and custom notifications. These will be explained at the presentation. The CVR is also present in the community in other places such as scene response, hospital intervention, marches, and other events that promote peace and support the creation of community.

Research shows that a very small percentage of the community is driving a large (60-70 percent) of the serious violence. Research also shows that if implemented correctly, CVR/GVI strategies can reduce group/gang violence by 30-40 percent.

One of the driving forces behind the creation of CVR was Building Responsibility, Equality, and Dignity (BREAD), of which Redeemer is an active member.

The energy behind this team is to do all they can to make sure people stay safe and alive and out of prison.

When news reports often convey the message that violence is an epidemic that can't be slowed down, these leaders will show us that is not true. Transformation is not only possible, it's happening.

# Being Good Stewards of Earth #2

**Michele Disbro** writes, "Leading up to Earth Day, we want to offer some good tips on how to be a good steward of the earth. Did you know styrofoam can be recycled? However, don't go putting it into your recycle container. Styrofoam needs to be taken to 3770 Municipal Way in Hilliard or the Convenience Center at 2566 Jackson Pike.

"The Hilliard Styrofoam Collection Shack is across from the compost cans and is open to anyone. While plastic foam is not recyclable through traditional methods, it can be recycled through densification.

"In 2021, the city of Hilliard received a grant from SWACO to purchase Central Ohio's first densifier. The Runi-brand equipment shreds styrofoam and then compresses out the air, reducing the volume of the foam to 1/50th of its original volume. Put into perspective, a stack of styrofoam the size of an SUV can be compressed to the size of one concrete block.

"Recycled styrofoam is commonly used for insulation, picture frames, park benches, coolers, infant car seats and for added protection in sports and motor vehicle helmets.

"Please follow these rules when dropping off styrofoam recycling:

1. "Styrofoam must be clean. Remove all stickers and tape.

2. "Food containers, egg cartons, and styrofoam peanuts are not accepted at this time although they are anticipating accepting those items beginning in July 2024."

### **ELCA Church Council Holds Spring Meeting**

The Church Council of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) met in Chicago, April 11-14. The council, which serves as the ELCA churchwide organization's board of directors and interim legislative authority between meetings of a churchwide assembly, carries out its work in support of the ELCA's priority areas of being a welcoming church, a thriving church, and a connected and sustainable church.

In her report to the council, ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton gave thanks to Rev. Michael Burk for his service as presiding bishop pro tempore during her leave of absence. Eaton returned from leave on Monday, March 18.

# Reflections

Addressing the work and purpose of this church, Eaton spoke of the particular witness to the gospel that identifies Lutherans. "The unique work of the church is to give the gospel free course in the world," Eaton said. "To care for the gospel, including the word as well as the sacraments. No other institution on earth has that charge."

The council took the following actions:

- Received "Faithful Teaching," the Common Statement of the Twelfth Round of the U.S. Lutheran-Catholic dialogue. Next year will mark 60 years of dialogue between Lutherans and Catholics in the United States. During this time, substantial progress has been made in discovering the shared unity that is detailed in what are now 12 common statements.

- Adopted "Gun-related Violence and Trauma" as an official social message of the ELCA.

- Authorized the development of a social message on child protection and maltreatment in response to a 2022 Churchwide Assembly memorial.

- Revised a continuing resolution outlining the pre-assembly identification process for the elections of churchwide officers.

- Requested a review of ELCA World Hunger FY24 revenue and expense performance through May 2024, sharing recommendations with the budget and finance committee and authorizing the executive committee to approve necessary revisions to the World Hunger FY24 spending authorization following the review.

- Approved adding a Roth option for elective retirement contributions through Portico Benefit Services, beginning Jan. 1, 2025.

- Approved amendments to the churchwide organization's personnel policies.

The council received/engaged in the following:

- An update from the co-chairs of the Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church (CRLC).

- An update on the God's Love Made Real initiative.
- An update on the work of the budget prioritization task force.
- Reports and updates from officers, the chair of the Conference of Bishops, and Church Council committees.
- Reports and updates from the Administrative Team.
- Presentations from representatives of the ethnic associations and Reconciling Works.
- Racial justice and gender justice education.
- Personal reflections on faith from council members.
- Worship, prayer and fellowship.

### **Gaza and Palestine**

Julie Johnson submitted the following update on Gaza and Palestine:

"Much has happened since I last updated the article on Palestine. Aid workers from World Central Kitchen have been killed and the United States has taken its firmest stance on Israel's actions. The known death toll in Gaza is over 33,000 with tens of thousands unaccounted for and probably buried in the rubble that is present day Gaza. Death by famine and disease is ongoing. And the hostages are still be held and their condition is unknowable.

"The question continues to be what can we do? Israel says it will open two more land access points for humanitarian aid. The question remains how speedy the process will be to let aid through and how safe the aid workers are from military attacks.

"These are things we can do:

"1. Advocate with the Biden administration to continue to press for an immediate ceasefire. This includes support when the administration does act, as they have most recently.

"2. Support restored funding for UNRWA which has the most experience with aid distribution in Gaza.

"3. Financially support World Central Kitchen, the World Food Program and Red Crescent who are working directly to provide much needed aid.

"This is an incredibly complex time in an unbelievably complex region. Condemnation of any person, group, religion, or country won't help. But neither can we be silent."
